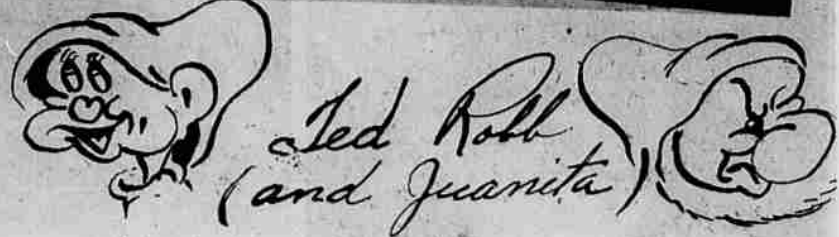


"Magic Doorways"

In color, they added a professional touch rarely available to youth organizations.

Robb was with Disney during the three years Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs was in production. At present he is with Baraboo Electric, where George Boudon is also employed. By trade he says he is an electrician; "incidentally" freelances in art. He started at an early age to draw, and the few lessons he had are not worth mentioning. Actually self-taught, his art work is just a natural expression of inherent talent. His childhood was spent in Arizona and he looks like a westerner—his first hand knowledge of the West led to repeated assignments to do the poster work for various rodeos. His wife, Juanita, is from the East; and looking at her fair

skin with sharply contrasting dark hair and blue-green eyes, and slim figure, it's easy to imagine her singing in the Waldorf-Astoria—which is what she did, before coming west. It so happens, that Ted Robb has a cousin, Juanita, also Robb, who is also an artist; and illustrated a book authored by her father, Harry Robb, titled "The Poddy Calf." The Robbs are sold on Klamath Falls, and they and their sons Gary, four, and Teddy, one and one-half, live at 4818 So. 6th Street, expect to be integral factors in the community. (Ed.
