Employment Shows Slip

WASHINGTON (AP) - Slackened production "in many lines of manufacturing" has reduced factory employment by 700,000 or 4 per cent since early summer, the Commerce Department reported Tuesday.

Business activity continued high in spite of the drop, the department said in its monthly "Survey of Current Business."

Production and consumer income in November still were running ahead of a year ago, the survey indicated, and joblessness remained almost abnormally low although up slightly from October.

The production dip was attributed largely to the liquidation of excess stocks, especially in the fields of home appliances and other durable goods whose production had been outrunning sales for about a year.

Suspect Held In Murder

SPokane (AP) - Spokane County sheriff's deputies Monday arrested the ex-husband of Mrs. Geneva Morton, whose body was found earlier in the day at the service station she managed nine miles west of here, for questioning in connection with the murder.

He was identified as Claude Morton, who was arrested at Colville and returned to Spokane. He was divorced from the slain woman last March.

Mrs. Morton, 26, the mother of two children, had been shot three times. Her body was found in the men's rest room of the station she had managed since last August by an employe, Mrs. Blanch Brown.

The station was robbed of an undetermined amount of money, presumably by the person who shot Mrs. Morton.

Pope To Deliver Christmas Message

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Pope Pius XII will deliver by radio on Thursday his 15th consecutive Christmas message to the world.

The Vatican press office announced Tuesday that it will be rebroadcast in 25 languages during a three day period beginning on Dec. 24, immediately after the Pope speaks at 11 a.m. (2 a.m. PST).

Vatican radio will beam it around the world, including broadcasts to Communist-ruled Russia and China.

McKay Mum On Raver Job

SALEM, Ore. (AP) - Secretary of the Interior McKay was silent Tuesday on whom he might have in mind to succeed Paul J. Raver as administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration.

Raver, BPA administrator for 14 years, resigned Monday to accept the \$15,000-a-year job as superintendent of Seattle's municipally owned City Light system.

A copy of the letter of resignation advising he is leaving government service Jan. 14 was sent to McKay, who is holidaying here, but the interior secretary declined to make its contents public.

His only comment, after noting the effective date of the resignation, was the promise: "We'll have some news in a very short time."

Raver was appointed to the \$14,800-a-year post at Bonneville in 1939 under a Democratic administration. McKay has been urged to replace him.

Raver mailed the letter shortly after he was advised the Seattle City Council had unanimously confirmed his appointment as head of Seattle City Light. He is succeeding E. R. Hofman, who will retire Dec. 31.

Holy Land Looks For White Xmas

JERUSALEM (AP) - The Holy Land expects a white Christmas for the first time in 29 years.

Weathermen said Tuesday there is a good chance that the snowfall of the last few days will remain over Christmas.

Israel's President Izhak Ben-Zvi, in his Christmas message to "Christian citizens of Israel and to all our Christian visitors," said: "May the new year see the strengthening of friendship, cooperation and goodwill between all the communities in our land. A happy new year to you all."

About 3,000 Christians from Israel will take part in this year's pilgrimage across the armistice border to Bethlehem in Jordan on Christmas Eve.

McKay Tells Of Power Needs Here

PORTLAND (AP) - The Northwest must have more dams to meet the region's growth, but private money can be called on to speed them, Douglas McKay, secretary of the interior, said here Sunday in an interview.

McKay, home for the holidays, praised the recently negotiated 20-year contracts between the Bonneville Administration and private utilities, but he said they wouldn't mean much in a few years if more power were not made available. The region needs an added 400,000 kilowatts a year just to stay up with growth, he said.

But private money wants to go into dam building McKay said.

"I saw a story out of Washington the other day," he said, "which said private utility companies are

planning to spend 20 billion dollars in the next 20 years on power development. I know that about 500 million dollars in private money is ready to go in, Northwest development, including what Idaho Power Co. wants to spend in Hells Canyon."

McKay said that the Bonneville Administration will continue to do "a certain amount of planning to estimate requirements on various parts of the system." This extended the future role of Bonneville beyond what Ralph Tudor, interior undersecretary, outlined here last week. Tudor would be strictly as spokesman for the Army Engineers Reclamation Bureau.

McKay said that in the future he had been "promising electric power," and this was a stop.

He had no comment on the administrator, who is to be shortly to accept the new Light superintendency.

County Seat Move Pushed

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP) - Lincoln County officials went ahead Monday with plans to remove the county seat from Toledo to Newport in the coming days, despite a court suit attacking legality of the move.

Contractor C. A. Moffitt said the former Newport High School gymnasium, now being remodeled, would be ready for county offices by Christmas Eve.

Space has been designated in that building for the county clerk, engineer, treasurer, assessor and tax collector. Rooms have been set aside for the county court and photostatic equipment.

The use of the building will be temporary. A new courthouse is planned on the site of the former high school.

The sheriff's office is scheduled to move into quarters in the Newport City Hall, where the Newport police also are located. No decision has been made yet on whether to designate the building as the county jail.

The shifting of the county seat by Jan. 1 was voted in the last general election. Legality of that is being challenged in a circuit court suit filed by a county resident who asserts there were not enough signatures on the petitions that brought the issue to the ballot.
