

Police Check Statement Of Carl Hall

ST. LOUIS (AP)—St. Louis police officials today began checking a signed death row statement by kidnaper Carl Austin Hall to see if any new leads could be found to the missing \$303,720 Greenleaf ransom money.

After Hall and his partner in crime, Bonnie Brown Healy, were quizzed for more than four hours in their state prison cells yesterday, St. Louis Circuit City, Edward L. Dowd said their statements might prove to be the basis for future prosecution in the case.

Dowd and Police Chief Jeremiah O'Connell conducted the questioning at Jefferson City with the permission of federal authorities.

"The interviews," Dowd said, "were well worth the time" and could be used if the state decides later someone should be prosecuted in the mystery of the missing money. Less than \$300,000 was recovered with the kidnaper's arrest here.

Hall's confession, read at his Kansas City trial, said he had about \$52,000 of the \$600,000 ransom when arrested here Oct. 6.

Dowd and O'Connell, when they sought permission to question the pair, said they wanted to check the confession with statements made at a police inquiry into circumstances surrounding the arrest.

They said the statement would be compared with previous testimony given by former Police Lt. Louis Shoulters and Patrolman Elmer Dolan, who made the arrest, and cab driver John Hager, whose tip led to the arrest.

Auto Theft Plea Made

TULELAKE — A 1951 Mercury sedan, stolen and wrecked, put Jim Helton, 32, behind bars last night.

Helton, a laborer, father of four young children, gave himself up to officers and admitted taking the vehicle owned by R. C. Haynes, driving it from the business district to a spot 1/2 mile west of Hatfield on the state line where he lost control and demolished it. The car was taken Sunday night about 9:30.

Helton pled guilty in district court this morning before Judge Victoria Thaler and was bound over to superior court at Yreka, where the charge of auto theft carries a maximum penalty of five years.

Hassle Busts Up Tavern

No arrests were made following a hassle about 2 a.m. this morning at the Chuck Wagon, 630 Main, participated in by three Portland men and eight Klamath Falls residents.

Aside from cuts and bruises by all members in the Donnybrook, Cecil Beardon, bartender of the Klamath Billiards, was the only member requiring a physician's care. He was taken to the Klamath Valley Hospital suffering head injuries and is still under a physician's care this morning.

What started the altercation could not be learned but according to investigating officers, chairs, stools, flower pots and beer bottles were the main weapons used in the melee, which did considerable damage to the interior of the building.

Short Creek Men Plead Guilty

KINGMAN, Ariz. (AP)—The 27 purported leaders of the Short Creek multiple marriage cult will be sentenced Monday for conspiracy.

They pleaded guilty yesterday—just four months after a police force set up martial law in Short Creek on the Arizona-Utah border, and rounded up the tiny community's men, women and children.

Charges of conspiracy were dropped against 69 other defendants, all but seven of whom are women.

Oregon 4-H Youths Win Top Awards

CHICAGO (AP)—Two more Oregon youngsters won awards for accomplishments at the 4-H Club Congress here.

Doreen Bohmert, 17, Central Point, was selected one of the top winners in the meat animal program sponsored by packer Thomas E. Wilson.

Donna Pierson, 15, Hood River, won an award for beautification of home grounds. The award was sponsored by Mrs. Charles R. Walker, Chicago.

Miss Bohmert in 1945 got an honorable mention at her first fair. She raised six fat hogs from 1945 to 1948, and began raising cattle, starting with a Hereford heifer and two choice steers. As her sister had made a good start in financing her way through college, Doreen decided to try it by using her sister's profits on buy heifers and start a breeding herd. Within a few years she was on her way, aided by the sale of a bull for \$1,175. Her 1953 holdings were seven heifers of her own breeding and 18 females in all, plus six steers.

Miss Pierson, a 7-year 4-H'er, planted the lawn, trees, shrubbery, and the flower garden with 18 varieties of flowers around her home. She built a sidewalk for the front entrance and a lattice for roses. She also helped her father trim an oak tree. Donna was champion on her home beautification exhibit at the county and state fairs and won blue ribbons for her landscaping demonstration, flower arrangement, and flower judging.

Chief Pledges Grog Checkup

CHILQUIN — Lewis Jones, Chilquin chief of police will crack down hard on all future persons involved in the sale of liquor, to minors, according to a statement made by the chief following arrest of Mrs. Grace Lalo of the Chilquin area, arrested Monday, Nov. 30, charged with selling three fifths of whiskey and a case of beer to two young girls, aged 13 and 15.

Mrs. Lalo, a housewife pled guilty to the charge before Justice of the Peace Walter Zimmerman in Wood River justice court. She was fined \$100 and 60 days in jail. This is the first conviction on a charge of sale to minors in many months.

Officer McInnis of the state liquor commission assisted Zimmerman with the prosecution.

