One-Time Red Spy Says Communist Espionage In U. S. Employs Hundreds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Igor Gouzenko, whose testimony cracked a Soviet spy ring in Canada, says he thinks there may be hundreds of Red agents operating in the United States.

And he recommended, in a copy-righted interview with the maga-zine U.S. News and World Report made public Monday, that the government "make it worth while for some of them to quit and come out with their documents."

That is what Gouzenko himself did in 1945. He was then a code clerk in the Russian Embassy at Ottawa. He smuggled out docu-ments which led to the cracking of an atomic espionage ring.

Since that time, he and his wife

and two children have been living quietly in Canada, under assumed names, and with government pro-tection.

The Senate internal security sub-committee is now arranging to in-terview Gouzenko in secret, in a search for leads in its search for subversion in the U.S. government.

Sen. Jenner (R-Ind.), the com-mittee chairman, said in a state-ment Saturday night that on the basis of testimony from Ismael Ege, a former Red intelligence of-ficer, "there probably are 25 So-viet spy rings operating in the United States."

Gouzenko, asked to estimate how many Soviet agents might be work-ing in the United States now, re-plied:

"I think it might run into hun-dreds. As some indication, they spend several million dollars in telegrams alone."

Many of these agents, he said, work through rings, perhaps with embassy contacts, and others are "agents residents (who) would work independently and have di-rect contact with Moscow by ra-dio."

Among both types, Gouzenko said, "there are some who learn to like the way people are treated in the United States and Canada."

He said there are Russians who, if assured fair treatment, would break with communism as he did.

He advocated a five-point pro-gram to encourage such defections among Red agents. It would in-clude (1) prompt U.S. or Canadian citizenship, (2) lifelong protection, (3) material security, (4) help in finding employment, and (5) for-mal acknowledgment "that his service . . . entitled him to all as-

sistance and help."

Gouzenko was asked to give his appraisal of the work of Sen. Mc-Carthy (R-Wis.), chairman of the Senate investigations subcommittee and for years a controversial fig-ure because of his searches for Communists in government.

Soviet Newspapers Lower Boom On US Waiters, Ad Men, Tarzan's Movies

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet news-papers have found three new tar-gets for their ire — advertising writers, waiters and Hollywood's Tarzan.

The admen are dull. The waiters reserve their best service for the best tippers. And Tarzan's jungle cry is scaring the chickens and pigs.

Trude, the organ of the Soviet trade unions, set its sights on the ad writers. It accused them, in writing about food, for example, of "a heavy style and complicated language that doesn't make sense."

It cited this example:

"Tangerine juice is liquid fruit — i.e., the liquid part of the pulp

pressed from the tangerine, with all the nutritious parts dissolved in it. 100 grams of tangerine juice gives the body 40 to 60 milligrams of vitamin C, or as they say, one mandose."

A mandose, incidentally, is the dose of vitamins one man needs for a day.

That language, Trude com-mented, would "repulse the most ardent lovers of fruit juice." Let's have ads in verse — "clear, brief and bright" — the paper sug-gested.

Soviet waiters had their inning in Krokodil (crocodile), the popu-lar satirical weekly that also spends many of its punches on the United States and its allies.

Presumably the Soviet citizen is well enough off so he doesn't ex-pect or solicit tips. But it's a rare barber, waiter or taxi driver that refuses one.

As for Tarzan, as played by Johnny Weissmuller, he's one of the biggest drawing cards in the Soviet Union. Lately the jungle films, along with cowboy and pi-rate films, have been shown wide-ly in villages from an open truck. Pravda tells what happens:

"From the continuous screaming and shooting, chickens are awakened from their sleep and panic caused among the livestock in the barns and villages at night."

Blaming Kino Prokat, the So-viet film distributing organization, the Communist party organ de-manded that serious films about Russian scientists, doctors and teachers be shown instead of such "trashy" stuff.

Cardinal Spellman Winds Up Tour

SEOUL (AP) — Francis Cardinal Spellman, who has talked to an estimated 24,000 servicemen in the past six days, neared the end of his Christmas tour of Korea Mon-day.

The white-haired prelate will spend his final two days touring Marine installations and visiting ships of the Navy's Task Force 77.

"The boys did a wonderful job while they were fighting and they are wonderful as they keep watch through the truce," the cardinal said on his return from a visit to front line positions.

Cardinal Spellman has spent the past three Christmas seasons in Korea.

Rhee Blasts Troop Move

SEOUL (AP) — South Korea's Pres-ident and foreign minister con-ferred privately Monday on U.S. plans to pull two divisions out of Korea, an authoritative source said.

Foreign Minister Pyun Yung Tai flew to Chinhae where President Syngman Rhee is vacationing after voicing South Korea's displeasure over the proposed troop withdrawal.

President Eisenhower's Saturday announcement brought cheers from most American soldiers here, and there were enthusiastic speculation as to which divisions would leave Korea.

But Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, 8th Army commander, stressed that "it can be safely assumed that the departure of these divisions will not take place immediately."

Taylor also warned that soldiers with considerable time left to serve in Korea will be transferred to other units. Their places will be filled by men whose tours of duty are virtually complete.

The armed forces radio service Monday broadcast hourly a state-ment telling 8th Army troops, in effect, not to get excited.

The Army promised soldiers ad-ditional information as quickly as it is available.

There were seven American di-visions and part of an eighth in Ko-rea at the time of the armistice and there has been no announce-ment that any had been with-drawn.
