

# C Timber and Bids opened

Bids were received for all five tracts of O & C timber at a sale Friday at the Medford office of the Bureau of Land Management. The high bids for four tracts were above the appraised price.

Chiloquin Timber Co. of Klamath Falls was the successful bidder for approximately 4.5 million board feet of Ponderosa pine, white fir and Douglas fir on the White fir tract near Buck Lake. The bid was \$39.15 per M for the Ponderosa pine as compared with the appraised price of \$37.15 per M and \$41.15 per M for the Douglas fir and white fir.

Eldorado Lumber Co. also of Klamath Falls offered the only bid for a tract of 1.5 million board feet of Ponderosa pine, white fir and Douglas fir on Chase and Douglas tracts. # Bridges Still Labeled Red

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The House Un-American Activities Committee concluded its West Coast hearings with testimony that longshore leader Harry Bridges in 1946 attended a closed "meeting of the various heads of waterfront unions along the Pacific Coast who were Communist Party members."

Saturday's final witness, James Kendall, 31, a former sailor, swore "there was no doubt in anybody's mind that there was nobody there who was not a Communist."

Bridges, president of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, replied in a statement:

"I myself have testified to more in my various trials. I have never made any secret of seeking any help when a strike might be pending. However, in this case, so far as I know, the man (Kendall) has never met me in his life."

Bridges added that he previously has denied Communist membership.

Australian-born, Bridges recently won a Supreme Court reversal of his 1950 conviction of perjury on charges of lying when he denied Communist membership at a naturalization hearing.

The Justice Department is understood to be readying new denaturalization proceedings against him, based on information from Kendall and others.

The Christmas party is especially in honor of new AAUW members and it is hoped that they will all be able to attend.

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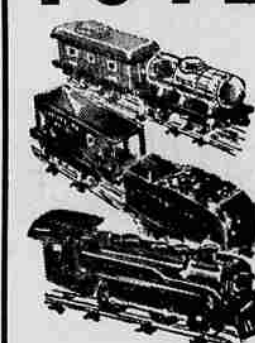

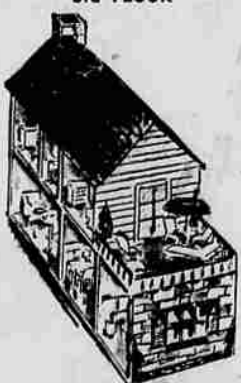

# Industry May Get Atomic In

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Atomic Energy Commission Sunday invited private industry to join forces with the government to finance construction of an atomic power plant.

An AEC announcement said industry is being asked to submit proposals for investment of risk capital to build steam turbine and electrical generating portions of the project previously estimated to cost "many tens of millions of dollars."

The AEC said it also is considering private operation of the entire plant.
