Farm Aide Speaks Up For Surplus

WASHINGTON — Undersecretary of Agriculture True D. Morse said Monday current farm surplus should be dealt with as "opportunities" and not as "problems."

"We should be thankful," he said, "that we have this abundance — rather than the hunger and meager existence that plagues three-fourths of the world's population."

In a speech prepared for a convention of the Southern Seedmen's Assn., the farm official said surplus stands as a challenge to management.

"Leadership needs frankly to admit failure to the extent that it fails to successfully move abundant production into use when there are unsatisfied needs in the United States and around the world."

Morse said the Eisenhower administration, with the help and guidance of farmers, their leaders and educators, will submit to Congress "solid and approved recommendations for improved governmental farm programs" to deal with surpluses and farm price and income problems.

"We now have the opportunity and the prospect of seeing farm programs redirected down a solid path of progress," he said.

There were reliable reports in Washington that the administration will propose no brand new ways of dealing with the farm situation. One reason may be that some farm leaders and members of Congress, including Republicans, have not seen eye to eye with Secretary of Agriculture Benson's criticism of present farm programs.

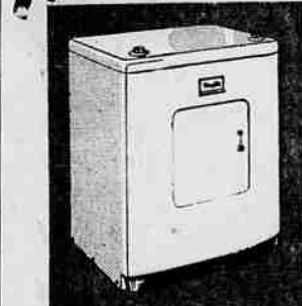
It is reported that the administration would advocate a parity standard written into law during the Truman administration but not yet used for many products because Congress postponed it for major crops until 1956.

Parity is a price deemed by law to be fair to farmers in terms of prices they pay for the things that go into farm production.

The new parity formula would provide lower price standards for a number of crops, higher ones for some livestock and livestock products.

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Calif. Demos Plan Attack

FRESNO, Calif. — Democratic hopes of ending a long California losing streak in the 1954 elections rested Monday in a new federation of Democratic clubs.

More than 700 delegates representing an estimated 15,000 party members founded the California Democratic Council at a weekend meeting intended to unify campaign and money-raising activities.

The plan calls for pre-primary endorsement of Democratic candidates for partisan office for the first time since 1926.

Paul Ziffren, Beverly Hills, Democratic national committeeman, hailed it as "a fascinating experiment in 20th century democracy."

But the harmony theme by Ziffren and other leaders was marred by a dispute over how far to go in an anti-Communist stand.

A "short form" which made no mention of Communism was rejected, 278 to 159. Instead, the council approved a policy declaration including:

"The Democratic Party is dedicated to a program calculated to secure the United States from enemies of our constitutional freedoms and responsibilities, whether these enemies appear in the form of Communism or any other totalitarian threat."

Three persons died in Oregon over the weekend from injuries suffered in traffic accidents.

Bud Lemons, about 44, of Mt. View, Ore., was killed outright Saturday night when he was struck by a car as he walked along a highway near his Eastern Oregon home. Sheriff Robert Domon identified the driver of the car as Marjorie Holland, a student at the University of Oregon. She was not held.

Mrs. Raymond L. Zwellman, 28, Vancouver, Wash., died at a Portland hospital Sunday from injuries suffered in a two-car collision in Portland last Thursday. Ten persons were hurt, four of them seriously, in the accident.

Franklin O. Parker, 19, Willamette University student from Newport, died Saturday from injuries suffered Wednesday in a collision near Grand Ronde. He was the third person to die from hurts suffered in the mishap.
