

Rose Bowl All Over But These Remarks:

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The Rose Bowl scene is deserted, winners Michigan State is back home in East Lansing and UCLA is still trying to figure out what happened. In contrast to some years, there have been no serious post-game beefs or valid arguments to offset the Spartan 28-20 triumph last Friday.

Rube Samuelson, Pasadena Star-News, president, Football Writers Assn. of America: "It will go down as one of the best games in all Rose Bowl history. It was distinguished by hard competition but the finest type of sportsmanship before, during, and after the game on the part of the rival universities, coaches and teams."

L. H. Gregory, Portland Oregonian: "It was a terrific game and no apologies are necessary. Michigan State was just too darned and gee-whiz fast. There was no collapse by UCLA, but you just took a long, long afternoon and keep looking good, let alone staying happy."

Prescott Sullivan, San Francisco Examiner: "The Big Ten fifted Pacific Coast Conference football to a new set of leg irons."

Paul Zimmerman, Los Angeles Times: "One of the greatest second half rallies in Rose Bowl history gave Michigan State a 28-20 triumph over UCLA. Not since 1926 when Alabama defeated Washington 30-19 has a team staged a rally comparable."

9 Named To Yank Ski Team

ALTA, Utah (AP) — The nine-member ski team which will represent the United States in Alpine events of the world championships in Sweden next month was named Sunday and planned to leave this week for the East.

The squad of five men and four women includes six who are veterans of last year's Olympic team. The other three have impressive records, but are newcomers to the top national ski scene.

Men: Brooks Dodge, Pinkham North, N.H.; Bill Beck, Kingston, R.I.; Ralph Miller, Hanover, N.H.; Vern Goodwin, Pittsfield, Mass., and Doug Burden, New York City.

Women: Imogene Option, North Conway, N.H.; Jeanette Burr, Seattle; Katy Rodolph, Hayden, Colo.; and Skeeter Werner, Steamboat Springs, Colo.

The American team will compete in the Federation Internationale de Ski at Are, Sweden. Five alternates were named to the men's and one to the women's squads.

The men alternates are: Buddy Werner, Steamboat Springs; Max Marolt, Aspen, Colo.; Darryl Robinson, Salt Lake City; Bill Tibbitts, North River, N.Y.; and Tom Corcoran, Montreal, Canada. Suzi Harmon was selected as the women's alternate. She is from Sacramento, Calif.

The FIS Selection Committee named the team Sunday from a group of the nation's top 23 skiers. Dodge, Beck, Goodwin, Miss Option, Miss Burr and Miss Rodolph were members of the 1952 Olympic squad. Dodge, Miss Burr and Miss Rodolph also are veteran FIS skiers.

Trabert, Lewis Hoad Not Up for Pro Tour

NEW YORK (AP) — Jack Kramer, ex-tennis star, current promoter and future tycoon of the professional game, is interested in no amateur at the moment and that goes for Lewis Hoad and Tony Trabert.

"This whole thing is silly," the former American Davis Cup ace said today before sending his troupe to Madison Square Garden for the second session of their opening 1954 "tournament."

NO FEELERS
"Neither Hoad nor Trabert could hold a racket to my players," Kramer said. "Right now I don't want them and have not sent out any feelers. Naturally, I'm on the lookout for new and good players for the circuit, but right now I'm satisfied with Pancho Gonzales, Pancho Segura, Don Budge and Frank Sedgman."

"Frankly, to my mind, youngsters like Hoad and Trabert have not proved themselves yet. Sure, if one of them makes shambles out of the major tournaments this summer, I'll be interested. What a promoter wouldn't? But I have had absolutely no contact with them to date."

Kramer, who thinks about as he used to serve when he was the world's leading amateur, is varying the script on his tour this year. Tonight, for instance, Gonzales will play Segura for the \$4,000 jackpot of the two-night stand. Budge and

Sedgman will play for the consolation prize.

In yesterday's opening round Gonzales, making a comeback at the tender age of 25, upset Sedgman 3-6, 11-9, 13-11, and Segura copped down Budge, the undisputed ruler of the game in the middle '30s 6-4, 6-2.

"By running the show like a tournament every night we'll give the boys more incentive," said Kramer. "Last year everyone collected his money whether he won or lost. Now the winner each night will collect the major share of the purse."

Mac's Store bulged its lead in the Alley Katz Bowling League last night with a 3-1 win over second-place Safeway. The victory gave Mac's Store a three and a half point lead.

The leaders posted both high game and series in team play, an 869 and total 2482.

