Pioneer May Get New Clubs

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Directors of the Pioneer Baseball League will meet Sunday at Pocatello, Idaho, amid speculation there will be a realignment of the loop's eight teams. The president of the Class C circuit, Claude Engberg, said Tuesday only that the "status of a couple of clubs" would be considered. The Pocatello and Magic Valley teams operated in the red last year. And talk of a realignment has centered around the two Idaho clubs. Butte and Missoula, in Montana, Casper, Wyo., and Grand Junction, Colo., were listed by Engberg as possible new members of the loop. The present Pioneer League lineup consists of Billings and Great Falls in Montana; Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Boise and Magic Valley in Idaho, and Salt Lake City and Ogden, in Utah. The Magic Valley club is owned by fans in the South Central Idaho area, centered by Twin Falls.

Detroit Boxer Wins Fight Twice -- by Kayo, Decision

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — There was only one thing Columbus fight fans were sure of Wednesday: They had seen something new in boxing. They were also pretty certain that a lightweight from Detroit named Marty Marshall can whip Herbie Moore of Cincinnati. They saw him do it twice Tuesday night. First Marshall knocked out Moore in the third round. Then he fought him seven more rounds for a unanimous decision. Both verdicts were apparently official. Marshall at 174 1/2 and Moore at 168 were going along evenly for the first two rounds of their scheduled 10 rounder. Then Marshall all caught Moore with a left hook near the close of the third round. Moore went down. Lou Luzader, counting for the knockdown, quit at the count of eight as Moore started to rise. Referee Mut Schartz, believing Luzader had counted to 10, raised Marshall's hands in victory. Marshall and his handlers broke for their dressing room. The Columbus Boxing Commission decided the referee was wrong and demanded Marshall return to the ring. He refused. The commission got tough: They gave Moore the decision. When that didn't bring Marshall out of his dressing room, the commissioners decided to fine him and suspend him a year. That did it. Marshall was ready to fight. After Marshall and Moore finally got back in the ring, Marshall outlasted his rival for seven more rounds.

Cold Winter Seen for Pro Tour

By GAYLE TALBOT NEW YORK (AP) — Local critics who attended the kickoff of Jack Kramer's latest tennis tour gained the distinct impression that the nonplaying promoter and his troupe of professionals are in for a cold, cold winter financially. Although no official attendance figures were given out for the two-day stand at Madison Square Garden, one experienced observer estimated that no more than 7,500 paid their way in and that Kramer started off with a \$2,500 deficit after meeting expenses, including \$10,000 prize money. Kramer's decision to withdraw from singles play has hurt—that and the fact that he has no new name star fresh from the amateur ranks such as Frank Sedgman was a year ago. It became painfully obvious in Don Budge's first two starts that the once-great star no longer can move about fast enough to compete with the likes of Sedgman, Pancho Gonzales and Pancho Segura. Our exclusive prediction is that Kramer's ailing back will make a miraculous recovery before too many bites have been taken from his bankroll. A man who was there claims he saw scalpers outside the Sugar Bowl on New Year's Day hawking tickets at several dollars less than they were being offered for sale at the box office windows. He said that bowl officials blamed television, rather than the weakness of their attraction, and promised to blackout the New Orleans area next year.

Maranville Dies at 61

NEW YORK (AP) — Walter (Rabbit) Maranville, rated as one of the greatest fielding shortstops in baseball history and a member of the 1914 "miracle" Boston Braves, died last night of a heart attack. He was 61. Death came to the little man, who started his major league career with the Boston Braves in 1912 and wound up with the same club in 1935, at his home in the Woodside section of New York. Burial will be at Springfield, Mass. He is survived by his widow Helene and a daughter, Mrs. Peter McGuinis of Rochester, N.Y. In between the times he played with the Braves, he was a member of the Pittsburgh Pirates, Chicago Cubs, Brooklyn Dodgers and the St. Louis Cardinals. And he managed the Cubs briefly during the 1925 season and piloted the Braves, also for a short period, in 1929. After breaking a leg in a 1934 spring exhibition game with the New York Yankees, the Rabbit wound up his major league career the following year.

TROJANS RALLY FOR 35-34 WIN

The Sacred Heart Trojans came from behind in the second half last night to nip the Tulalake Honkers, 35-34, on the winners' court. Richmond Looks 'In'

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Only a mere formality remains to make Richmond a full-fledged member of the Class AAA International League. The city had four of its citizens—two of whom mortgaged their homes to raise funds—to thank for putting it in business in triple-A baseball. None of the four-member syndicate was identified. The syndicate came up with \$200,000 last night shortly before the International League's midnight deadline for the city to find a park that would meet triple-A specifications. Parker Field will be converted to seat between 10,000 and 12,000 spectators. Frank Shaughnessy, president of the league, said in Montreal last night that Richmond's entrance is a mere formality and described the work of Richmond's mayor, Dr. Ed Haddock, as "wonderful" and "tremendous" in driving for the franchise. The league probably will meet in New York next week to induct Richmond, since 1932 a member of the Class B Piedmont League. At the same time, Havana, Cuba, a member of the Class B Florida International League, will be admitted.

The accurate right arms of passers Zeke Bratkowski of Georgia, Vince Dooley of Auburn and Jim Gray of East Texas Teachers have established the South as a 7-point favorite. The trio will aim their tosses principally at Dreher Gasikin of Clemson and Dave Davis of Georgia Tech, 6 feet 4 ends. RUNNING In the North camp, the accent has been on running, with Brown trying out two potent combinations. One has Northwestern's Dick Thomas at quarterback, Michigan State's Billy Wells and Villanova's Gene Filipski at the halfback positions, and West Virginia's Tom Allman at fullback. In the other, Fordham's Roger Franz directs UCLA's Bill Stits and Wisconsin's Harland Carl at halfback and Maryland's Ralph Felton at fullback.
