**Patronage
Nears
100 Mark**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Republican National Committee has a list of about 5,000 persons who are in the Eisenhower nomination. And there are only 100 political jobs open. The figures were supplied to the committee today, the start of a session of Congress, a signal for a jump in political job openings. Eisenhower has 12 positions to fill. Four of them were learned, are about to be filled, and four more are going through the screening process, and are open for recommendation by state patronage organizations. The GOP committee's patronage clearing house for federal jobs outside the civil service system within the merit system is doing its patronage operation that 15 persons are now on a list of 34 used to be officials say the operation is under way. The committee freely concedes there are a number of jobs despite a record of job placements since the Eisenhower administration began. The committee doesn't count hundreds more jobs directly through Republican party and representatives. There are still not enough jobs for many party officials command and there are too many party campaign contributions still on the federal payroll. Similar complaints have been heard in Capitol Hill.

**Unemployment
Seen**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The nation's unemployment rolls—swelled by the discharge of temporary Christmas help—will grow to over two million this month, government officials forecast Wednesday. On Tuesday, the Commerce Department's Census Bureau reported a \$2,000 rise in joblessness in December, attributing most of this to a seasonal winter drop in farm employment. There was little change in non-farm employment. The bureau said 1,850,000 Americans were out of work last month, only one of 1953 in which unemployment was higher than the preceding month of the previous year. Total civilian employment last month, the bureau said, stood at 79,000—below December totals in 1951 and 1952.

**"Poor Sailor"
Killed By Police**

OAKLAND (AP)—Last night's police were so moved by a "sailor's" tale of losing \$2,200 a pickpocket they assigned two officers to the case. Today, officers said, the "sailor" is actually an escaped California convict on the lam. And the "hard-earned" sea-duty earnings he spoke of came from Long Beach tavern burglar, they said. A man identified as John Charles, 26, was jailed for questioning in burglary here. Officers said he admitted escaping from a Santa Rita rehabilitation center, California Nov. 19. He is being held for West Coast authorities.

**Widow Wins Own
Insurance Policy**

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A 96-year-old Salt Lake City man yesterday named the beneficiary of his own life insurance policy. The man, Severo B. Tuttle, took out the policy in 1894. His premium payments ended in 1899. The Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York said Tuttle had outlived the life span covered by mortality tables. The insurance firm said he named himself as beneficiary of a \$1,500 policy when he took it out 59 years ago.

**Railroads Granted
Rate Boost**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The railroad industry and the Post Office Department Wednesday agreed on a 10 per cent increase in charges for the railroads for carrying mail. Postal officials estimated it would increase the revenues of the railroads by about 30 million dollars a year. A formal proposal for the 10 per cent increase was laid before the Interstate Commerce Commission for approval jointly by representatives of the post office and the railroads. It was offered as a substitute for a railroad petition of last June for a 6 per cent advance in mail rates.

**Warrant To Be Used
In Warrant Job**

SAKRA (AP)—Warrants for the arrest of delinquent personal income taxes will be served in this year for the first time. Tax Collector Ruth Klavans reported. Mrs. Klavans said a sheriff has been unable to serve warrants in many of the rural areas of the county.

An agreement between the operators and the International Woodworkers of America (IWO) calls for a 10 per cent wage increase and a company-wide maintenance of living clause. It was a formula.
