Spy Probe To Be Pushed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said Tuesday he will seek grand jury investigation of the denial by a former Ft. Monmouth scientist that he knew atom spy Julius Rosenberg when they worked at the fort in the 1940's.

The scientist is Aaron H. Coleman. The scientist testified at public hearings Tuesday before McCarthy's Senate investigations subcommittee. It is searching for evidence of Soviet radar spying at the Signal Corps laboratories in the New Jersey fort.

The subcommittee in swift order challenged denials by Coleman that he was a member of the Young Communist League in the late 1930's and his denials that he associated with Rosenberg after their subsequent graduation from the College of the City of New York.

Roy Cohn, the subcommittee counsel, quoted at the public hearing testimony given by Rosenberg at the trial at which Rosenberg was convicted of wartime espionage and sentenced to death. He said Rosenberg was asked by his own lawyer at the trial to list former college classmates with whom he had contacts after graduation and that among them Rosenberg listed "Mr. Aaron Coleman, who, subsequent to graduation, I met at Ft. Monmouth."

Cohn called that "a direct, flat contradiction" of Coleman, and McCarthy announced that a transcript of the testimony "will be sent to the Justice Department with the recommendation that it be submitted to a grand jury."

Fast Working Firemen Credited With Saving Lives In House Blaze

It's when the heat of the battle has died and flames are being fought again over coffee that the human side of a fire is told. So with the fire Saturday night at 920 Klamath Ave.

Harold Uglum, in charge of the crew that night, said firemen were at the scene of the fire within two minutes after the call in to the station. Within 15 minutes, the fire was under control.

"It was a far delayed call," firemen say. "The building was already an inferno when the Yellow cab office and a police patrol car sent in simultaneous calls."

Uglum and Harry Ernest tell of the relief of Leslie Bleakman, who asked if he could get what was left in his room.

"All I own is in this room," Bleakman said as he surveyed the wreckage and he asked firemen to see if his logging boots were all right.

"They were full of water, but otherwise unharmed — and he was sure tickled," the firemen said.

Then there was the heroic rescue by Uglum and Ernest of William Worley from the blazing building.

"We put a ladder up to the second floor window where he was standing. He has an artificial right leg; his left leg is in a cast, but we got him on the ladder and guided him down to safety."

Uglum, who has been with the department eight years, says this is only the third fire in which ladders were necessary for escape. The other two were the Evans Apartment fire in February, 1947, and the Oregon Rooms fire in February, 1950.

Klamath Valley Hospital, where injured persons were taken after the fire, reported this morning that Everett A. Steinman will be released tomorrow and Mrs. Eva N. McNeely, proprietor of the establishment, as soon as she finds another place to live. The hospital is not sure when William Worley will be released.

The Red Cross Disaster Chapter is making provisions for fire victims.

Jailed on a vagrancy charge, Brown was to appear in Municipal Court this morning.

GOP Seeking Northwest Man

SPOKANE (AP)—The Chronicle said Tuesday Republican leaders are looking for a man from the Pacific Northwest to head a reorganized International Joint Commission for the United States.

The paper said reorganization of the commission is in the formative stage and that if it goes through, 86-year old A. O. Stanley, the U.S. chairman from Kentucky, is certain to be replaced.

"Reports from the national capital indicate it is the desire of the Eisenhower Administration to replace Stanley with an aggressive younger man with a reputation and the ability to stand up against the able Canadian chairman, Gen. A. G. McNaughton," the Chronicle said.

The International Joint Commission consists of three Canadians and three U. S. representatives who deal with allocation of water rights along the boundary from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

Roger B. McWhorter, an employee of the Federal Power Commission, would also be replaced under the reorganization by someone from the Department of Interior, the paper said. The third United States representative is Eugene W. Weber, civilian employee of the Army Engineers.

Russ Talks Over Treaty To Be Held

BERLIN (AP)—The United States, Britain and France have agreed to meet Soviet Russia Jan. 4—on a foreign ministers' level—to discuss the problems of Germany and the independence treaty for Austria.

A note from the Western powers—drawn up at the Bermuda conference—was delivered to Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov's office Tuesday. It likely will be made public late Tuesday night.

The Western note is a response to a Russian proposal for the meeting, and follows a long interchange over whether such a meeting would be held and if so under what circumstances.

The meeting will be held here in the old Allied control building, virtually idle since 1948 when the Russians walked out of the four-power rule that this city had in the years immediately following the war. The building is in the U.S. sector of Berlin, about five minutes' ride by automobile from the Soviet sector.

The Western foreign ministers who will meet with Molotov are John Foster Dulles of the United States, Anthony Eden of Britain and Georges Bidault of France.

As the Berlin conference broke up Tuesday American officials who attended it said the Western ministers have no intention of remaining indefinitely in Berlin to listen to Soviet propaganda.

These sources expressed belief the meeting may so expose the position of the Soviet Union, presumably on the question of unification of Germany, that the Russians may have to change somewhat their attitude toward this issue. For years the question of holding free elections throughout Germany has been one of the problems on which the West and the Soviet Union have split.

In Paris, Robert Schuman expressed belief the Soviet Union will seek at the meeting to destroy European integration. The former French foreign minister said in an interview with Paris-Press:

"The Soviet Union is going to try to obtain in that conference what it has failed to obtain by the Cold War—the paralysis and then abandonment of our policy of European integration."

East German Communists already were building up propaganda on the Jan. 4 meeting. They were saying in their official press:

dressing his remarks to all the peoples and government of every nation by saying that he was expressing "thoughts I had originally planned to say primarily to the American people."

But he said that the world's danger is shared by all and the hope of lifting it should be shared by all. He added that the U.N. Assembly provides the most "appropriate audience."

The President said he had to speak in a language which he would have preferred never to use—"the new language . . . of atomic warfare."

He then reported that since the first atomic test explosion set off by the United States July 16, 1945, this country has conducted 43 atomic test explosions and the power of atomic bombs has grown steadily.

"Atomic bombs today are more than 25 times as powerful as the weapons with which the atomic age dawned," he said, "while hydrogen weapons are in the ranges of millions of tons of TNT's equivalent."

Today the United States stockpile of atomic weapons which, of course, increases daily, exceeds by many times the explosive equivalent of the total of all bombs and all shells that came from every plane in every gun in every theater of war through all the years of World War II."

VARIETY

Furthermore, he said, atomic weapons have been developed in such variety that all branches of the American armed forces—Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps—are capable of using this weapon.

But the "dread secret and fearful engine of atomic might are not ours alone," he observed. The secret is possessed by "our friends and allies," Britain and Canada, and "is also known by the Soviet Union."

He recalled that Russia has not only devoted extensive resources to atomic weapons but has exploded atomic devices including at least one "involving thermonuclear reaction"—the basic reaction that makes a hydrogen explosion.

Tuesday that the United States intends to wreck the meeting by insisting on West German rearmament.
