Facts About Blood Donation

The Bloodmobile, under the auspices of the American Legion, will be at the armory from 7 until 9 p.m., Monday night, Dec. 14, and again from 12:30 until 5:30 Tuesday afternoon. The wagon will also visit OTI on Tuesday morning.

Does it hurt? Some. Although they tell us sticking the finger for testing hemoglobin hurts more. Novocaine is used before the actual bleeding is done.

Is there any charge for Red Cross blood? No, the only charge is made by the hospital for the actual blood administration. The bill should read: Red Cross Blood ... No Charge.

Who can receive Red Cross blood? Anyone, regardless of financial status, race, creed or color, may receive it if the doctor requests it.

Who pays for the Red Cross blood program? The Red Cross is not tax-supported. The only way the Red Cross receives money is through donations at the time of fund campaign. The armed forces assumes the cost of PROCESSING BLOOD used by them. RED CROSS BLOOD IS NEVER PAID FOR.

Who can donate blood? Anyone between the ages of 18 through 59. Those under 21 must have written consent of parent or guardian.

What about pregnant women? Woman cannot give during pregnancy and for one year following. All fathers-to-be should see that a pint of blood is deposited for his wife, for use in emergency.

Do women use much Red Cross blood? Yes. Local hospitals supply blood for women in surgery, obstetrics, etc.

Are all types of blood needed? Yes. All types of blood are needed by both civilian and armed forces.

What is the minimum weight? 110 pounds is the minimum.

If I have been rejected, should I try again? Why not? Unless advised by the nurse not to.

Are all those workers at the Bloodmobile visit paid? The only paid people are the technical staff which comes from Portland. The technicians and nurses. The others: nurses, doctors, canteen workers, staff aides, nurses' aides are local volunteers, probably your neighbors.

Are there ever any reactions from blood donations? Yes, sometimes people feel weak or faint following a donation. But according to the doctors this is chiefly a psychological reaction because of human aversion to blood.

What happens to the blood when it leaves Klamath Falls? After it leaves Klamath Falls, it is typed at the center in Portland. That portion scheduled for the armed forces is turned over to military authorities for shipment overseas. It then becomes a military responsibility to see that it is shipped safely and used efficiently. Local hospitals requisition weekly to cover their needs. After military needs are met, stockpiles for plasma absorb the balance.

Should I eat before coming to the Bloodmobile? Yes, but no fatty foods. Eat at your regular mealtime but omit eggs, milk, butter, mayonnaise, and other fatty foods. Drink plenty of water or fruit juices.

Do I need an appointment? Yes, please. Local Red Cross office requests staff 48 hours in advance of visit dependent on number of appointments scheduled. We appreciate the donor's time, and would like to speed up our operation. "Drop-ins are welcome." Time will be saved by making definite appointments EARLY. Phone 3213, Mrs. Hugh Swaney, or 4393, Mrs. Orth Sisemore, or 7184, the Red Cross, and get your appointments now.

Father Slays Child, Self

MEDFORD (AP) - Clifford Burley, brooding over separation from his wife, shot and killed their 3 1/2-year-old child then killed himself Monday.

The two bodies were found in Burley's home at Phoenix, 5 miles south of here.

Police Chief Jim Perry said investigation showed that Burley first shot his daughter, Terry, while she was sleeping in her crib.

He then sawed a hole in the ceiling, threw a noose over a rafter, looped the noose around his neck and then shot himself.

Burley left six notes, all of them sealed except the one to his wife. In it he accused her of no longer loving either him or the child.

Later police reached the woman in Portland where she had been visiting relatives. A friend said she had recently filed papers for a divorce and had visited Burley last week to discuss custody of the child.

Police were summoned to the Burley home by neighbors who became alarmed when Burley was not seen around his house during the day.

Jury Ponders Murder Plot

CHICAGO (AP) - Indictments on charges of murder, recommended by a coroner's jury Monday, will be sought against Vincent Ciucci for what state's attorney John Guinane calls "Ciucci's plot to eliminate his entire family so he could be free to carry on his amours."

The prosecutor's statement followed the coroner's jury's verdict that Ciucci's wife and three children, found dead in their beds after a fire in their West Side apartment Saturday morning, had been murdered by shooting.

The jury recommended that Ciucci, 28-year-old grocer, be held to the grand jury on charges of murdering his wife, Anne, 23; his daughters, Virginia, 8, and Angelina, 4, and his son, Vincent Jr., 9.

Ciucci, severely burned in what he said was hit attempt to rescue members of his family, denies knowledge of the shootings.

Dr. Jerry J. Kearns, the county's chief pathologist, testified the four victims apparently died of bullets found in their brains and inhalation of carbon monoxide during the fire.

Zellerbach Sales Show Good Gain

NEW YORK (AP) - Sales of Crown Zellerbach Corp., big West Coast paper producing firm, rose substantially in the six-month period ended Oct. 31, and earnings were also higher.
 Net income of \$13,218,768 or \$1.85 a share compared with \$10,817,945 or \$1.74 a share in the same six

months last year. Sales totaled \$150,763,158 against \$126,372,111 a year earlier.

The gains resulted in part from acquisition of three companies as subsidiaries, J.D. Zellerbach, president, reported.

PROTEST
 SEATTLE (AP) - The Northwest Public Power Assn. will file a protest with the Federal Power Commission over the proposed allocation of costs on McNary Dam, Gus Norwood, executive secretary of the association, said Monday.

According to the proposed allocation, Norwood said, 95 per cent of the general costs of the multi-purpose facilities at McNary are to be charged against power.

He said such an allocation would mean an added financial burden on power consumers.
