Secret Service Agents See Last Of Missing Money

WASHINGTON—Secret Service agents hunted today for \$31,700 still missing in the bold New Year's Eve theft of \$160,000 from the Bureau of Engraving and Printing.

They speculated the search might lead to a fourth arrest in a case that was "cracked" yesterday with the nabbing of a bureau employe, his jauntily dressed wife and a soft-spoken little flagpole painter on a tip furnished—after all-night soul searching—by the father of the woman.

The three are Negroes. They were arrested one after the other in a day that began with a 5 a.m. phone call to Virginia state police by Irving Grant, father of Mrs. Mammie Landis, and ended with the recovery of \$123,300, in three separate caches, of the loot apparently smuggled from the money printing plant in the tail of a suit jacket.

Those accused:

James Rufus Landis, 29, a \$142-an-hour checker in the heavily guarded plant which makes the government's currency. The 6-foot-1 Landis was held in \$50,000 bail on a currency theft charge.

Landis' pretty, 26-year-old wife Mammie, whom he married when she was 14, was held in \$10,000 bail in spite of her firm denial of any knowledge of the theft.

William Giles, 27, the flagpole painter, who freely admitted driving with the Landises to the Fauquier County, Va., tenant cabin of Irving Grant in an effort to hide \$95,000 of the "hot" currency.

Officials said Landis admitted stealing \$8,000 cracking new \$20 bills from their paper coverings and stuffing plain paper in their place. The dummy packages

were not discovered until the long New Year's weekend was over.

"I did it for the future of my family," said Giles, whose arraignment was scheduled today. "I can't give them all the things I want to give them."

Virginia state police said Mrs. Landis' father agreed—when one of his visitors produced a gun—to hide the money after his daughter and her companions dropped in on him Sunday night.

Then, till dawn, he wrestled with his conscience and fear of the law. He told his wife what had happened. She had a heart attack. Finally Grant went to a telephone. He had, he told the police, "a big pile of Treasury money"—and was "scared to death."

Landis—who'd been one of five major suspects all along—the Secret Service said—was picked up at work. He resignedly led agents to a dark corner of the building where another \$32,000 was found. His wife was arrested in their apartment, where agents said \$1,300 was recovered. Then Giles was picked up.

CAMERA CHATTER

"Taking Effective Snow Color Slides"

Now that we've snow in the mountains and the prediction of more to come, it's time for you to take some snow pictures in full color.

However, taking successful snow pictures of this type entails remembering these pointers:

Remember first, when taking pictures in COLOR, unless you have made some provisions to eliminate the reddish cast, you should avoid shooting early in the morning or late in the afternoon. At these hours, the sun, being low, gives off reddish light and will make the snow appear red in the pictures that you expose at these times of the day.

Secondly, the big thing to remember is to avoid dull days in taking your snow pictures. Shoot either on a bright clear day to get those shadows and snow contrast in the scenic views, or a bright high haze to get a softer effect, but still retain that clear crystal white snow.

Using a skylight of haze filter is the third thing you

can do to improve your pictures. This filter will make the sky show as a deeper hue. Contrasted with the snow, this blue makes for effective picture.

The last suggestion on taking interesting snow pictures is to mix in a little action. Pictures of your skiing friends, some children on a sled, youngsters throwing snowballs, making a fort... all interesting, colorful snow pictures.

Old Ticket Paid Up

DORRIS—A bit of ancient history came to light in Justice Les Chase's Dorris court last week and cost an Oakland man a \$50 fine for disregarding a traffic citation issued April 4, 1952, by State Highway Patrolman Charles Brumbaugh.

Arvon Spangler applied to the court to clear up the old yellowed citation, because, said he, the state wouldn't give him a new operator's license.

He had been charged with failure to drive on the right side of the road and having no operator's license.

As Justice Chase pointed out, those offenses could have been settled for \$10 or \$20 at the proper time, but now the price was \$50. Spangler paid.

Chase said the citation was cleared up through the use of a system recently installed by the state. If a motorist disregards a citation, an abstract is filed with the operator's license division to await the time when the culprit applies for a renewal of his right to drive. The license is not issued until he clears up the old traffic ticket.
