Wallace Denies Red Knowledge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Vice President Henry A. Wallace says he knew of no Communists in the department of Agriculture while he was there, but that he did fire some members of an "extremist city club" who now appear suspect. Wallace, who was secretary of agriculture in the first two terms of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, said in a copyrighted interview in the magazine U. S. News and World Report made public Monday that he heard "nothing that I can remember" about Reds in the department in that period.

"I never met Harold Ware while I was in the department," Wallace said, referring to a man named Ware in testimony before congressional committees as head of communist cell in the Agriculture Department. Wallace continued: "He came into the department as a consultant when either Hoover or Coolidge was president and never was a consultant while I was secretary. As a consultant under Hoover he probably was and I'm just assuming now. New is the chance to cultivate people from the various bureaus of the department."

Wallace's connection with the department, Wallace said, had ended two months before he took office.

"The idea that there might be communists in the Department of Agriculture never was borne in on my mind until Lee Pressman's testimony, which was '49 or '50," Wallace said. Pressman, who once was general counsel of the CIO, testified in August, 1950, he was a member of the Communist party for about a year while employed in the Agriculture Department in the early 1930s. He named others as active with him. Wallace charged Pressman in 1935.

Red Gold May Be In Knox

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said Monday he would not be surprised if he had the Moscow gold in Ft. Knox right now.

He said in an interview that Moscow recently shipped 160 million dollars worth of gold to Britain buy pounds and that London subsequently made a 168 million dollar payment in gold to the United States on its 1946 loan.

At the Minnesota, a member of Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said the shipment of gold from Russia was one indication that the Soviets have been turning their strategy from violence to economic and propaganda warfare.

Other signs, he said, were negotiation of trade pacts with more than 20 nations, including several in the West, and gestures such as release of some prisoners and cent holiday expressions of good will.

"The Russians have at least the second largest gold reserve in the world and this deal shows they are likely to use it to serve the ends of their new campaign," Humphrey said.
