Waterfront Vote Probe Under Way

NEW YORK (AP) — State authorities, on orders from Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, Monday began a round of conferences to explore whether fraud and force influenced last week's waterfront election between two unions.

Members of the State Mediation Board went into session first with officials of the old International Longshoremen's Association, ousted from the AFL on grounds it was gangster-ruled.

The state officials, including Board Chairman Merlyn S. Pitzele and Mediator Jay Kramer, were to meet later today with representatives of the new AFL-ILA, foe of the old ILA in the recent election.

A third meeting will be with the New York Shipping Association, representing shipping and stevedoring firms.

Police Commissioner George P. Monaghan called a meeting of "those of my chiefs familiar with the waterfront" to plan action on Dewey's order.

A third agency included in the Dewey order, the New York-New Jersey Waterfront Commission, did not indicate immediately its intended action in the matter.

Dewey's action came in the form of a statement issued Sunday at Albany. He asked for reports on the bargaining election conducted here last Tuesday and Wednesday by the National Labor Relations Board.

The NLRB starts going over 4,400 challenged ballots Monday, tally which will determine the winner in the struggle between the old International Longshoremen's Assn. (ILA) and the new AFL-ILA. The result may not be known for several days.

A slight lead is enjoyed by the independent ILA, which polled 9,000 of the unchallenged votes. The ILA-AFL got 7,568. More than 3,000 eligible dock workers did not vote.

ILA President William V. Bradley, whose union claims a "clear cut" victory, told a weekend news conference the ILA would feel free to strike after midnight Saturday if the New York Shipping Assn. ignores its demands for negotiations on a new contract.

Insurance Plan Rapped

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Carl T. Curtis (R-Nebr.) says the old age insurance system under social security leaves 60 per cent of the aged unprotected for.

Curtis made public Saturday a memorandum to Chairman Daniel A. Reed (R-N.Y.) of the House Ways and Means Committee. It contained findings on the social security system made by a subcommittee of which Curtis was chairman.

There were no definite recommendations in it, but Curtis said, "I believe that a single program should serve not the few, but all of our aged and dependent children." He said such a program could be achieved by "minor adjustments" already "at hand."

Various separate systems operated by states with federal aid now help some of the aged and children, Curtis said there were 106 systems in all.

Party Leaders Meet In Washington To Decide Congressional Sessions

 WASHINGTON (AP) — The Republican and Democratic party leaders of the Senate arrive in Washington today for conferences that may largely decide whether controversy or cooperation predominates in the 1954 congressional session.

Aides said Senate Majority Leader Knowland (R-Calif.) and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the Democratic leader, will hold conferences in advance of the congressional meeting date, Jan. 6.

It is an election year session. Voting in November on all 435 House seats and 35 of the 96 Senate seats will determine party control of Congress.

Tension therefore is bound to be greater than in 1953, when Knowland and Johnson worked harmoniously on most legislation.

Public statements during the weekend by three Democratic senators marked out some of the lines along which Democrats, almost as numerous in Congress as Republicans, intend to press the majority party. In the Senate the Democrats, although not in control of the legislative machinery, are actually ahead in numbers—48 to 47 Republicans and one independent.

In the House the Republicans have 219 seats, to 215 Democrats and one independent.

Sen. Kefauver of Tennessee urged his fellow Democrats to take

the helm and push a program aimed at reversing what he called "the trend toward government by monopoly and wealth."

Sen. Monroney of Oklahoma, taking strong exception to criticism by Republican Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York of the Truman administration's handling of the Korean War, accused the GOP of "hitting below the belt at the entire Democratic party," and said Democrats themselves could tackle hard.

Sen. Kerr of Oklahoma, a member of the tax-writing Senate Finance Committee, came out for an increase in income tax exemptions.

Much of the success or failure of the broad legislative program that President Eisenhower has promised to submit to the second session of the 83rd Congress may depend on personal relationships between Knowland and Johnson.

