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City Council Considers Petitions To Annex Area Southeast Of Town Limits

Another potential firecracker hit City Council Monday night when two petitions were presented asking council to initiate a movement to annex a certain portion of the suburbs to the city. The area concerned extends southeast from the city limits to the USRS canal and Shasta Way.

A total of 43 names were included in the petitions, but some of these were canceled by a third petition, presented by John P. Detroit. This third petition asked that the area east of Austin be omitted from the annexation plan. Detroit said many of the petitioners were high pressured into signing by those who approached them with advice to "sign or you'll be forced into the city anyway."

City Attorney Henry Perkins told the group that the City Engineer, E. A. Thomas, will first make a description of the area. Then council will pass a resolution proposing annexation. A notice of a hearing on objections will be printed twice. Following this, council, by ordinance, will declare the area annexed if (1) 100 per cent of the property owners sign their consent or, (2) the majority of duly qualified voters in the area vote in favor of the plan.

Mayor Paul Landry emphasized that the city "is not trying to push anything down the people's throats." "We want the annexation to originate in that area," Landry said. He told the group that about three days ago he had given a petition to some of the residents who brought it back with 43 signatures.

Council placed the petitions on file and instructed officials to proceed with the necessary steps to ward annexing the area, which now includes all of the Sunnyside Addition.

At Monday night's meeting also, council asked an investigation by the Street Committee of the Park Board's financial expenditures. The request was made after Councilman Wendall Smith pointed out that the Board had accepted W. R. Chrisco's bid of \$2 per yard for fill dirt in Veterans Memorial Park. Low bid was made by Shasta Sand at \$1.20, according to Park Board minutes.

The minutes stated that "since Chrisco's equipment is already at the park, and since he has donated his services at various times to Park Board, it was agreed to accept his bid."

Chrisco was the contractor for hauling in fill dirt to the park. Councilman Smith suggested that there be a measure on the next ballot requiring the Park Board to advertise for bids in compliance with the city charter. At present, the Board is not subject to the same regulations as the City Council.

Council heard G. J. Amerling's request that something be done about the 8th and High intersection where his son was struck by a car Dec. 10.

It was decided to mark back all four corners not already marked back at least one car length and make the intersection a four-way stop. This will continue on a trial basis for one month; then the Police Department and schools in the area will report to council on the effectiveness of this plan.

City Engineer Taxi Thomas was asked to investigate Lowell, Tunnel and Montellus streets, which the School Board has asked the city to repair before the weather makes it impossible to pick up school children in the area.

Other business on council's agenda included confirmation of the appointment of Mrs. O. K. Puckett to the Library Board to replace Mrs. Marvin Nereth; Dr. E. K. Dietzsch, Dr. Arthur Compton and Ed Swansen to the Board of Health for a term to expire Dec. 31, 1953 and Charles Henderson, Dr. Richard Currin and W. J. Kessler for a term to expire Dec. 31, 1954.

A letter was read from William McKibbin, chairman of the Insurance Committee, saying that the committee has a list of the exposures to be used as specifications in advertising for bids for the comprehensive liability policy for the city. The list was furnished by Mrs. C. C. Overeem at the City Hall.

The committee also asked that an audit sheet of this and previous policies be placed on file and that the present carrier (the Landry Company) furnish to the city complete loss information by the year since coverage is by them.

Hoot Owl Does Job Of Killing

EPHRAIM, Utah (AP)—Wally Durfee reported yesterday a hoot owl got into a coop of 4,000 10-week-old New Hampshire chickens. He found the owl still flying back and forth, trying to get out, the next morning.

As he untangled the mass of chickens piled up in a corner he counted 1,537 of them dead. He estimated the loss at \$1,350.

Fraud Case Trial Heard

PORTLAND (AP)—Damages totaling \$213,970 were sought Monday by a Pendleton woman and eight Portland residents in a suit charging fraud in the purchase of stock in a Wrangell, Alaska, mill.

Defendants are Alaska Wrangell Mills, Inc., and O. T. Takahashi, Seattle, the corporation's president, treasurer and director.

The suit contends the plaintiffs purchased stock with the understanding their investment would be returned in three years with retention of their stock interest, but that they have received no income to date.
