CHICAGO LIVESTOCK
CHICAGO (AP) — Hogs skirted to new highs on the current upward move in early trading Thursday but much of the gain was lost before all the supply was cleaned up.
Butchers gained about 25 cents while hogs jumped 25 to 30 cents. One load of choice butchers brought \$24.50, another new high for any December since 1947.
All types of steers and heifers moved at firm prices. However, cows and bulls declined. Most good and choice steers sold at \$19.00 to \$25.00. Most good and choice wooled slaughter lambs went at \$17.00 to \$19.50.
Salable receipts were estimated at 10,000 hogs, 3,500 cattle, 500 calves and 2,000 sheep.

Let's close this piece with the case of the Clackamas county (Oregon) dairyman who persists in selling whole milk in gallon jugs to people who come for it with cash in their hands (price, 70c per gallon). His dairy is described as shiningly sanitary. He objects to selling his milk subject to the rules of the Oregon milk control board, and explains:

"If I did that, I would have to standardize my milk down to about 3.5 or 3.8 per cent butterfat. It's around 5 per cent as it comes from the cow. If I had to standardize, I would separate the milk, sell the surplus cream to the creamery, which would churn it into butter and sell the butter to the government, which would dump it in the ocean. The way I'm doing it now, there's no surplus."

If you can put the case against regimentation any more succinctly than that, you're good.

Prowler In Area Sought By Police

Despite frequent warnings by police authorities to home owners to lock their doors there is still an amazing amount of prowling going on, according to Chief of Police Orville Hamilton.

A number of the prowls appear to be the work of one man who follows the same routine.

Entering unlocked apartments and homes, apparently after "casual" the place to be sure the man of the house is gone, the prowler has in a couple of instances attempted to molest women in their bedrooms.

In one instance after awakening the lady of the house as he entered her bedroom, the culprit attempted to grab her purse as her screams frightened him off.

According to reports these prowls have taken place in different sections of the city and nothing has been reported missing from these homes, however in a couple of instances it was reported the man had a knife in his hand when scared away.

No description of the man is available as, following his routine, he generally appears around midnight after the women have retired, enters through unlocked doors and does not turn on lights.

A warning to be aware of men in cars was also issued by Hamilton, who stated recently a man in a car stopped beside the curb and asked a woman if she could direct him to a certain street, she approached the car to make her heard, whereupon the man grabbed her by the coat collar and attempted to pull her into the automobile. Tearing herself loose she ran the short distance home and called police.

City police have investigated all the cases, Chief Hamilton asserted, but in the time necessary for the prowler car to reach the scene the anonymous offender made his getaway and was probably several blocks away.

Rats Attacks Children

SPOKANE (AP) — Two Spokane children asleep in their beds were bitten on the face and hands by rats recently city health officials disclosed Wednesday. Both youngsters have recovered.

Steven Leroy Van Buskirk, 2, and his 3-year-old sister Dixie Ellen, were treated promptly by a physician and show no ill effects. Steven was bitten on the nose and a few days later his sister was bitten through the cheek and on the chin.

Spud Growers Tell Views

The Oregon-California Potato Administrative Committee has always made an honest endeavor to administer a sound program for marketing potatoes, according to Merrill R. Webb, manager of this committee. Their ultimate decision as to minimum grade and size regulations for each marketing year is largely determined by the recommendations they receive from individual growers and growers organizations.

At the beginning of this marketing year provisions were made to allow legitimate feeders from outside the area to purchase culls for livestock feed. However, evidence submitted to this committee indicates that this privilege has been abused and that in a few instances culls purchased for livestock feed have been diverted to fresh use in competition with commercially packed table stock.

To prevent a recurrence of this wrong use of cull potatoes, the committee has recommended to the Secretary of Agriculture to restrict cull potatoes for livestock to the producing area. Producing areas mean Jefferson, Crook, Deschutes, Lake and Klamath counties in Oregon and Siskiyou and Modoc counties in California.

This regulation becomes effective at 12:01 a.m. Dec. 4, 1936 and will remain in effect until July 1, 1954, and during this period there shall be no shipment of culls for livestock feed from the producing area.

Any grower who markets his own potatoes, including the sale of culls

Here's Advice On Yule Trees

SALEM (AP) — The State Forestry Department has this advice for the thousands of Oregon residents who cut their own Christmas trees:

1. Get the landowner's permission before cutting from private or public property.
2. Don't cut your tree close to the road.
3. Don't cut all the trees in one patch.
4. Don't cut the top from a big tree.
5. When you cut a tree, leave a branch or two on the stump. A branch will develop into another tree.
6. Don't waste any trees.

Commercial tree cutters have to get harvesting permits.

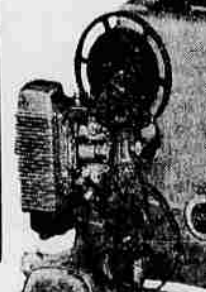
