

Two Survive Boat Upset In Driving Storm When Tug Smashes Into Reef

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — A chief engineer who clung near the bow of an overturned lifeboat was washed ashore to safety and his captain was also rescued after their tugboat was lost in a wild storm Friday.

Three crewmen drowned and the two others were missing.

The engineer, Bill MacDonald, and Capt. Roy Johnson, 41, were the only known survivors from the 75-foot tug C. P. York.

Stevenson Outlines Party Plans

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Adlai E. Stevenson said Saturday the Democratic Party's biggest problem right now is the "healing of intra-party disputes such as exist between the North and the South."

The party's 1952 presidential candidate made the statement at a breakfast for members of the Democratic Advisory Council, a fund raising group meeting here in conjunction with the two day conference of Democratic leaders from 11 Eastern states.

Stevenson's brief talk dwelled on his recent tour through the South and he noted "the wonderful reception and kind treatment afforded me by Democrats in that area."

The former Illinois governor, who will make a major party address Saturday night (11 p. m. EST) over a nationwide radio and television hookup, noted in referring to the party dispute that "we have made satisfying progress in healing such disputes. But while we are lying in the weeds awaiting our call to return to power it seems to me that closing our ranks and obtaining party unity is the prime essential."

Stevenson said he would be glad to "do anything I can to help the party." He went on: "As one who has carried the standard of the party only once, I never realized that my every frown and raising of an eyebrow would attract such attention."

Klamath Blood Needs Told

The normal requisition of whole blood for Klamath Falls is 20 pints per week, according to Ralph Moon, laboratory technician at Klamath Valley Hospital.

Types O-A-B and A-B are usually ordered to take care of all demands with limited amounts of plasma on each trip.

Any blood not used here between the weekly trips of the blood truck is returned to Portland and processed into blood derivatives, gamma globulin or plasma. None is ever wasted.

While blood deteriorates in 21 days.

NO CHARGE

The Red Cross makes absolutely no charge for a drop of blood taken during the blood donor program. Charges are made by the hospitals for cross-matching and transfusions. There is no charge for any blood derivative.

A blood truck, driven by Frank Brown, employee of the American Red Cross, makes a 600-mile monthly swing through Central Oregon on a "milk run."

He arrives in Klamath Falls each Wednesday. Twenty seven communities participate in the Red Cross Blood program.

Klamath County joined in 1951.

Tractor Accident Fatal For Driver

ALBANY, Ore. (AP) — A tractor plunged down a bank in a slide area early Saturday, killing the operator, Duane Fleming, 25, believed to have been from Sweet Home.

The accident occurred near the Quartzville River 55 miles east of here. Heavy rains caused a slide on Quartzville Road and a truck went over a bank. The tractor was sent to pull up the truck but overturned as it slid down the bank.

Coroner Glen Huston and State Policemen Harry Hansen went to the scene after the report.

Sugar Beet Problem Eyed

GREELEY, Colo. (AP) — Sugar beet acreage allotment for the 1954 crop was urged at a hearing held Friday by the sugar branch of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

If controls are not imposed, industry spokesmen said, a disorderly market likely will result.

The chief appeal came from Harry Clark of Eaton, Colo., who said he represented the Mountain States Beet Growers Marketing Assn. and the National Beet Growers Federation.

He said the federation represents about 65 per cent of all sugar beet acreage and 80 per cent of the growers.

His arguments were supported by Frank Kemp of Denver, president of the Great Western Sugar Co.

There have been no controls on acreage for a number of years.

Clark told the sugar branch officials there has been a suspended demand for increased beet acreage in some areas and some indicated increase in all areas.

As a result, Clark said, many growers fear the production of beet sugar will exceed the industry's quota plus a normal carry-over inventory.

Drivers Draw Sentences

Two motorists found guilty of driving while their licenses were revoked were sentenced Friday afternoon by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

Vernon Leo Thomas was sentenced to 15 days in the County Jail and fined \$150 and costs.

