Women To Study Consumer Attitudes At Dec. Meet

Representatives of women's organizations in Klamath Falls will delve into consumer attitudes on meat marketing at 7:30 p.m. Dec. 3 at the YMCA.

These women, named by their organizations to represent them on a consumer meat marketing committee, have gathered information from their membership on consumer views.

Among questions surveyed were meat cooking methods and buying practices. The women are expressing their views on self-service counters with prepackaged meats, labeling according to quantity, type of cut and grade, and buying in quantity, such as for freezing.

Virginia Moorman of the Oregon State extension service, who is working with the local women, invites all women's organizations to send representatives to Thursday night's meeting. Some Klamath Falls groups were represented at a previous meeting, Oct. 21.

Klamath Falls is one of seven cities in the state where consumer attitudes are being gathered by the OSC extension service in preparation for a state meatmarketing conference Jan. 6 and 7 in Corvallis.

According to Miss Moorman, the Klamath Falls representatives will be organized into a consumer committee under a chairman and vice chairman. A local delegate will represent them in compiling a statement of consumer views, which will be presented at the January conference.

Meeting with the consumers then will be five other groups, representing the steps from meat producing to consuming. When the views of all are gathered, the result is expected to be recommendations that will improve meat marketing efficiency in the state, finally resulting in the consumer's dollar buying more.

SP Seeks New Coupling Deal

A device for cushioning the coupling of freight cars is being sought by the Southern Pacific to improve service to its shippers. It was made known today in an announcement that the railroad has engaged Stanford Research Institute, Palo Alto, Calif., as consultants on the project.

According to D. J. Russell, president of the railroad, indications are that a form of shock absorber, built into the center sill of new cars and actuated hydraulically, appears to hold the most promise.

He indicated that the action of the hydraulic part of the device, when cars are coupled, would increase the cushioning effect in proportion to the impact on the couplers, thus preventing damage to cars or lading when cars are coupled at speeds in excess of present safe limits.

Russell emphasized, however, that the research is still in the experimental stage. It is part of the railroad's continuing campaign to protect shipments, he said.

Con Artist Now Free Man

NEW YORK (AP) - A suspected confidence man "conned" himself right out of jail yesterday.

James Briggs, 39, arrested last Oct. 15 as a fugitive from grand larceny charges in Newark, N. J., and Detroit, was released yesterday at city prison. Authorities said this is what happened:

The prison keeper received \$500 bail for Herbert Brown, 19, Briggs' cellmate. At 3 a.m. the keeper called out to Brown to get ready to leave.

A few minutes later a voice replied, "Ready." Shortly after a prisoner walked off. It was Briggs.

Officials said they are investigating to determine whether Brown—held on an unlawful entry charge—was asleep at the time or if he let Briggs leave in his place.

Pay As You See T-V Gets Palm Springs Tryout Today

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—Tonight this desert resort will witness the future of the movie industry. At nine o'clock, amidst the usual Hollywood hoopla, Paramount will premiere "Forever Female" at the Plaza Theater in downtown Palm Springs.

At the same time, some 50 to 75 local residents will be able to put \$1.25 into a coin box atop their TV set and see the same picture on their home screen.

The pay-as-you-see TV is operated by Telemeter, of which Paramount owns half. The gadget's sponsors had it as a means of saving the beleaguered film business. They argue that if even a couple of million TV owners would pay \$1 to see a new movie at home, the producers could reap a handsome profit in one night.

Here are some of the questions and answers on the Telemeter test:

Q. Why was Palm Springs chosen?
 A. Mountains block reception from Los Angeles TV stations. So Telemeter ran TV wires into the town, charging an installation and monthly fee for local users. Since TV comes to Palm Springs via wires and not by air, Telemeter can conduct the test without seeking approval by the FCC.

Q. Is Telemeter the only pay TV system?
 A. No. Phoebevision, owned by the Zenith Radio Corp., conducted tests in Chicago in early 1951. Set owners called the telephone company to obtain second-run movies on their screens. Skiatron, which operates by the use of an IBM card, had a test run in New York a year ago.

Q. How does the Telemeter test differ?
 A. It is the first to use new movies.

Q. How does Telemeter work?
 A. A scrambled picture comes over the channel. A "barker" tells the set owner the picture he can see, the stars in it and the price. If the owner wants to see the film, he puts coins in a box atop the set. When the correct amount is inserted, the picture unscrambles. Q. Is the system limited to test telecasts?
 A. No. Other attractions of the 90-day Palm Springs test are pro football games, championship fights and other events. Sponsors also envision quick opens only to one-way light telecasts.
