

Ho-China Peace Offer Study

A reported offer by rebel leader Ho Chi Minh to negotiate for an Indo-China truce set new fires burning under the hard-pressed French Premier Laniel.

The reported statement, published yesterday in the Stockholm Express, touched off a furious resistance among Communist nationalists in the Indo-Chinese capital, Hanoi. Many demanded a break with France.

It also was expected to rally support to strong segments of political and public opinion have demanded a quick end to the costly, seven-year, Far East conflict.

previously had said any negotiations must be preceded by the Vietnam, used to be by name, but privately they said the armistice suggestion "can't do that to us." It condemns to death thousands of Vietnamese and Bao Dai.

Stubborn Woman Finishes Fifth Month In Jail On Contempt Count; Will Stay

CARLSBAD, N. M. (AP)—A stubborn little woman with a firm belief in her own rights has finished her fifth month in a jail cell.

"And I'll stay here," says Mrs. Frances Supina, "until I get justice."

Mrs. Supina absolutely refuses to pay a \$1,000 fine for contempt of court.

Her neighbors on swank Riverside drive here complained that she was renting a garage apartment in violation of a restrictive covenant in her deed. District Court ordered her to stop.

She refused, contending she was letting a displaced couple use the apartment in return for work and was charging no rent. A fine of \$1,000 was levied for contempt.

Last July 6 she entered the county jail after refusing to pay.

A few days later, seven friends came forward with the money. She again refused.

"Justice is what I want . . . to clear my name," she said.

Embarrassed local officials didn't know what to do. She has to stay in jail until the fine is paid or until the judge is overruled.

Smiling grimly, Mrs. Supina promised that if he didn't act she'd take it to a higher court.

Mrs. Supina is 51 years old. She appears to be in good health, although she left jail for three weeks when she was hospitalized with a stomach ailment.

"When I first went to jail I weighed 138," she said, "but I'm now down to 114."

She complains that jail food doesn't agree with her, and that she recently had a case of trench mouth.

"My time in jail has been well spent, though," she says.

"I'm rereading the Bible—and I'm getting quite an education talking to my fellow prisoners."

The Ways and Means subcommittee, in the fourth installment today of a final report on two years of investigating tax fraud and irregularities, recommended:

1. Enactment of changes in the internal revenue code to curb authority of the secretary of the Treasury over actual administration of the tax laws to "prevent political meddling in the future."

2. Giving the internal revenue commissioner direct authority over tax collections in all matters not involving national fiscal policy.

The report observed: "Corruption, of course, is possible at any level of government, but political influence conceivably would be less strongly felt by career employees of the bureau than by politically appointed Treasury officials."

"If the Treasury no longer has ultimate control over personnel questions or like matters personally affecting bureau employees, Treasury officials will possess less power to influence what should be impartial administrative decisions in the bureau."

Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey announced Nov. 19 that he had delegated full authority to the Internal Revenue Service for handling individual tax cases, while reserving policy decisions to the Treasury. He said it will cut duplication and delay.

This handing down of power, accomplished gradually, gives Internal Revenue Commissioner T. Coleman Andrews authority to make final agreements on tax disputes, among other things.

The subcommittee referred to its public hearings at which witnesses testified that Treasury officials intervened in individual cases. This, the report said, was "indicative of the abuses which can flow from Treasury control of the decision-making processes in tax cases."

In each case, it said, "the power of Treasury officials was exerted to bestow a special benefit on the taxpayer."

"To terminate the authority of Treasury officials over tax administration would prevent recurrence of such improprieties."

The subcommittee said it had no specific legislation to offer at this time.

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Telemeter Subscribers Get "The Moon Is Blue"

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—If you were a Telemeter subscriber here, you could put \$1 in your TV coin box and see "The Moon Is Blue" on your home screen tonight.

The citizens of this sunny resort are taking part in an experiment which could change the whole course of American entertainment.

Telemeter, of which Paramount owns 50 per cent, has plunked down \$750,000 in an attempt to prove that pay-as-you-see TV is economically sound.

So far only 70 of this town's 1,851 souls are equipped with Telemeter. By putting a certain amount of coins in a little machine on their TV sets, they can see the latest movies and events like the USC Notre Dame football game, which started the service Saturday.

Telemeter reports that 80 per cent of the town's 500 set owners have asked for the coin box. They will be installed at the rate of 50 a week.

Watching TV here is not cheap. Telemeter brought TV here via wire. Set owners are charged for a cable to their homes, plus \$5 a month. A range of mountains blocks direct reception of telecasts from Los Angeles. Telemeter subscribers pay \$21.75 to have a coin box installed and must take a minimum of \$3 monthly in pay programs.

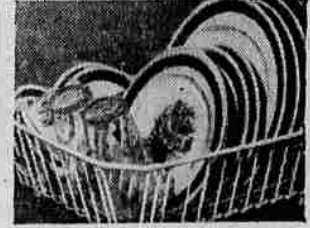