Safeway was second with 860 and 2431.

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Northern Divisioners Tip Off for Business

Northern Division basketball teams start playing for keeps this week with Oregon and Idaho leading off the two-month-long scramble for the title won last year by Washington.

The Ducks and the Vandals play Tuesday and Wednesday nights at Eugene, then Idaho moves to Corvallis for games Friday and Saturday nights with Oregon State. Washington and Washington State renew their rivalry the same nights at Pullman.

WSC has one more non-league foe to face — Whitworth at Spokane Monday night.

7-1 RECORD
Idaho, with seven wins and one loss, has the best pre-conference record as the league opens regular competition, and once more carries a dark horse rating.

But Oregon State, with seven wins including an upset of NCAA champion Indiana and three losses (Indiana in overtime, Navy and Tulane) is picked by most observers as the team to beat.

The Beavers were ranked No. 4 nationally in last week's Associated Press poll but are expected to drop after two setbacks in the Dixie Classic at Raleigh, N.C.

CONTENDER
Oregon won eight of the 11 games on its tuneup schedule and is rated by many as another strong title contender. But Washington State, with a 6-4 pre-conference

mark, and Washington, with one of its worst early season records in years, hold few championship hopes as the regular season opens. The Huskies, defending conference champions, have yet to win a game.

Washington State posted its sixth triumph Saturday night while Washington absorbed its eighth straight shellacking.

The Cougars trimmed Eastern Washington College 54-48 in a non-conference game at Pullman, and Washington fell 73-67 before the St. Louis University Billikens in an intercollegiate clash at St. Louis.

Losers Get Slim Welcome

WASHINGTON (AP) — Maryland's vanquished football team returned to a quiet welcome at National Airport Sunday.

About 50 friends and relatives met the chartered plane which returned the Terrapins from their 7-0 loss to Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl. It was a marked contrast from the 3,000 on hand for their arrival from a Sugar Bowl victory two years before.

Coach Jim Tatum commented he was proud of his boys but added: "It was a long way to go without scoring."

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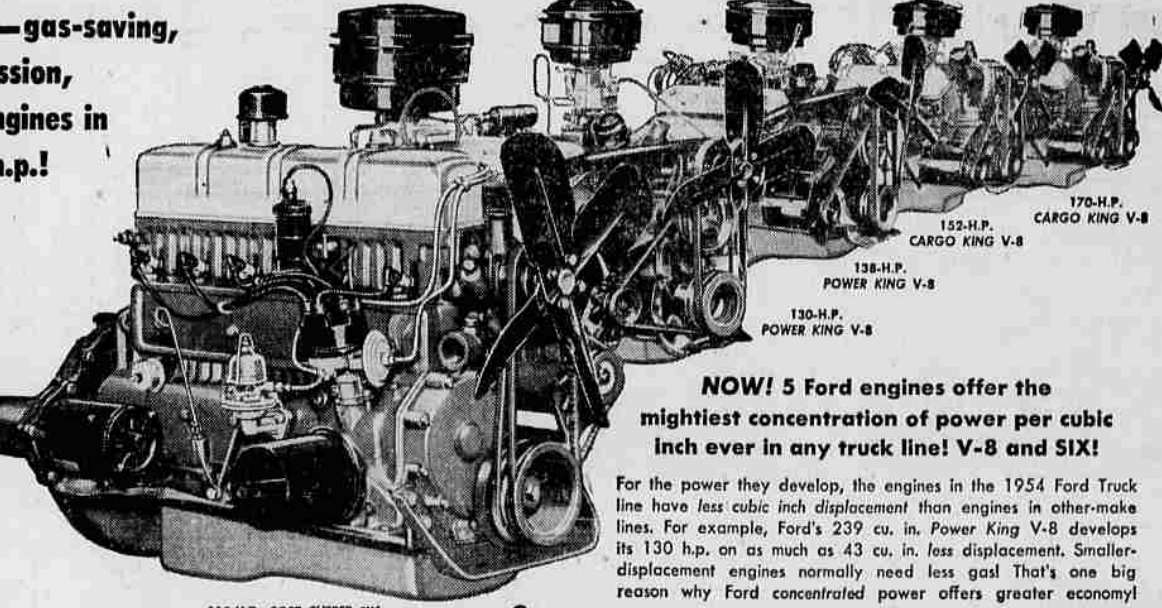
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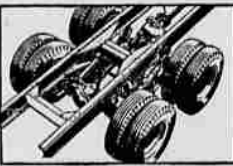


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
