Priest Back In Business

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) - Imprisoned Josef Cardinal Mindszenty's former parish secretary has resumed church offices after serving a 4-year prison term. The Cardinal's aide, the Rev. Ondras Zakar, was included on a list of church appointments yesterday in Magyar Kurir, official organ of the Roman Catholic Church in Hungary. The publication disclosed he is now an assistant parish priest in Budapest. The priest was one of six defendants sentenced along with Mindszenty in February 1949. The Cardinal, convicted of treason on charges he plotted against the government and traded in U.S. currency, was sentenced to life in prison. Zakar, charged with failure to report on Mindszenty's activities was given a six-year term. Later it was reduced to four years.

Milk Price Hearing Set

PORTLAND (AP) - The State Board of Agriculture will decide next Monday when to hold another hearing on the proposal to raise milk prices in the Portland-Salem area. Chairman E. Riddell Lage, Hood River, said it probably would be late this month or early in February. The board earlier ordered a cent-a-quart increase for the area, but postponed it on order of Gov. Paul Patterson, who objected to the fact that no prior public notice had been given of the board's meeting. A hearing held after the governor's action brought protests from consumers and some dairymen against a price increase. The board took no action then.

Stokowski, DAR Battle It Out

WASHINGTON (AP) - That battle of the drawn curtains, between orchestra leader Leopold Stokowski and the Daughters of the American Revolution, sputtered out Wednesday night in a torrent of angry words. Stokowski had threatened that if the sound-absorbing curtains weren't pulled back he'd stalk right out of Constitution Hall - it's owned by the DAR - and leave Washington's national symphony orchestra minus a guest conductor. In the showdown, he wound up with a 15-minute, pre-concert speech, and then led the orchestra after all. The curtains stayed put, just as the DAR said they would.

Grade Labeling Of Meat Asked

CORVALLIS (AP) - State sanitary inspection and grade labeling of meat was urged by a consumer committee Wednesday at an Oregon State College livestock and meat marketing conference. The committee recommended adoption of federal meat grading standards. A report from a survey made by the college in seven Oregon cities showed 54 per cent of consumers could not identify different cuts of meat and 88 per cent said they wanted grade labeling. Another 37 per cent said they wanted sanitary inspections, since they suspected sanitary conditions in the meat industry.

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Eisenhower Speech At A Glance:

WASHINGTON (AP) - Topic by topic, here is the gist of major recommendations President Eisenhower made to Congress Thursday, including many to be spelled out in future messages.

Strong Economy—Measures will include flexible credit and public debt policies; tax adjustments to spur spending; loans and guarantees, expanded social security; revised plans for agriculture and foreign trade; advance planning for public works.

Taxes—There will be further reductions later. A broad early revision should include liberalization as to working children, medical expenses and widows and widowers with dependent children; for business, a break on depreciation, research and retained earnings. But scheduled, excise and corporation income tax cuts should not go into effect.

Budget—It will move closer to balance, but a debt limit rise is needed.

Agriculture—Supports should become flexible, but without sudden price drops, to stimulate consumption. Existing supports should be "insulated" from trade channels through such programs as relief and emergency stockpiles.

Defense—Emphasis is on nuclear weapons and air power. Some information on use of atomic weapons should be shared with friends. Continental defense is being strengthened. The United States should participate in developing the St. Lawrence waterway as a security measure. The services' fringe benefits should be used generously.

Atomic Energy-for-Peace Proposal—A truly constructive Soviet reaction would hold great hopes for peace.

Foreign Affairs, Foreign Assistance and Trade—U.S. policy includes readiness in Korea and support of its free government; continued help against Communists in Indochina, retaining Okinawa, support of the European Defense Community and the United Nations. Military and technical assistance should continue to friends; economic assistance in most places except Korea can be reduced. The Defense Department should have main responsibility for military aid. Trade should be freer.

Internal Security—Persons convicted of conspiring forcibly to overthrow the government in the future should lose their citizenship. Health—The government can help private health plans with reinsurance.

Suffrage—A Constitutional amendment to lower the voting age to 18 should be submitted; Hawaii should promptly be made a state.

Labor and Welfare—The Hartley act should be proposed along lines to be proposed. Employment insurance should be extended to 6 1/2 million now covered and social security to an additional 10 million.

Housing—A program was presented including low interest time loans and aids for construction.

Conservation—The program should continue to control flood control and power too big for local development strengthen its agricultural and flood prevention programs.

Highways—The proposed cent gasoline tax cut was cancelled. The government should continue its central role in highway work.

Post Office—Recommendations should be made. Education—The federal government should help states build necessary schools.

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
