

New York Papers Still Tied Up In Engravers' Strike; Herald Has Record Run

NEW YORK (AP)—A union membership meeting was called for today in the photo engravers' strike which has closed down six major New York City newspapers, and a union spokesman said none of the three struck afternoon papers could be published today.

The Herald Tribune, the only principal newspaper not affected by the strike, published a streamlined eight-page edition today with a press run estimated to be 2 1/2 million, stepped up from about 360,000.

Eisenhower Preparing For Bermuda

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, back from his thanksgiving holiday and priming for the Big Three parley in Bermuda Dec. 4, huddles today with Secretary of State Dulles on the Soviet's latest cold war move.

The big problem is how to respond to the Russian bid for a meeting with the United States, Britain and France. The bid was regarded as a drive aimed at crumbling the West's planned European defense army—if not Western unity in the bargain.

Eisenhower flew into Washington last night aboard the presidential plane, Columbus from Augusta, Ga., where he had spent a six-day Thanksgiving holiday. The plane had stopped en route at Ft. Benning, Ga., to return Maj. and Mrs. John Eisenhower and their three children to their home.

Polygamy Trial Open In Arizona

KINGMAN, ARIZ. (AP)—Arizona's case against the Short Creek polygamists comes up for its first big test here today.

Twenty-seven of the 96 defendants will appear in Mohave County Superior Court for arraignment. How they plead is expected to reflect the strength of the evidence against them. And it also may determine whether the charges will have to be fought to a final conclusion in the courts.

The 27 are all men. The state contends they are the guiding force in the polygamous movement which has dominated the remote community of Short Creek, astride the Arizona-Utah border, for more than 20 years.

If they plead guilty, cases against the other 69 defendants—7 men and 62 women—may be settled quickly. All have the same attorneys, bigamy, open and notorious cohabitation, contributing to the delinquency of minors and marrying the spouse of another.

Canada Wins Wheat Crown

CHICAGO (AP)—Canada wore the American wheat crown Monday, having won the title back from the United States.

The new wheat king is Fred W. Hallworth of Taber, Alberta, whose "Reward" variety of hard red spring wheat was adjudged best at the International Livestock Exposition Sunday.

Hallworth's victory gave Canada the wheat king title for the 26th time in the 61 years the competition has been held.

Last year's winner was Spencer Dunham of Caro, Mich., and the U.S. also held the title in 1951.

New Camera Takes Picture Deep Inside Hole Or Bore

WASHINGTON (AP)—U. S. Army engineers have developed a camera which can take pictures inside a small hole deep in the ground.

Engineers and others can make use of such underground observation—in planning big construction projects, locating leaks inside pipelines and spotting underground ore formations, for example.

Officials said the camera might even be adapted for taking picture of tissues inside the human body.
