PORTLAND (AP)—Utah State made a clean sweep Saturday night of a two-game intercollegiate basketball series with Portland University, winning the clincher, 94-78.  
The invaders from Logan cashed in on 20 straight points from the free throw line plus 19 field goals out of 44 attempts for a 58 point second half surge that overcame a two-point halftime deficit. Portland led at intermission, 38-36.

### Rainiers Sign Coach

NEW YORK (AP)—Buffalo Bill Schuster will ride the range (the Slick Stadium junior grade variety) again in Seattle.  
The Seattle Rainiers' two roving talent hunters, general manager Dewey Soriano and playing-manager Gerry Priddy, announced Saturday the signing of the 37-year-old Schuster as a coach.  
Schuster, with a long baseball career behind him, sat this season out at his California home after two years as manager of the Vancouver Caplans of the Western International League.  
He got his Pacific Coast League start with Seattle in 1940, moved to the Los Angeles Angels and the Chicago Cubs, and returned to the Rainiers' fold in 1949.  
His irrepressible antics were credited with giving a few gray hairs to Paul Richards, then Seattle manager, but Richards always had a good word for Schuster's baseball acumen.  
Priddy said he felt Schuster would be of invaluable help since he knows Pacific Coast League players so well.

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### Houston Wins Frigid Bowl

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP)—A third unbeaten record in football lies buried in the Refrigerator Bowl where the College of Idaho lost Sunday to Sam Houston State, 14-12. The Idahoans are the third unbeaten team to be slapped down in the six years the small college post-season game has been played.  
Evansville College knocked off unbeaten Missouri Valley in 1948 and undefeated Hillsdale of Michigan in 1949.  
Sam Houston State's victory margin Sunday was a third quarter safety scored when end Max Whitely tackled College of Idaho's halfback Walt Jakubowski in the CI end zone. Fullback McNeill (Mac) Moore of the Texans clinched the victory a couple of plays later by breaking away from three tacklers and sprinting 36 yards for a touchdown.  
Dick Gaines scored the other Sam Houston touchdown on a 10-yard run and was named outstanding player of the game.

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College of Idaho scored on its own fumble in the second quarter. Ed Bonario falling on Ed Crawford's bobble. Crawford threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to Jack Kenneville in the fourth quarter.
