

Gouzenko Issue Bypassed Jenner; Anti-Red Probe To Be Pushed In Big Rally

WASHINGTON — Sen. Jenner today left the issue of Gouzenko up to the Canadian government and U. S. diplomats and moved forward on other fronts in his government.

Jenner issued a statement which said internal security subcommittee heads have nine former government employees, including Hiss, "now under special scrutiny."

The subcommittee is trying to determine who was responsible for continued employment, which cases, involved promotions, and continued access to government secrets, and cases in pay," the statement said.

Last night, Jenner said no further steps until there is a fresh exchange of views between the Canadian Foreign Minister and the U. S. State Department.

Jenner's subcommittee has been rejected, then again for Canadian permission to question Gouzenko. The one Russian Embassy code clerk, put the finger on a big Canadian spy ring at Ottawa in 1945, now a Canadian citizen living in the U. S. under police-guarded obscurity.

Canada has agreed to the Jenner subcommittee's second request which (1) Gouzenko is willing to be interviewed, (2) the interview is confidential and under Canadian law, and (3) the decision as to whether the information is to be made public is left to Canada.

Jenner objected to the last condition, saying his committee could promise it would keep from press—and hence the public—"evidence vital to the security of the United States." He asked for a different arrangement.

Gouzenko, when he tipped off

Canadian authorities in 1945, said the Red spy ring in Canada had contacts in the United States. The Canadian government says the United States has been kept fully informed and Gouzenko has nothing more to tell, Gouzenko says he might have some useful advice for the Jenner subcommittee.

One of the men named by Gouzenko, Fred Rose, has gone behind the Iron Curtain, leaving his wife and daughter in Canada. Rose, a naturalized Canadian born in Poland, served a five-year jail term for his part in the spying.

His wife said yesterday he has gone to Czechoslovakia on business and for his health.

The Jenner subcommittee turned to Gouzenko after Atty. Gen. Brownell's sensational charges Nov. 6 that the Truman administration was "incredibly" lax toward rooting Reds out of key government positions.

Brownell cited the case of Harry Dexter White, who he said was promoted by Truman from assistant Treasury secretary to U. S. representative on the International Monetary Fund despite FBI reports linking him to espionage. Truman replied he did this to keep White and others similarly suspected under surveillance. But FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover told the Jenner group he disapproved of this arrangement, which he said hampered FBI checks on Red suspects.

Jenner's statement yesterday said White, Hiss and seven other former government workers are now the subcommittee's primary concern. White died in 1948 and Hiss is serving a five-year prison sentence for denying under oath that he gave state secrets to a Communist agent.

Jenner announced the subcommittee has printed for public distribution the testimony taken at a public hearing in Washington last June 25 from J. Anthony Panuch.

Panuch, a New York lawyer who worked under Hiss at the State Department, testified he was instrumental in blocking a plan which would have given Hiss greater influence at the United Nations. He said he wrote a memorandum March 7, 1946, that killed the proposed reorganization "deader than a door nail."

The wound not being serious, was dressed and Grant was released from the hospital.
