Charles A. Ballard, AWOL army private, who pleaded guilty to burglary in a Merrill store, was sentenced to not more than five years in Oregon State Prison Saturday by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Defense Attorney George Proctor made a plea for clemency. He spent nine months in the front lines in Korea.

Before passing sentence, Judge Vandenberg cited Ballard's previous criminal record. He pleaded guilty to burglary in Ohio and served a term for involuntary manslaughter in Wyoming.

Ballard told the court he went "over the hill" from an army post because his request to return to Korea had been denied.

Shortly after they drank the beer, a car in which the boys were riding went out of control and crashed into the home of Otto R. Erlanson, 310 North Ninth St.

Police said the boys were very drunk. They were turned over to juvenile authorities.

KF Thefts Admitted By Pair

Two Klamath Falls burglaries were solved Friday when the City Police at Medford picked up two men on suspicion and found loot in their car taken from the Schneider Variety Store on South Sixth Nov. 23. The pair also admitted they attempted unsuccessfully to enter the Hendricks Drug Store here, according to Oregon State Police.

George Burke, 35, and James Edgar Cagle Jr., 43, the latter admittedly an ex-con from Minnesota, were picked up in Medford Thanksgiving evening on suspicion of robbing a drug store in Phoenix, and after considerable questioning admitted they had burglarized seven places of business in Ashland, Phoenix and Medford as well as the two Klamath Falls jobs.

On information received from the valley authorities local state police found the Schneider Variety Store safe a short distance off the Lakeview highway on the road running past the Horton Hereford Ranch.

The door to the safe had been pried open and approximately \$755 belonging to the store was missing. Insurance papers, records and money order blanks were found at the site, as were most of the postage stamps belonging to the Postal department. The variety store is a Post Office sub-station.

An officer of the local state police accompanied by a deputy sheriff drove to Medford yesterday and interrogated the two men held in custody there.

Oregon State Police stated this morning they would ask the district attorney's office to file a fugitive warrant for their arrest.

Car Prowler Draws Term

A 17-year-old youth who completed one year's probation a month ago in Grants Pass after conviction on a car prowling charge, was sentenced to 90 days in the County Jail and fined \$100 on a similar charge Saturday by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

The accused thief, Flanis Dear-dorf, told the court he and another teenager broke into an automobile parked near the Tower Theater and stole a large quantity of merchandise and tools.

"You've only been off probation a month for a similar offense in Grants Pass," Judge Van Vactor pointed out. "There has been a lot of theft from automobiles in Klamath Falls. It's too bad that our citizens can't park their automobiles on the street while they attend the theater without having them broken into."

"Your sentence," the judge continued, "will serve as a warning to other car prowlers."

Truman To Stump For Democrats

CHICAGO (AP) — Former President Truman said Saturday he'll campaign for Democratic candidates in next year's congressional election "if they feel like I can do them any good."

Truman told a news conference he'll let the Democratic national committee decide the extent of his participation in the campaign.

"I won't campaign on my own hook," he declared. He declined to enter into a news conference discussion of his handling of the Harry Dexter White case or comment on Sen. McCarthy's radio - television reply last Tuesday to Truman's defense of his actions with reference to White.

Truman said he wants to take an active role in the elections because he is "grateful" to the Democrats "for what they did for me." He did not elaborate on his plans.

The former President was in Chicago for an informal huddle with Democratic party leaders and to address an Israel bond drive rally at Chicago Stadium.

At the start of his news conference, Truman said, "you can ask any questions you like, ask what you please, but you may not get an answer to some of it."

Immediately, he was asked about the White case. Truman referred his questions to "my speech of Nov. 16 — that will answer your questions."

When reminded that he spoke eight days before the address by McCarthy (R-Wis), Truman answered: "My speech will answer your question as far as I am going to answer it."

Two Jailed In Car Case

The accused and the accuser went to jail Saturday in an automobile theft case. Henry Bellinger, 38, charged with stealing an automobile belonging to Lee Wright, was ordered held for the County Grand Jury by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. Unable to post \$2,000 bail, he was remanded to the County Jail.

Lee Wright, owner of the automobile involved, was sentenced to 10 days in jail for contempt of court. Wright failed to appear at 10 a.m. Saturday when a preliminary hearing was set. When he showed up an hour later, the judge passed sentence on him.

According to Deputy District Attorney Joe Thaholter, Bellinger drove Wright's car to Redding and ditched it when a wheel fell off. He was arrested in Red Bluff and returned here.

Although American officers were not allowed to interview the man, they were inclined to accept the story.
