**WALL STREET**  
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market continued its rally Monday with rising prices found in all sections of the list.

Friday's advance was the strongest of the month, and that forward momentum carried through Monday.

Prices were up between 1 and 2 points at the best. There were relatively few losers and declines of a point were rare.

Volume expanded on the rise and came to an estimated 1,900,000 shares, one of the better days of this year. Friday's total was 1,600,000 shares.

## Portland Has More Rain

**PORTLAND (AP) —** More rain fell Monday as one of the wettest Novembers in recent years finally came to an end.

Torrential rains reached their peak a week ago, starting floods in coastal streams and the Willamette Valley. Mapleton, near the coast in Lane County, had nearly 10 inches of rain that weekend.

All rivers were back within their banks before the week was out, though. The Weather Bureau reported all streams normal Monday.

Some sections of the state escaped abnormal rainfall. In Portland, for example, the total for the month has been 6 1/2 inches, about a quarter-inch more than in the average November.

## CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

**CHICAGO (AP) —** Hog prices dropped Monday as the heaviest run since mid-January hit the market. Salable receipts totaled 17,000 head against 12,000 a week ago.

Similar expansion was shown at other markets.

In view of the large arrivals, a natural result of last week's soaring markets, the price structure did not display unusual weakness.

Barrows and gilts lost 25 to 50 cents while sows were off 50 cents. Top was \$23.50.

Salable cattle receipts of 19,000 were in line with expectations but there was a substantial carryover from last week's drab market.

In a slow trade steers held steady while heifers were steady to 50 cents higher. Other sections of the cattle trade held up well. Top was week's high, for prime steers.

Slaughter lambs, yearlings and sheep held steady in a moderately active trade. Good to prime slaughter lambs sold at \$18.00 to \$21.00.

Other salable receipts were estimated at 700 calves and 3,500 sheep.

An advance in soybean meal to \$71 on against \$70 late last week spurred some of the late buying in soybeans.

## Oregon Youths Win In 4-H Convention At Chicago

**CHICAGO (AP) —** Two Oregon youths won scholarships at the 4-H convention here over the weekend. Joan Karnes, 18, Orengo, won a \$300 scholarship, donated by the Ford Motor Co., for achievement. Harold Seely, 17, Hubbard, won a \$300 scholarship presented by the International Harvester Co. Seely was winner of one of six national crop awards.

Janet Babcock, 16, Hillsboro, who won a trip to the 4-H Congress, has been in 4-H work five years. She selected cheese souffle as her dairy foods demonstration. It is a year, and convinced county and state judges that it is easy to make, contains several nourishing dairy products, and is a delight to eat.

She received a gold wrist watch and competed for grand champion in all home economics demonstrations. A knowledge of dairy foods helped her in menu judging at the county fair, where she was high individual in cooking judging.

Miss Karnes has been in 4-H work nine years. She has made an exceptional record in all of her 41 projects, stressing the home economics program, with outstanding work in cooking. In addition, her Duroc Jersey pig, "Sunie," took first place at County and State Fairs, and "Gus," another porker, was grand champion at the state fair.

With \$20 she completely decorated her bedroom, and her National Home Improvement record won a trip to the 1950 National 4-H Congress where she was the youngest national winner. Joan won the title of Oregon 4-H Queen and the Plummer scholarship at the Pacific International, was named the outstanding girl in Washington County 4-H, and received a \$350 Standard Oil of California scholarship, besides innumerable county and state awards for other homemaking projects. For the past year Joan has led two cooking clubs—one in Orengo and another in Hillsboro.

Young Seely for four years conducted a corn project which he increased to 2 1/2 acres the past year to supply more feed for his sheep and other stock. His corn yield has averaged 75 bushels per acre over the time due to practice of good cultural methods, use of a good hybrid variety of seed and fertilizer. He uses a mixed fertilizer which has increased his yield 20 bushels per acre. The past year he also grew small acreages of wheat, oats and barley on which he kept records of hours spent in the various tractor and machine operations, and also fuel costs. He has been an active participant in judging and demonstrations, was a member of the champion crop demonstration team at the last Pacific International Exposition. He is assistant to the adult leader, Carl Johnk.
