

New York Papers Still Struck; Publishers Stand Firm; Pay Off for Idled

NEW YORK (AP)—Publishers have rejected a proposal to cut wages by 10 percent, and the city's newspaper union today went into its sixth day of strike.

The newspapers' action, union membership meeting had rejected a proposal by the publishers for arbitration of four dead-end issues, including wages and working conditions.

Progress was made today. Federal Mediator Frank Brown said representatives of the six struck newspapers turned in a proposal by Local 1 of the International Photoengravers union for a package increase of 10 percent.

He added that the publishers, represented by the Publishers Assn. of New York, made no new proposal.

William Mapel, president of the publishers group, told newsmen "we've made our offer." By the publishers had offered the strike of 400 photoengravers started last Saturday.

The strike has left New York's major city newspaper out of the first time. A total circulation of almost 5 1/2 million has been cut.

The Herald Tribune suspended circulation Monday night in sympathy with the other publishers, as not struck because its photoengraving is done by a commercial company.

Lack of newspaper advertising caused department store Christmas shopping to fall off.

The strike was stopped last night for the 20,000-odd employees of the six struck newspapers whose union is honoring the photoengravers' picket lines forced the papers to close.

The Herald Tribune, which has been going through the motions of cutting together, is continuing regular pay.

Struck papers are the Times, Daily News, Daily Mirror, World-Telegram and The Sun, Journal-American and Post.

They could have continued publication without their photoengravers, who make metal plates for reproduction of pictures and illustrations, but refusal of members of mechanical, craft and editorial-business office unions to cross picket lines forced closing.

The publishers issued a statement last night that nonstriking employees, most of whom belong to unions, were dropped from the payroll until they return to work.

The announcement said in part: "There will be no pay for those for whom there is no work. This is not a notice of termination of employment... affecting accrued benefits or other rights, and must not be construed as such. It is only notice of a temporary period during which there is no work to be performed until normal operations are resumed."

Saying the refusal of nonstriking to cross the photoengravers' picket lines was a violation of other unions' contracts with the newspapers, the statement continued: "The general action which followed on the part of all the other unions was in every case a violation of an existing contract. It also appears to have resulted from concerted action by all these unions in influencing, persuading or instructing their members not to report for work at all papers concerned."

Denis M. Burke, president of the striking photoengravers union local, said union negotiators had authority to call off the strike without a membership vote if the publishers agreed to the union's \$7.50-a-week package proposal.

The union said the \$7.50 proposal, scaled down from \$15, would be a combination of improvements including increased wages, shorter hours, more holidays and increased welfare benefits.

Klamath Was Warm and Wet

It was warmer and wetter than usual in Klamath Falls during November according to figures released today by the Bureau of Reclamation.

Total precipitation for the month was 2.66 inches as compared with a normal of 1.72 and only 0.78 last year in the same month. Most

precipitation for any 24-hour period was on the 23rd when it rained 1.25 inches.

The mean monthly temperature was a warm 41.7 as compared to 35.1 last year and an average of 38.4. Warmest November day was the 8th with a high of 62, and the

coldest was ten days later with a low of 21.

There was one clear day in the month, eight were labeled as partly cloudy and 21 days drew a listing as cloudy.

Reservoir figures show Upper Klamath with 282,900 acre feet as

compared to 239,900 feet last year at this same time. Gerber has 80,750 acre feet against a 1952 reading of 38,900 and Clear Lake is busting out at the seams with 238,640 acre feet as compared to only 190,050 feet in November of 1952.

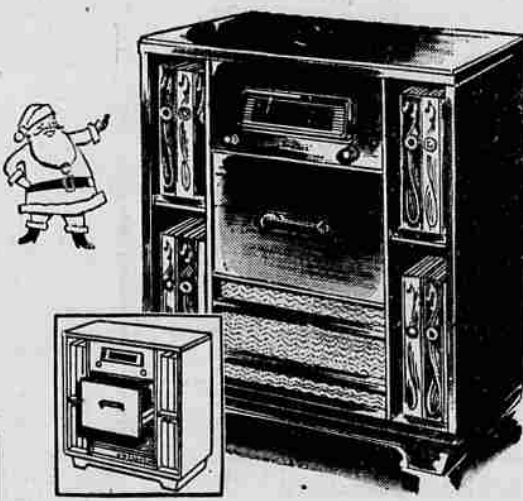
