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Judge Rules Car Theft Case Out

Trial of Lorenzo Secor, accused auto thief, was abruptly halted Monday afternoon in Circuit Court and the case was dismissed.

Judge David R. Vandenberg sustained a motion by Defense Attorney George Proctor for dismissal on grounds that the district attorney's information did not contain sufficient facts to constitute a crime.

Secor originally pleaded guilty to larceny by bailer. Under questioning by Judge Vandenberg it developed that the car he was supposed to have stolen had been loaned to him by the owner.

Judge Vandenberg set aside the guilty plea and advised Secor to consult an attorney. Later Secor pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Erwin Edwards, owner of the automobile involved in the case, was testifying for the prosecution when Proctor offered his motion to dismiss. After hearing arguments by District Attorney Frank Alderson and Proctor, Judge Vandenberg ruled for the defendant. He excused the jury and ordered Secor released from custody.

Also before Judge Vandenberg Monday afternoon was Richard Harding Poyser, accused of passing a spurious check at Emil's Market. Poyser was charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. On a motion of District At-

torney Alderson, that charge was dismissed. A new information was filed accusing Poyser of writing a check with insufficient funds. He pleaded guilty. Judge Vandenberg set Saturday for passing sentence.

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Bridge Grid Makes U. S. Magazine

Klamath Falls made the national press in the December issue of Nation's Business, official publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

In an article by Wilfred Owen, "Highways Win Their Cold War," there appears across a full page, a picture of the highway underpass entering Klamath Falls which carried a hot grid beneath the pavement to free that eight per cent grade of snow and ice in winter.

Owen remarks that of the 54 million motor vehicles on the road this winter, about 40 million will be running into snow and ice. "Snow and ice," he states, "are likely to cripple transportation by highway almost everywhere in the United States with the exception of southern California and Florida and the southwestern part of Arizona. Along the western slopes of the Cascade and Sierra Nevada ranges, 60 feet a year is not unusual. Even some parts of the south have snow-blocked roads to contend with."

Our Eastern neighbors who consider winter a hazard in the high desert may read that the Elkins area of West Virginia "sees more snow than Fairbanks, Alaska. . . and the cold winters of North Dakota give Bismarck drivers only about one more inch of snow to worry about than the driver who ventures forth in New York City."
