Grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Marion Barnes, Olney; and Mrs. Vera Real, 112 Wendling. They are members of Oregon pioneer families—their great-grandfather identified with early ranching and hotel operations here, was also Klamath County sheriff for two terms. However, he is still specifically remembered since his death as Judge Barnes, his official title for the 12 years he served as Justice of the Peace. Their maternal grandparents were both born in Ashland, of pioneer stock; James Hicks, Mrs. Real's father, owned a flour mill and saw mill in that vicinity; and their grandfather Real, son of an Ashland rancher, was considered quite a buckaroo in Southern Oregon. Before his death, M. E. and Mrs. Real operated the Quartz Mountain Service Station, on the Lakoview Highway. The boys' father and grandfather Barnes are partners in the Farmers Sand and Gravel Company.
