PANMUNJOM (AP)—U. S. special envoy Arthur H. Dean leaves for Washington for consultations in Washington, leaving his chief aide in Korea to resume the negotiations to set up a Korean peace conference.

Dean, who met for eight weeks with the Reds in an effort to reach agreement, walked out on the

The senator Saturday disclosed he had asked Chairman Saltonstall (R-Mass.) of the Senate Armed Services Committee to order hearings on the 200 million dollar contract.

Murderer To Die For Crime

HOOD RIVER (AP)—Donald Elaine Imiah, 18, convicted Saturday night of first degree murder, will be sentenced to death Dec. 21. The death penalty is mandatory since the jury did not recommend life.

Imiah was accused of the gun-slit death of Bruce B. Houck, 30, Hood River rancher. Houck's body was found July 11 at the ranch—along with the carcasses of a number of farm animals which also had been shot to death.

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COMMUNIST diplomats Saturday after they accused the Allies of "perfidy."

He told newsmen today that his aide, Kenneth Young of the U. S. State Department, will have "full authority to resume the talks" if the Communists withdraw the perfidy charges and give some sign they are ready to negotiate in good faith.

However, the Communists' Peiping radio already had reiterated the perfidy charges and laid the blame for the breakdown on the "contemptible cold war policy of the United States."

Peiping said Dean's walkout was "an ominous sign that the U. S. government might commit further perfidies of graver consequence."

Dean said in a statement it is "the definite policy of the United States of America that every reasonable attempt should be made to work out the difficulties and to convene the political (peace) conference, but it would not compromise a slur on its integrity."

Dean again repeated the U. N.

stand that Russia be invited to the peace conference as a full voting participant on the Communist side and not as a neutral, as the Reds have insisted. This was the big stumbling block in the talks.

Dean plans to arrive Thursday in Washington to talk with U. S. authorities and representatives of some of the other United Nations that sent troops to Korea.

The preliminary Panmunjom talks were aimed at fixing the time, date and composition of the long-delayed peace conference.

Bitter disputes over which nations should sit at the peace table bogged down the discussions. Dean walked out after the Reds accused the U. S. government of deliberately concealing in the release of 27,000 anti-Red North Korean prisoners June 17-18. The Koreans were released by order of President Syngman Rhee of South Korea.

In Paris, where U. S. Secretary of State Dulles arrived to attend NATO Council sessions, correspondents were told Dean's walkout was "not an emotional reaction to Communist provocation."

Rather, the correspondents learned, it was due to "failure of the Communists to change one dot of an unacceptable plan."

Dulles declined to make a direct statement, saying he had not had time to study official dispatches.

However, it was learned that the American view was that continuation of the talks were useless unless the Communists indicate willingness to change their stand on the neutral issue.

Plunge From Road Fatal For Driver

McMINNVILLE (AP)—A car plunged 125 feet through brush and down a bank early Sunday, and the driver was injured fatally.

Marion David Mercer, 27, Grand Ronde, was dead on arrival at a hospital here.

State police said the car apparently failed to make a turn. The accident happened 10 miles west of Willamina.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—President Juan D. Peron's government offered for congressional debate today a bill to grant amnesty to scores of imprisoned opponents and to thousands in exile. As a prelude, Peron over the weekend freed 75 political prisoners.

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Six Killed When Texas Train Rips Into Station Wagon, Diesel Jumps Rails

ROYSE CITY, Tex. (AP)—A whistling diesel streamliner slammed a station wagon off its tracks last night, killing a hard-of-hearing father, his wife, three children and their maid.

The hurtling automobile tripped a switch that derailed the twin engines and 10 cars of the sparkling red-and-silver train, en route from Dallas to St. Louis. Five rear cars held to the rails.

Five train passengers were sent to hospitals. An estimated 50 more were bruised or shaken up.

The twin diesel engines plowed 200 yards past the demolished station wagon and came to rest leaning at sharp angles to the ground. The baggage car flipped onto its back, wheels spinning in the air. The mail car tumbled onto its side. The other derailed cars leaned at crazy angles.

The six dead, all those in the station wagon, were identified as: Victor Sauley, 47, Dallas real estate agent and former Southern Methodist University and New York Giants football player; his wife Harriett, 39, their sons, Bill, 5, and twins, John and Jim, 2; and Irma Davis, the Negro maid.

The engineer said he was blowing his diesel whistle.

The five taken to hospitals in Greenville, 29 miles northeast of here, were Robert W. Price, 65, Fayette City, Pa., possible head and neck injuries; Henry Silver, 63, New Braunfels, Tex., possible back injuries; Miss Mabel Parks, 50, Tulsa, Okla.; Mrs. Russell Lambert, 19, Chester, Ind.; and Mrs. Rebecca Rubenstein, Chelsea, Mass. The latter three were described as "shaken up."

Highway Patrol Sgt. Ed Majors said the engineer, Marcus B. Hudgens of Denison, Tex., told him: "I was traveling about 60 miles an hour when I saw the car coming toward the tracks. It was going very slow. I thought it was going to stop. I was blowing my whistle. I didn't apply my brakes until just before I saw I was going to hit. It takes two or three seconds for my air brakes to catch hold."

Stereotypers Accept Offer

NEW YORK (AP)—Stereotypers employed on New York City newspapers have accepted a package of \$3.75 a week offered by the publishers, plus a fact-finding arrangement.

James J. McMahon, president of Local 1 of the AFL International Stereotypers Union, announced that acceptance was voted by a meeting of 300 of the local's membership Sunday. He said the vote was taken after he had recommended acceptance.

The package, as specified by the stereotypers, includes a weekly wage increase of \$2 along with \$1.75 in other benefits.

The stereotypers accepted the same formula agreed on in the strike of AFL Photo-engravers against six major newspapers, which ended last Tuesday.

The formula calls for a \$3.75 package plus non-bind fact-finding by a three-man board to determine whether additional wages or shorter hours are justified.

As the strike ended in a compromise, the formula was offered also to six other newspaper craft unions whose members had refused to cross the photo-engraver's picket lines.

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