Earl Durice drew a suspended jail sentence of 10 days. He also was fined \$100 and costs. Judge Van Vactor remanded him to the County Jail for 47 1/2 days when he was unable to pay the fine. State police said it was his third offense.

Man Claims Taxmen Erred

WASHINGTON (AP) — R. W. Pointer of (7707 S.W. Canyon Road) Portland, has asked the U. S. Tax Court to reject the Internal Revenue Service claim that he owes \$264,337 in back income taxes.

The government contends Pointer, of the Pointer Willamette Co., underpaid his 1944 income tax by \$273,276. Against this, it credits an \$8,938 overpayment in 1945.

In his brief filed with the tax court Pointer said the government erred in several of its findings, resulting in the higher tax. Largest of these items, he said, was its shift of \$157,716 in income from his 1945 return to 1944 on the assumption that the contract on which the money was paid terminated in 1944.

Clackamas County Quits O & C Group

OREGON CITY (AP) — The Clackamas County Group Friday voted to withdraw its support from the Association of O & C Counties.

Said the action was favored by Commissioners Stan Skoko and Bob Jones. Telford signed the court order but said he did not agree with it.

The order also fired Frank Sever, Portland attorney, as the county's counsel in its long legal battle to gain more funds from O & C reversioned lands.

The Association of O & C Counties is made up of representatives of the 18 Oregon counties in which O & C lands are located.

Circuit Judge Group Meets

PORTLAND (AP) — The Circuit Judges Association of Oregon met Friday to study the conflict between freedom of the press and the contempt power of judges.

Newspapers are subject to possible contempt citation for publishing comment on trial subjects. Many judges do not permit courtroom photographs.

Arden X. Pangborn, editor of the Oregon Journal, told the judges' convention that unless the conflict is resolved, "there will remain a real and constant danger that one or both of the rights may some day suffer permanent impairment."

He suggested that standards be established so that it could be determined when the rights of a free press became an obstruction to the administration of justice.

Judge Ralph M. Holman of Oregon City proposed that a committee of judges meet with representatives of publishers to discuss the possibility of working out a set of rules for both newspapers and the courts to follow. The proposal was unanimously approved.

Gov. Paul Patterson, speaking at the afternoon session, told the judges they should make a study of sentencing prisoners out that the state intermediate institution. He asked them to present their views to him so he could make recommendations to the Legislature in behalf of the Board of Control.

Dividend Declared By Coos Bay Firm

PORTLAND (AP) — A year-end dividend of \$3.50 a share, payable Dec. 22, was declared by directors of the Coos Bay Lumber Co. at a special meeting here Friday.

The annual dividend, paid June 2, was \$1.50 a share.

Automobile Industry Puts Out Near Record Year As Production Totals Soar

DETROIT (AP) — By year's end, an average of 930,000 employees will have built 7,370,000 cars and trucks in 1953 with a wholesale value of \$11,440,000,000. For this, they will have received 3 1/2 billion dollars in wages.

These figures, pointing up the vastness of the auto industry, were contained Saturday in a year-end report of the Automobile Manufacturers Assn.

The 930,000 employment figure is a record, topping the previous high set in 1951 by 65,500. The payroll also is a new high, and

Copco Wins Rate Boost Permission

SALEM (AP) — The California Oregon Power Co. was granted a 16.12 per cent rate increase Friday by Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel and the California Public Utilities Commission.

The company's operations are 80 per cent in Southern Oregon and 20 per cent in Northern California.

Heltzel said the increase would give the company a 6 per cent rate of return on its investment. Its rate of return in the past year was 4.7 per cent.

The increase will give the company \$2,100,000 more revenue a year, but it is \$500,000 less than the company asked.

It will go into effect with meter readings as of Dec. 15.

Heltzel said that the company never has had a general rate increase in its entire history, and that it has increased its plant investment by 41 per cent in the past two years.

He said that present rates are less than those charged in 1946.

Heltzel's order pointed out that the company will spend 15 million dollars a year for the next five years to construct new facilities to care for increased business.

The number of customers has increased from 40,000 to 76,000 since 1946. Of the latter total, 59,000 are in Oregon.
