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10th Worldwide Bible Reading Program Continues 'Til Dec. 25

Worldwide Bible Reading, a project sponsored by the American Bible Society is under way for the tenth consecutive year.

There was a time, back in 1943, when a lonely young marine on Guadalcanal wrote his mother, asking that his parents join with him in the daily reading of identical passages in their Bibles. The mother shared the secret of her invisible bond of fellowship with her overseas son with the Philadelphia office of the American Bible Society, and thereafter throughout the war years thousands of servicemen and their families shared a similar experience.

As the movement spread, millions asked for and used the booklets published in connection with the annual Worldwide Bible Reading program.

The program has become worldwide through missionaries, agents of the American Bible Society and the usual channels of public information. Outside the United States the program is under the auspices of the Bible Society's 12 foreign agencies.

Thirty-eight countries participated in the program last year. Chaplains serving with various branches of the Armed Forces in all parts of the world, and the servicemen to whom they minister, also have a part in this "worldwide" aspect of Worldwide Bible Reading.

Sponsored by a widely representative national committee of laymen, of which President Eisenhower is honorary chairman, actively assisted by some 70 denominations, and promoted by the American Bible Society, Worldwide Bible Reading has the endorsement of several major church bodies, councils and related agencies.

Worldwide Bible Reading from Thanksgiving to Christmas is a month of nation-wide emphasis on the Bible, aimed at encouraging wider use of the Bible as a source of inspiration, guidance and self-help.

"The Book of Hope" is the theme for 1953. As part of the Worldwide Bible Reading program the American Bible Society publishes and provides free of charge a booklet listing passages for daily reading from Thanksgiving to Christmas Day, together with some briefly stated helps for Bible reading. Over 13,000,000 booklets were distributed in connection with the 1952 program.

The high point of the program is Universal Bible Sunday, observed in thousands of churches of many denominations throughout the United States and in hundreds of churches overseas on Dec. 13. The day will be further noted in public meetings, in the press, on radio and TV programs. Universal Bible Sunday has been widely observed in this country since 1904.

The Scripture selections for Worldwide Bible Reading for the coming week follow:

November—27, Psalm 23; 28, Psalm 43; 29, Psalm 130; 30, Psalm 147.

December—1, Jeremiah 17:1-15; 2, Luke 5:27-39; 3, Luke 6:1-26; 4, Luke 6:27-49.

Hells Canyon Case Heard

WASHINGTON (AP)—Attorneys Friday were to question an Idaho Power Co. consulting engineer at a Power Commission hearing on the concern's application to build three dams in the Snake River.

Commission lawyer John C. Mason called up for cross-examination Robert DeLucia, now a consulting engineer at Portland, Ore.

DeLucia, an Idaho Power witness, has testified the company's three projects would be superior to the federal Hells Canyon Dam which has been proposed in the same section of the river along the Idaho-Oregon border.

Questioning of two Idaho Power financial witnesses was completed Wednesday before the hearing recessed for Thanksgiving. They are Stewart S. Hawes of Blythe and Co., an investment banking firm, and S. T. Mason Frey of Bankers Trust Co., both of New York.

Hawes and Frey testified Idaho Power would be able to finance the projects through bank loans and sale of bonds and stock.

Skeletons Kept Nice and Warm

LAKE GEORGE, N.Y. (AP)—The winter winds may blow, but they won't chill six skeletons at nearby Ft. William Henry—they're bundled in electric blankets.

Archaeologists dug up the 100-year-old skeletons of French and Indian war victims last spring, but dared not move them from the undated building over their open graves.

They also feared the severe cold would damage the remains. So heating cables and paper blankets have been installed around the bones of the British soldiers presumably killed when the fort was burned by the French in 1757.

Biggest Livestock Show Opens Friday

CHICAGO (AP)—The nation's biggest agricultural show, the International Livestock Exposition, opens Friday night with some 5 million dollars worth of prize livestock and crops on exhibition.

The 54th annual exposition, which opens with a horse show performance, will run through Dec. 5, at the International Amphitheater at the Chicago stock yards. Some 500,000 persons are expected to attend the exposition.