One of the first problems facing Knowland and Johnson will be a Senate internal dispute about important committee places for Democrats and Republicans because of the present freak situation with Republicans in control while Democrats hold a numerical majority. The President will spell out to Congress in personal legislative proposals.

Among the major new legislative programs of defense and foreign aid, farm price support, tax, spending, and debt.

There is material for an exchange of ideas on an international peace use of modern amendments to existing laws.

Mine Union Change Asked

BUTTE, Mont. (AP) — Butte Miners Union No. 1 withdrew Sunday from the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers and a neighboring local expressed itself "in union" with the action.

The Butte union directed its officers to apply for a local charter from the United Steelworkers of America (USWA).

In Denver, a representative of IUMM&SW headquarters said the move "came as no surprise," but declined further immediate comment.

Leaders of Anaconda Mine-Mill Local No. 117, which joined the Butte union last October in charging the IUMM&SW leadership was Communist dominated, indicated they also may withdraw from the union and apply for a charter from the USWA.

Joe Mason, president of the Butte union, announced the vote to withdraw was overwhelming. It was evident, he said, "that Butte miners want no part of the Travis-influenced IUMM&SW and its mislabeled policies."

M. E. Travis is secretary-treasurer of the union. He was accused by both the Anaconda and Butte locals of attacking true unionists and using "party-line" tactics to smear leaders.

Bosses Get Red Warning

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prof. Philip Taft of Brown University said Monday a Communist group is likely to take over quickly whenever an employer "destroys" a labor union in his plant.

Communists always are trying to worm their way into labor organizations, Taft said, and succeed when unions are weakened and deprived of trained anti-Red leadership.

Taft's paper was prepared for a discussion of ways to curb Communist influence in labor unions — one of several panel studies featuring the annual three-day meeting of the Industrial Relations Research Assn.

The association is among 10 organizations of scientific and professional groups holding annual meetings here concurrently.

Among the scheduled participants in the discussion of Communist influence in labor unions was a representative of the General Electric Co. That firm recently announced a policy of firing all known Communists from the company and suspending those who refused to deny Red connections.

Maori Tribe Greet Queen

WHANGAREI, New Zealand (AP) — A fearsome, flax-skirted Maori warrior brandished his spear and grimaced awesomely at Queen Elizabeth II Monday on her arrival at New Zealand's most historic spot.

The fearsome greeting was the traditional Maori challenge which used to be made to any visitor to Waitangi village, site of the 1840 Maori treaty under which New Zealand joined the British Empire.

Continuing their commonwealth tour, the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh flew to Waitangi Monday morning from Auckland, 200 miles to the south. Two thousand of the Maori tribesmen slept overnight on the lawn around the Waitangi treaty house to greet a British sovereign for the first time.

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Partially Incubated Duck Eggs Are Delicacy, Means

MANILA (AP) — Balut, a partially incubated duck egg, provides a delicacy for the 20 million people of the Philippines and livelihood for some 30,000.

Balut (pronounced bah-loot) is eaten the year round by rich and poor, young and old, who consider it an appetizing, nutritious food. It has become an important item in the Filipino diet and is recommended, even by professional medical men, as an excellent body-builder.

Balut is the product of simple native ingenuity from which has sprung a thriving industry worth \$1 million dollars a year.

No costly modern machinery—only simple crude native brick-bath—is needed to produce balut.

A duck farm on a river or lake shoreline, bamboo enclosures for the birds, and a hut to house the balut "laboratory" are all one needs to become a balut magnate.

Rows of big bamboo baskets and clay pots make up the lab. The baskets, where the eggs are placed for 15-18-day incubation, are submerged in rice husks which create and hold heat necessary for incubation. When the eggs have turned into two-thirds developed embryos, they are hard-boiled.

Raising the ducks isn't expensive either. They are penned in shallow parts of the river or lake close to the source of their food supply—small, fresh-water clams and snails.

The egg is eaten warm. Its color is the same as any other duck egg, but slightly gray-green. The Filipino gourmet cracks the shell at one end and sips out the juice. He then breaks away the rest, revealing a mixture of yolk and white, webbed with dark-red color.