Robbery Told Here

Rudy Carlson, 28, 2225 Vine, a professional prize fighter who has appeared in the ring here on numerous occasions was the victim of a strong-arm robbery shortly before midnight Monday, according to city police.

Carlson told police he was on his way home when he was jumped from behind by an assailant, knocked out with a blow over the right eye and robbed of his wallet containing \$18 in cash, driver's license and a professional fighter's card.

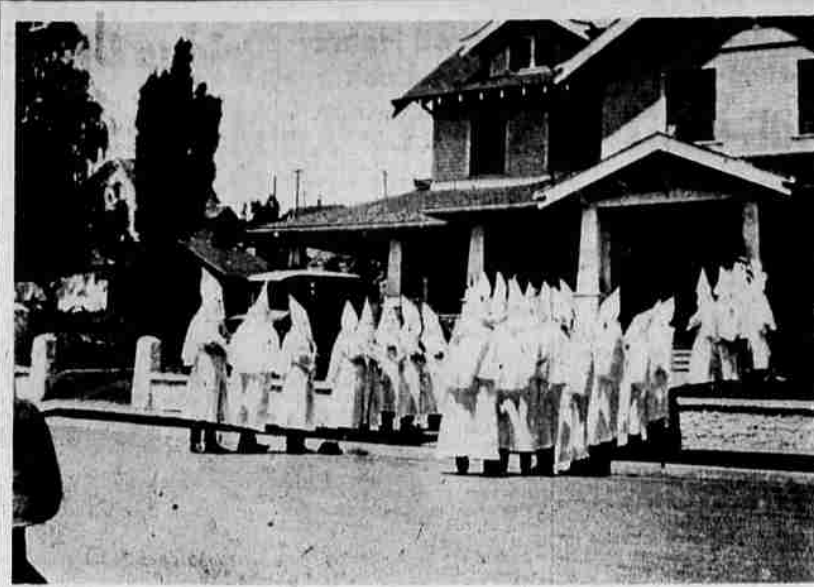
The assault occurred on Oak Street near the Southern Pacific garbage disposal unit.

Farm Produce Cut Feared

CHICAGO (AP)—An over-all reduction in farm output, says Secretary of Agriculture Benson, "can have terrific repercussions in our entire economy."

The effects of reduced agricultural output, Benson said Monday night in criticizing current federal farm programs, do not stop with the producer.

"The number of people who earn all or part of their daily living through transporting, processing, packaging and merchandising of products of our farms exceed those actually engaged in agriculture itself."

The Republican farm chief, speaking to 1,300 delegates at the annual national 4-H Club Congress promised that the Eisenhower administration will offer to Congress proposals for an improved farm program.

These, he said, "will help farmers gain full parity of price and income in our market places—rather than some fraction of parity in a government warehouse," as well as enlarged markets.

Anderson told the President that the government should fence the canal since private property owners were unable to fence it because the canal is on federal property.

Anderson, who has a wife and two daughters, said he is looking for a job but hopes later to continue his studies toward a master's degree.

He attended San Diego State College under the GI bill while in California.

AT&T To Build Longest Underwater Voice Cable Between America, England

NEW YORK (AP)—American Telephone & Telegraph Co. Tuesday announced plans to construct the first transatlantic cable system across the Atlantic Ocean at a cost of 35 million dollars. It will be by far the longest undersea voice cable in the world and the first laid at depths found in mid-ocean.

The longlines department of AT&T said developmental and research work on such a cable has been going on for 25 years. The project will take 2 1/2 years to complete.

The cable will not carry television. An agreement has been made for construction of the cable by AT&T, The British Post Office, which provides telegraph service in Great Britain, and the Canadian Overseas Telecommunications Corp. The cable will be jointly owned by these three companies.

J. C. Penney Plans Bonus For Workers

NEW YORK — J. C. Penney Company, nation-wide department store organization, announced today that its directors have authorized a special year-end payment for more than 60,000 associates in the company's 1,633 stores, offices and warehouses throughout the United States.

The payment will be an amount equal to two weeks' pay for all fulltime associates who have been employed for the full year 1953, and part-time associates and those employed less than a year.

All Penney associates will share in the payment except management staff members whose earnings are determined largely by the company's long-standing profit-sharing plan. It will be made Dec. 15 at each associate's Dec. 15 rate of pay.

Coon Back In America

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Ernest Coon (R-Ore) and two other members of a House appropriations subcommittee arrived here today from Honolulu on the heels of a world inspection tour.

Rep. Frank T. Bow, subcommittee chairman, said the group inspected American installations in England, Europe, Egypt, the Philippines, Asia, Japan and the South Pacific. He said the committee's report may result in U. S. spending more to enable this country to compete for foreign property which it has lost.

Bow said that the group's tour in the Far East paralleled that of Vice President Nixon. The president is doing a major job, and has been very successful," Bow said.
