Seed Outlook Held Gloomy

PORTLAND SEED — Committees reported a somewhat gloomy outlook Wednesday as the Oregon Seed Growers League closed its annual convention.

The committees forecast surpluses, declining markets and cutbacks in production for many Oregon seed crops.

About the only optimistic note came from Dr. Burton Wood of Oregon State College, a member of Agriculture Secretary Benson's policy advisory commission, who said Benson and his staff were working hard to try to solve the farm problem. Wood urged that the problem not be treated as a partisan issue.

The cover crop committee recommended that plantings of hairy vetch, crimson clover and common ryegrass be held to their 1933 level. Common vetch no longer has southern markets and the only outlets are local, the committee said. Austrian peas appear all right for feed and soil-building uses, but not for seed, the committee added.

The legume committee said further cuts may be necessary in planting of ladino and alsike clover crops. Alfalfa seed growers were advised to study demands for new varieties.

Growers were told, however, to expect increasing demand for grass seeds that do well in arid and semi-arid areas.

Tattooed Bandit On FBI's List

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thomas Everett Dickerson, 30-year-old tattooed bandit who reportedly calls his gun his "best friend," Thursday was on the FBI's list of "10 Most Wanted Men."

He is a parole violator and frequent offender. The last crime of which he is accused was the daylight holdup last July 14 of a insurance company office at Bethesda, Md., just outside of Washington, D.C. The robber fled with \$800 in an automobile driven by a woman.

On the "Most Wanted" list, he replaces Sydney G. Martin, wanted for assault with a dangerous weapon in Massachusetts, and picked up by FBI agents Nov. 27 at Corpus Christi, Tex.

Predators Kill Sheep

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Predatory animals are still taking a heavy toll in sheep and lamb flocks, says Milton Mercer, a wool grower from Prosser, Wash.

Mercer told a panel discussion group Wednesday at the convention of the National Wool Growers Assn. that coyote kill as many as 10 per cent of the average flock in a year. Cougars and bears also cause heavy losses, he said.

Addressing a public lands panel, Rep. Wesley A. D'Ewart (R-Mont) recommended that local individuals and institutions control such domains.

"The people who live in public lands areas can manage these lands so they will be wisely used and better developed than any bureau in Washington," he said.

Stolen Child Case Told

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — A 48-year-old San Diego osteopathic surgeon has been charged with stealing an unwed mother's premature baby and keeping the child in his home for eight months.

Dr. Winford T. Mooney was formally charged with baby stealing Wednesday and will have a preliminary hearing Jan. 5. He was released on \$2,000 bail.

The baby's mother, a 31-year-old bank teller, had been told, by Dr. Mooney's own admission, that the baby had died and had been cremated.

Dist. Atty. Don Keller said the mother told him she gave birth to a boy unaided in her apartment then summoned Dr. Mooney and turned the infant over to him for care.

The mother informed the baby's father when she was told the boy had died. Keller identified the father as Air Force Capt. Archie Bower, now stationed at Ft. George Wright, Spokane, Wash. Bower is now married.

"If my baby is alive, I want him," Keller said the mother told him Wednesday.

Keller said Bower informed him that he and Mrs. Bower want to adopt the baby, identified only as "Bobby."

The district attorney said that a release with the mother's signature was found in Dr. Mooney's office files. The woman said the doctor persuaded her to sign a blank form.

Dr. Mooney admitted to newsmen that he had kept the baby at his home since his birth last March 24. "We'd hate to lose Bobby now," he said, adding that he and his wife planned to adopt the infant.

as punishable for crimes committed within the bounds of the state, excepting only as such crimes of law were cognizable exclusively in the courts of the United States. This law has been constantly in effect since 1864.

TAXES PAID
The members of the Indian nation pay income taxes to the government of the United States. They are drafted into the military service of the United States. They have been citizens of the United States and, therefore, of the state of Oregon for many years.

"The reservation lands have been subject to state law enforcement prior to the passage of Public Law 230 to all persons who violate state law thereon, excepting Indians."

"It is therefore the opinion of this court that when Public Law 230 was approved on August 15, 1953, criminal and civil jurisdiction was vested only the courts of the state of Oregon."

Immediately after the judge concluded his opinion, the Barkley woman entered a plea of not guilty to the murder charge. Her attorney, Joe O'Neill, took exception to the court's decision. Trial was set for January 4, 1954.

Mystery Gal To Testify
ST. LOUIS (AP) — An unidentified blonde, the mystery woman mentioned in the confession of the Greenlee kidnap - killer, is expected to testify in Kansas City next week before a federal grand jury investigation into the missing \$300,000 ransom money.

St. Louis police disclosed Wednesday they had found the woman whom Carl Austin Hall, doomed killer of 6-year-old Bobby Greenlee, told of seeing as he was escorted by police from an apartment-hotel following his arrest.

Police confirmed Hall's statement that the woman was sitting in a car at the rear of the apartment-hotel.

The woman was quoted by police as saying the suitcase which contained the ransom money were not with Hall when he left the hotel.

Hall, and his accomplice, Mrs. Bonnie Brown Heady, are scheduled to die in the Missouri gas chamber Dec. 18.
