CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO (U.S.D.A.)—Larger than expected arrivals of hogs put sellers on the defensive Friday. They managed to get rid of offerings scaling less than 220 pounds at steady prices but heavier weights declined 25 to 75 cents and equal lost 50 cents to \$1.00.

A short load sold at \$24.60, equal to the six year December high set by three loads. Most choice 180 to 220 pound butchers were taken at \$24.00 to \$24.50.

Only a few steers and heifers were on sale and their price was nominally steady. A few high choice fed yearling steers sold up to \$25.00.

Slaughter lambs and sheep moved at steady to 50 cents lower quotations. Good and choice woolled lambs brought \$17.25 to \$18.50.

Salable receipts were estimated at 10,000 hogs, 1,000 cattle, 300 calves and 1,000 sheep.

Grains

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO (U.S.D.A.)—Grains sold off on the board of trade Friday after an early rally, based on news of heavy importations under the government loan program, faltered from lack of follow through buying.

Disappointment over lack of much export business seemed to be the main reason for an increase in selling pressure. It was apparent that, at the moment, some rough competition was coming from Argentina in the export market, 4,000 bushels of oats to the United States.

According to trade reports, Japan purchased an estimated 2,330,000 bushels of wheat from Argentina and France took 800,000 bushels of corn. In the past week Argentina has sold about 1,400,000 bushels of oats to the United States.

Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, Dec 2.05-2.05 1/2, corn 1/4-1/2 lower, Dec 1.54 1/2-1 1/2, oats unchanged to 1/2 lower, Dec 77 1/2, rye 1 1/4 to 2 cents higher, Dec 1.26, soybeans 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, Jan 3.07 1/2-3.08, and hard 30 to 62 cents a hundred pounds lower, Dec 16.95-17.00.
