NEW YORK (U) — A quiet advance Friday put the stock market moderately higher.
Activity and strength were confined to a few major divisions of the market, and only a few areas were lagged.
Price changes ranged from fractions lower to around a point higher at the outside.
Trading summed down from a fast start and came to an estimated 1,400,000 shares for the day. Wednesday's total was 1,540,000 shares, the best in nearly two weeks. The expanded business accompanied rising prices.

CHICAGO GRAIN
CHICAGO (U) — A slow downward trend in the afternoon whittled away a good part of substantial early advances in grains on the board of trade Friday.
At the start soybeans spurred as much as five cents, old crop months reaching new peaks. Gains in crude soybean oil and a sharp upturn in soybean meal aided this advance.
Most corn contracts also were at new highs as were all hard deliveries. Recent very strong hog markets, making feeding operations more profitable, exerted a bullish influence in corn.
Prospective export demand helped wheat early but a drop in prices at Minneapolis undermined the bread cereal later.
Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, Dec 1.99 1/4, corn 1/4 higher, Dec 1.56 1/4, oats unchanged to 1/4 lower, Dec 76 1/4, rye 1/4 lower, Dec 1.17 1/4, soybeans 2 cents lower to 2 cents higher, Jan 3.08 1/4, and Jan 35 to 70 cents a hundred pounds higher, Dec 15.80.

Windows Take Bad Beating

While on routine patrol duty shortly before 9 p.m. last night city police discovered three windows broken out in the rear of the lumber shed and planer mill at the Home Lumber and Supply Co., 2384 South Sixth Street.
Officers called Bill Meade, owner of the plant who after checking reported apparently nothing had been taken.
Further investigation disclosed that 22 smaller windows higher up in the building had also been broken out.
Authorities believed the vandalism had been caused by small boys throwing rocks and sticks at the windows.

Asst. U.S. Atty. Edward D. Hassan said the FBI "seemed to know who they were looking for and they told me they expected to make more arrests soon."
