

Borrowing Mother Heads Home After Appeal To POW Who Refused To Return

OKYO (AP) — Mrs. Portia Howe, who Wednesday night for a long period, a sad but determined mother who says her war son one day will realize she made a mistake in turning him in.

The Alden, Minn., housewife expects to spend Christmas with her family. She is taking presents with her to Japan for her three other children.

Mrs. Howe flew to Japan 12 days ago in an effort to see her POW son, Pfc. Richard Tenneson, in Korea. But she said she was disappointed Wednesday night her hope is not realized.

Tenneson, 20, is one of 17 Americans who shouted down a last-minute Allied loudspeaker appeal at the end of the war.

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Bonanza Planning On Cemetery

BONANZA — At the last meeting of Bonanza Civic Improvement League, discussion was held on the proposed formation of a cemetery district for Bonanza Cemetery.

If the measure is passed in a hearing by County Court, it is expected to raise taxes probably no more than two or three mills, and after a year or two of development the levy is expected to be reduced.

There will be someone present at the next league meeting to explain the measure more fully. Anyone interested is urged to attend.

According to report, the state highway commission will erect "School Zone" signs on the main highway at intersections near the school. Additional speed limit measures will be considered by City officials.

The need for a Community Hall in Bonanza will come up for more discussion under the "Boost Bonanza" campaign.

A large group of teenagers were present at the meeting to request more adult help in their recent movie project.

Funds were solicited to purchase a moving picture projector and screen; movies have been held once a month for several months. Admission is on a voluntary donation basis, "A" features, an educational short and a comedy are usually shown.

Now the room in which movies have been shown is inadequate in space and heating facilities. The young people would like a more suitable place so that more adults will attend and help supervise children.

The January meeting will be held at the library at 8 p.m. the 12th. The study of municipal government will be the continuing project for the new year.

Young people are always welcome at these meetings, which are open to residents and non-residents of Bonanza.

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Helpful Suggestions Pour In To Aid Puppy In Well

CARLSBAD, N. M. (AP) — Bolstered by a multitude of suggestions, Fire Chief Ira Stockwell today took his turn at trying to rescue a 2-month-old pup from the bottom of a dry water well.

Ideas by the dozen were offered by newspaper readers and radio listeners.

It all began nine days ago when 5-year-old Teresa Curtis pushed two pups into a hole in her back yard. It's about 10 inches wide at the top and 38 feet deep.

Her cousins, Dan Hardin, 15, and Poe Hardin, 12, rescued one of the pups. They lowered a burlap sack and the pup walked into it. But the other little mongrel shied off.

The Hardin boys have been keeping the trapped pup alive by low cringing bowls of milk and cereal.

Yesterday a couple of Boy Scouts tried unsuccessfully to drop a rope loop over the pup and haul him to safety.

New Mexico newspaper and wire service offices were besieged with suggestions for rescue. One of the plans came from a woman who said:

"Send the other puppy down in a basket. The trapped puppy may be so glad to see him he'll climb in the basket too."

A fisherman: "Drop a piece of net the size of the bottom of the hole to the bottom with ropes tied to the four corners. When he reaches for the piece of meat in the center, jerk him out like a catfish."

One man asked, "Why all the fuss—kick the hole in on top of him?"

Another offered, "Fill the well to a depth of two or three feet with corks. Do it slowly so the pup can crawl on top. Then fill the well with water so he'll float to the top."

"Lower a little boy in a stout pair of overalls on a rope," suggested a woman. "And let him bring the puppy back."

An elderly lady suggested building a lattice work ladder and letting the pup climb out.

PHOENIX, ARIZ. (AP) — Frank A. Nixon, 75-year-old father of Vice President Richard Nixon, lay critically ill at St. Joseph's Hospital here today.

He was flying with his wife from Birmingham, Ala., to Los Angeles via American Airlines last night when he suffered what at first was thought to have been a heart attack. Subsequently, doctors said he was suffering from a gastric hemorrhage. The airliner made an emergency landing to speed his removal to a hospital.

Hospital attendants said early today he was in a deep sleep and possibly in a coma. He was given blood transfusions.

Mrs. Nixon immediately phoned her vice president son at Washington, D. C., informing him of his father's condition.

Ironically, it was the first airplane trip the senior Nixons ever had made. They started driving to their home at Whittier, Calif., when Nixon became ill and his doctor suggested he complete the trip by air.

Vice President Nixon told his mother he did not plan to come to Phoenix unless his father's condition took a turn for the worse.

These projects—McNary, Chief Joseph, The Dalles and Albeni Falls on the Columbia, and several on Oregon's Willamette River—represent the power most readily available, Cordón said, and should be completed without delay.

Cordón said he believes the greatest need power-wise in the Northwest is for upstream storage projects to permit full use of generators already in place in downstream dams. Regulated release of water from such projects, he said, could keep power flowing from generators which now lie idle during slack water periods.

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Power Funds To Be Sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — Money to continue projects already under way probably will be the main objective next year of supporters of the Pacific Northwest power program, Sen. Cordón (R-Ore) said Wednesday.

Cordón, the chairman of the Senate appropriations subcommittee on Interior Department funds, did not rule out the possibility of starting new projects but did not appear optimistic for any new starts.

"I don't know what the complete picture will be," he said in an interview, "but the emphasis will be on funds to complete those projects already under way."
