## Appeal To Conscience Leads To Confession Of Parent's Murder By Son

NEW YORK (AP)—An appeal to a young child's conscience after hours of questioning, a prosecutor says, brought his confession of killing his parents with poisoned champagne cocktails.

Asst. Dist. Atty. George Tiler gave details last yesterday of the quizzing of 20-year-old Harlow Fraden in the deaths four months ago of his parents, William and Shirley Fraden.

Young Fraden and a companion, Dennis Wepman, 22, were indicted earlier in the day on a charge of first degree murder—a count carrying a mandatory sentence of death in New York State.

The two youths reportedly have admitted spiking champagne with cyanide and tricking the elder Fraden into toasting their only child with the deadly poison last Aug. 19. The deaths had been considered double suicides or murder and suicide.

Wepman, a free lance writer, admitted a part in the affair after the case cracked open Wednesday. However, Fraden did not make a statement until Thursday night.

Both are undergoing mental examinations at Bellevue Hospital.

Yesterday Tiler gave this statement on the means by which Fraden's purported confession was extracted:

"We appealed to his conscience. We told him, 'You have to live with yourself. The world is entitled to know whether you did it for gain or revenge.' At the word gain, Fraden quickly answered, 'No, no, no,' he quickly answered. I asked him, 'Did you hate your mother?' and he replied, 'Yes, I hated her.'"

Tiler added that Fraden told him his mother, a 44-year-old school teacher, had threatened to put him in a mental institution. "Now she cannot put me away and he (his father) has found peace," Fraden was quoted as saying. The elder Fraden was a 39-year-old physician.

Wepman was said to have claimed that he was talked into the crime with expectations of sharing big money but only got \$120, Wepman said the motive was money with Fraden expecting an inheritance, first estimated at

\$150,000 but later scaled down to about \$98,000. Fraden ran through an estimated \$50,000 before his arrest.

However, Bronx authorities said Fraden, denying money was a motive, insisted he killed his parents "because as long as he could re-

call, and before he knew anything about sex, his mother called him a fairy."

Bronx Dist. Atty. George B. De Luca said Fraden "strongly resented" this. Fraden and Wepman have denied being homosexuals. They lived together for many months and were evicted from an apartment because of alleged all-male parties.

A break in the case came in the week after Wepman burdened his troubled mind to an unidentified girl who later went to police.

## Tom Brown Has Unusual Story to Tell of Audition

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Actor Tom Brown went to a producer's office to try out for a movie role.

"Read the script over for an hour and then come back," the movie man told him.

Tom thought it was odd that he would have to try out for the role. After all, he had only acted in 102 pictures and his work should have been well known. But

he could use the job, so he took the script and studied it. He selected a scene wherein an Army major detailed the battle plan of a forthcoming operation.

He went back into the producer's office and did the audition. An actor knows when he has done a bad reading, an adequate one or something really good. Tom gave it everything he had. He knew he was good, and the producer admitted it.

"That's a great reading," the man commented. "But I can't give you the part. You look too young; the audience would never believe you as an Army major."

And so Maj. Tom Brown, late of the United States Army, didn't get the job. That's the story of his recent professional life.

Tom is one of those perennial juveniles who never grow old. He says he will be 39 next month, yet he has the face of a collegiate.

"My face is my problem," he sighed. "I'm past the age where I can play dashing young juveniles, and they're no particular joy for an actor anyway. Yet the producers say I am too young to play the character roles which are an actor's meat."

It appears that Tom's youth, which was such a great asset in his earlier years, now is something of a liability. He started the acting life early enough. His parents were vaudevillians, and he went onstage when he was 2. He continued with stage work and silent movies, coming to Universal in 1921.

He continued an active life as a fresh-faced juvenile until 1942, when he entered the Army. He returned to Hollywood in 1946 and found the situation was different. When he asked for his old salary, a producer replied:

"Where have you been the last five years? Things have changed. You're not box office any more."

In the face of Hollywood's post-war depression, he got only five roles in four years. In 1950, another war broke out and he was called back into the service. After serving with the 4th Division in Korea, he again resumed his movie career.

"This time my hair was white," he said. "I lost at least one role because of it, so I had to dye my hair."

Fortunately, Tom has some friends to help in his return to the screen. One is Lou Costello, who helped him get a good role in "Firmly Fixed My Child."

I asked Tom if he ever thought of getting into some other line of work.

"I've thought about getting into the production side," he replied.

"But I never have considered giving up show business. After all, I've given my life to it. If a man's a plumber all his life, he's bound to become a better plumber as he goes along. It ought to be the same with acting."

## Civil Suit Filed Here

A civil suit to collect nearly \$8,000 was filed in Circuit Court Thursday by Joseph M. Colahan, J. P. Colahan and Gertrude Colahan against G. E. Van Winkle and Irene G. Van Winkle.

The plaintiffs seek to recover \$580.93 and interest from Feb. 1, 1953, for irrigation materials paid for but never delivered by the defendants.

In a second action for \$5,405, the complaint charges that the Colahans lost 40 acres of alfalfa and hay, 15 acres of rye and claim a loss of \$15 a day for pasture from Aug. 1 to Oct. 25, 1952, due to lack of irrigation water caused by defendants not furnishing certain irrigation equipment.

## Land Boundary Action Needed

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—California men were advised Friday to go to Congress and try to get federal land boundaries pushed back to make more room for expanding cities.

Other western states would support the move, said Forrest E. Cooper of Lakeview, Ore., representing the Interstate Association of Public Lands Counties before the Senate Public Lands Committee.

He said there are many communities that are hemmed in and unable to expand in their natural directions and the time has come for Californians to act.

Cooper also contended that the filing of mining claims on federal land near cities should be stopped, to make acquisition by the cities easier.

If people realized how much states are spending to settle old mining claims across highway rights of way, he said, there would be an uproar.
