

Atrocities Charged By Americans

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—United States bitterly argued the Communist world in United Nations today for fear-atrocities in Korea and for holding back World War prisoners.

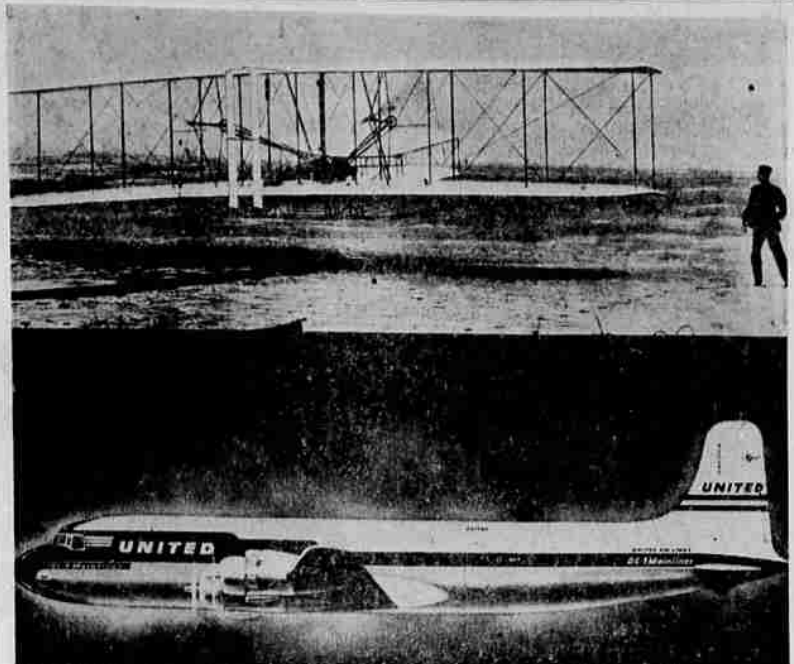
Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., chief U. S. delegate, was prepared to set up the precedent-setting charges with the longest list of his career as head of U. S. delegation, in the full general assembly.

On a second front, South Carolina Gov. James F. Byrnes went to the 60-nation Social Welfare committee for another effort to release German, Italian and Japanese prisoners missing behind Iron Curtain for eight years.

U. N. wants to find out at whether they died in the hands of the Soviets or their satellites.

The U. S. delegation made public here Saturday night part of Defense Department's detailed list of 23,815 alleged cases of atrocities last June 30, including 6,113 American soldiers, more than 5,000 U. N. military personnel, and 64 Korean civilians. The identity of 539 other victims could not be determined, the Americans said.

The United States documents in the Assembly members covered eight incidents involving hundreds of victims. They recited mass murders and beatings, mass killings, burp-gun spraying at short range, buildings fired to burn the survivors alive, live burials, and marches.

Fox Fourth In Gun Meet

RENO (AP)—Rudy Etchen, Sun Valley, Idaho, won the fly section of the \$8,000 annual Reno trap and flyer meet with a six-day total of 146x150.

Etchen beat out 40 other marksmen, including his father, Fred, in the flyer competition which ended Sunday. Fred Etchen tied for second with Ernest Jelley of Kansas City with 142.

Fourth with 141 was Clyde Fox of Merrill, Ore. Dave Frank of Los Angeles was fifth with 140.

Seattle's Arnold Reigger captured the overall trap handicap in a shoot-off with Frank Shablow of Langdon, N.C. They had tied at 673x600.

Gordon Miller of Springfield, Ore., and A. A. Toschi, Reno, won the final two handicap events with identical 99x100. Miller fired from 24 yards and Toschi from 20.

STRENGTHENED
MANILA (AP)—Secretary of the Navy Robert B. Anderson said today American naval bases in the Philippines are being strengthened because the islands are regarded as "exceedingly important to the defense of the United States."

Anderson is on a brief tour of U. S. naval installations in the Far East.

Suicide In Car Found

SALEM (AP)—The body of Waldo J. Hardman, dead from what appeared to be a self-inflicted bullet wound, was found slumped in a car near here Sunday.

Police said he was the principal suspect in the strangulation of his 26-year-old wife. Her partially clad body was found Saturday in a Salem motel.

A statewide search for Hardman, a 37-year-old ex-convict, was launched immediately after the body of the strangled woman was discovered. The two were estranged. She had filed suit for divorce.

The search came to an end early Sunday when Henry Sabry, a Battle Creek, Ore., duck hunter, found Hardman's body in a car parked eight miles south of here.

He apparently had shot himself in the temple with a small caliber pistol.

NW Champs Place Six

PORTLAND (AP)—The College of Idaho, undefeated and untied in football play this season, landed six players on the Northwest Conference all-star team named Saturday. Linfield placed three men on the mythical squad.

Board Of Agriculture To Comply With Patterson's Request On Milk Prices

PORTLAND (AP)—The State Board of Agriculture has agreed to a request by Gov. Paul Patterson to suspend an order which would have increased the price of milk in the Portland area.

The decision was announced Saturday night after chairman Fred H. Cockell polled other members of the board by telephone.

Patterson asked suspension of the order—which would have increased the price of milk 1 cent to 23 cents a quart—because it had been approved at a closed, unannounced meeting.

Cockell said the proposed increase would be reviewed at a public meeting Dec. 15, when "everyone would get a chance to talk."

Two Portland women, Mrs. Frank Taylor, state chairman of the Affiliated Milk Committee, and State Rep. Maurine Neuberger, have announced they will protest the increase.

William S. Weidel, milk marketing administrator, released a statement Saturday in which he said the increase was "necessary to carry out the provisions of the Oregon Milk Marketing Act."

Tug Takes Off On Own In Bay

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The 45-foot tugboat Pabco made a wild dash for the Golden Gate and the open sea yesterday—leaving its startled crew behind.

Tug operator Carl Holmes and his engineer had left the boat and were aboard a barge it had been towing. The barge was tied up to pier 37 and the Pabco was tied to the barge.

Then the adventuresome, 16-ton tugboat slipped its mooring line and, its rudder hard over, headed toward the Golden Gate. Holmes notified the Coast Guard and the cutter Calumet took off in hot pursuit.

Coast Guardsman Billy Thomas of Stockton, Calif., leaped from the cutter's deck to the tug and switched off its engine.
