

Corporation Tax Payment Figure Down

WASHINGTON (AP)—A sharp drop in corporation tax payments is holding federal revenue collections below last year's rate, Internal Service figures showed today.

The service said corporation income and profits taxes amounted to \$1,787,000,000 in September, compared with \$2,744,000,000 since the fiscal year began July 1—about one billion dollars below the like period last year.

Individual income and employment taxes—the biggest item in government income—were up slightly in September, \$2,933,000,000 as against \$1,970,000,000 in September 1952.

Sudan-Egypt Merger Gains

CAIRO, Sudan (AP)—Parties urging unification of the Sudan with Egypt won a decisive victory in the election of a lower house of Parliament, nearly final returns showed Monday.

In Cairo, President Mohamed Naguib told all Sudanese to be on guard against possible moves by a "cunning imperialistic power." He called no names, but obviously referred to Britain, which has been the strong partner in the joint British-Egyptian rule of the vast cotton-rich territory of the upper Nile.

He expressed the view also that with Sudanese elections out of the way, a solution to British-Egyptian differences over Suez would be "stepped up."

In London, the British Foreign Office said the election was "an important step in the Sudan's progress toward self-government and self-determination." A Foreign Office spokesman declared this had been British policy for many years.

Mossadegh Ends Strike

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Ex-Premier Mohammed Mossadegh ended his second hunger strike Sunday. Each was of the same duration—overnight.

His latest threat came Saturday when the military court trying him on treason charges tried to make the aged former dictator confine his defense dissertation at that point to the charge that he ordered statues of the Shah pulled down two days before the Aug. 19 revolution which swept the Nationalist Premier out of power.

Announcing he'd eat no more, Mossadegh shouted, "I'll be dead in three days!" But Sunday he filled up on a big chicken dinner and returned to court for the 18th day of his trial.

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Royal Pair Aboard Ship

BALBOA, C.Z. (AP)—World-touring Queen Elizabeth II and her entourage headed westward into the Pacific Monday aboard the 15,000-ton cargo-passenger ship Gothic after a one-day stop in Panama and the Canal Zone.

The young monarch and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, bustled Sunday through a crowded schedule of receptions, tours and ceremonies arranged by Panama and U.S. officials while the Gothic passed through the canal from the Atlantic side.

The occasion marked the Queen's only visit under the American flag on her six-month tour of Commonwealth nations and British territories and protectorates.

The cargo-laden Gothic will steam about 3,500 miles with the royal party before a two-day stopover Dec. 17 at Suva in the Fiji Islands. It will touch again at Tonga on Dec. 20 and arrive Dec. 23 in time for Christmas — at Auckland, New Zealand. The queen next will spend nearly two months in Australia.

Nixon In New Delhi

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Vice President Nixon arrived in New Delhi Monday for informal talks with Prime Minister Nehru.

Questioners in Parliament tried in vain to pin down Nehru on whether he would take up with Nixon the hot issue of possible American military aid to Pakistan.

The official attitude of the Indian government toward Nixon appeared to be cool but correct. Cabinet ministers made no secret of their lack of enthusiasm for the visit of the globe-girdling American vice president. India's press mirrored the ministers' attitude.

Nixon, his wife and their party came by plane from Bangalore in southern India. Nixon's arrival in Madras Sunday was the first prominence given him by Indian newspapers on his tour.

They'll Still Be Doing It In 1980

DETROIT (AP)—Chris Martin, 69, looked at the letter he had written the postmaster general today. It was marked "mail early for Christmas" and announced his retirement as a mailman after 41 years.

Then he grinned, and said: "Folks were late with their Christmas mailing in 1911, they'll be late in 1953, and I guess they'll be late in 1980."

Girl Wins Chance Of World Trip

CHICAGO (AP)—A 23-year-old advertising copywriter, picked because she is a "typical American girl" and inexperienced in air travel, will try to circle the globe by commercial air lines in record time.

Miss Pam Martin told newsmen yesterday she expects to cover 21,878 miles in 91 hours and 25 minutes, starting east from Midway Airport at noon Friday. She was chosen by J. Stuart Rotchford, general manager of Journey's International-Happiness Tours.

Miss Martin's schedule, if followed, would beat the present record by 7 hours and 51 minutes.

When her mother, Mrs. Ida Martin of Albuquerque, N. M., was informed by telephone, she told her daughter, "Please be careful, and don't speak to any strange men."
