Apache, Sioux Tribal Dance Expert Interested in Local Club To Carry On Research

Tribal dances, complete with eagle feathers and authentic costumes, background history and a solid interest in the Apaches and Sioux make Joe Silva's Indian dances first cousin to "the real McCoy."

Silva, a member of the Klamath Falls Police Department since his move to Klamath Falls two months ago, is an ardent Indian dancer, and his study of the Apaches and Sioux makes his interpretive dancing a real treat.

The would-be Indian has appeared at many community programs in his Indian garb. He and Chief Lemie, a Yosemite Indian from Merced, were the main attractions when they were present for the dedication of the Yosemite Chieftain, a C-123 cargo plane from Castle Air Force Base about two years ago. The "Indians" did several war dances, complete with coup sticks, tom toms, feathered headdresses and all. (To the great relief of audiences, Silva's coup stick, on which early chiefs tied scalps and other symbols of victories over cavalry troops, has limitation, not real hair on its some six feet of length.)

Silva makes all his costumes, most of them patterned from prints from Universal-International Studios, which, according to Silva, is one of the few Hollywood studios which uses real Indians and authentic costumes and tribal lore in productions. His next undertaking is an elaborate chief's war shirt, leggings and a bone breast plate, the design for which will be copied from one worn in Universal-International's "The Sioux Uprising," co-starring Jeff Chandler and Faith Domergue.

More information on Indian costumes and dances comes from a 1894 publication by the government "The Study of the Siouan Cults," by James Owen Dorsey.

Silva has lectured to many community organizations on Indian anthropology, and is considered an expert on the California Indians from the Merced and Yosemite areas. While deputy sheriff in Merced, he taught Indian lore to Boy Scouts. He speaks of Victorio, Geronimo and Cochise as though they were blood brothers, and he speaks accurately.

Included in his dance repertoire are the Apache Devil Dance, Dance of the Thunder Bird, Victory Dance and War Dance; the Sioux Ghost Shirt Dance; the Pawnee and Ojibwa Dances and Stomp Dances (which are done with cans tied to the legs). Silva says that the Sioux Ghost Shirt Dance is symbolically explained by the Indians' belief that anyone who put on the Ghost Shirt was impregnable to bullets.

"This ultimately led to the last uprising of the Sioux nation," Silva commented.

In addition to many costumed personal appearances, Silva was instrumental in organizing the Merced Indian Club in July of this year. The club began with four people.

Silva, Gather Haynes, Pawnee, Okla., who won the Senior World's Champion War Dancer title July 5; his son, Charles, winner of the Junior World's Champion title and Mike Rossi, who became a "fanatic" one evening while the tom toms were beating and the other three were going through a few steps.

Within a month the club had grown to 12 and was sponsored by the Merced Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The Merced Indian Club has set something of a record in its five months of existence. In addition to appearing in rodeos and parades, it was televised over a Fresno station, took first place at the Nov. 14 Junior Chamber of Commerce state convention at Fresno placed first again as the most spectacular entry in the Jadera County fair in the Jadera entry and took the grand sweepstakes award in the King Cotton Fair parade at Hanford, the biggest county fair in California according to report.

At the present time, a 30 minute film is being planned for production the first of the year. Hollywood star Sonny Tufts is backing the film, which is intended to show what four fellows with an idea and ambition can do.

Also on the agenda of community events for the club is a trip to Palm Springs for the national Jaycee convention next year.

"The club's appearance at rodeos and over TV has won for the Merced Jaycees a name all over the State of California," Silva declares.

Silva is interested in organizing an Indian Club in Klamath. Members would make their own costumes, but of course Silva, with his background knowledge and costume knack, will help. Much of the material needed is available locally; the rest can be ordered from New York or California. Interested persons can contact Silva by calling 6345.

Reissue Of Old Pictures Now A Major Film Practice

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The shortage of movies has brought greater interest in reissues, and Sam Goldwyn has a formula for them.

"Most theaters allow reissues to sneak out, as though they were something to be ashamed of," says the wily producer. "I'm bringing back 'Best Years of Our Lives' proudly, as though it were a new picture."

Sam, who knows how to milk the most money from a picture is putting on quite a campaign for "Best Years." He plans to spend a quarter-million dollars on an advertising campaign with a dinner and showing of the film for the Hollywood press.

"I am bringing back this picture because of the many requests I have received from women's clubs, veterans groups and other organizations," reported Goldwyn. "I feel the message in this picture is just as important today as it was when it was first released. After all, men are coming back from another war, and there is a whole new audience."

"We will go into towns and play important first-run theaters with this picture, starting after the first of the year. If it makes only one quarter the money it made on the first release, I will be happy. I have never released figures on my pictures, but I know that it is second only to 'Gone With the Wind' as a money-maker."

Variety has listed the "Best Years" take in this country and Canada at almost 10 1/2 million. It was first released in 1942 and starred Frederic March, Myrna Loy, Dana Andrews, Teresa Wright, Virginia Mayo and Harold Russell. March picked up an Oscar for it, Russell two. William Wyler won for direction. Robert Wyler won for writing and Goldwyn got it for the picture, as well as an Irving Thalberg award.

The picture stands up amazingly well after seven years. The dialogue and acting are as crisp as new, and the only thing dated is the length of the women's skirts, which are a trifle short for these times.

Goldwyn added that he plans to give the same treatment to many of his other classics. Among those mentioned were "Western Highlights" and "Dodsworth."

MGM is dusting off the screen's top grosser, "Gone With the Wind" for still another run. Like "Best Years" it will be shown on wide screens.

SEATTLE (AP)—Pacific Northwest carloadings have topped the million-mark for 1952.

The Pacific Northwest Advisory Assn., reporting for the loading territory of Washington, Oregon and Idaho north of the Salmon River, said Saturday the 11-month total reached 1,060,027 cars, down only 11,320 cars from the same period a year ago.

The area's November lumber carloadings — 34,478 cars — were the highest for any November on record. The 11-month total of 406,822 cars was the highest for the period for any year since 1942.

Substantial mill holdings of logs in the Puget Sound and Columbia River areas, however, slowed down their rail movement, the association said.

Market conditions also allowed down November fruit shipments to 3,941 cars, down from the month a year ago, but the year's shipments to date has been 37,575 cars, compared with only 34,027 the same period a year ago.

Carloadings Up In PNW

SEATTLE (AP)—Two transports brought 2,565 passengers home from the Far East Saturday.

The Gen. Hugh J. Gaffey docked with 1,714 including 579 Army officers and enlisted men and 777 Air Force officers and enlisted men.

Two hours later the Frederick Funston arrived with 851 passengers, among them 290 Army officers and enlisted men.
