WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP) — Prices were marked down sharply Tuesday in the stock market without exciting undue selling.

The fall was one of the heaviest since the recovery drive started from the mid-September low of the year.

Losses extended to between 1 and 3 points in key areas. Although all divisions of the market were lower, there was no point of acute weakness. It was the second straight decline.

Business throughout maintained a moderate pace at an estimated 1,600,000 shares. That compares with Monday's 1,600,000 shares when losses were modest.

CHICAGO GRAIN
CHICAGO (AP) — Soybeans displayed a firm tone but the rest of the grain market had a ragged appearance on the board of trade Tuesday.

Beans advanced in response to slightly higher prices in the cash market for soybean oil and meal. Cold weather in the Midwest was expected to increase demand for meal. In addition, receipts of cash soybeans at terminals were very light, only one car arriving at Chicago.

Rye fell several cents at one time on an Agriculture Department report of a sharp increase in acreage sown for the 1954 crop.

Wheat, corn and oats moved irregularly in light dealings. Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 lower, March 2.03-2.05, corn 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, March 1.54-1.56, oats 1/2 lower to 3/4 higher, March 78-80, rye 2 1/2 to 3 cents lower, March 1.22-1.24, soybeans 2 1/2-3 1/2 higher, Jan 3.02-3.04, and lard 25 to 30 cents a hundred pounds higher, Jan 16.97-16.99.

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK
CHICAGO (AP) — Hogs tilted higher in an active trade Tuesday as salable receipts, totaled 9,000 head, fell 3,000 under advance expectations.

Butchers mainly sold at steady prices while hogs gained 25 cents or more. Butchers weighing more than 220 pounds also gained 25 cents. A few loads of choice 100 to 110 pound offerings brought \$25.10 to \$25.25, the top.

A two way market developed on steers. Average choice and prime grades moved at steady to strong prices but poorer grades found a limited demand and mostly were discounted 50 cents from Monday's finish. Heifers held steady. Salable receipts at 5,500 head were 1,500 above estimates. Prime steers brought a top of \$29.00.

Lambs continued the sharp upturn noticeable Monday. In another very active market, they gained 25 to 30 cents. Slaughter sheep were steady to 25 cents higher. Choice and prime woolled lambs brought \$21.00 to \$22.00, the top. Receipts 12,000.
