The Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball picture Saturday was as confused as a platter of scrambled eggs topped with a liberal helping of Hungarian goulash.

With the exception of the Washington Huskies, who just keep on losing, things aren't running to form in the circuit.

Oregon State, tabbed at the start of the season as the team to beat, got the jitters in its loop opener with Idaho Friday night and wound up nursing a 70-65 setback.

NUMBER 10

Oregon State, conquerer of defending NCAA champion Indiana in pre-season play, was ranked the 10th best team in the country in the latest Associated Press poll.

The Huskies, who haven't been able to bring, borrow or steal a victory this season, tangled with Washington State and came out on the short end of a 56-48 score. The fifth member of the circuit, Oregon, drew a bye.

The Huskies were trying hard as the game went into its final minutes, but Tippy Dye's charges couldn't get up the steam to twist the Cougar's tail. Ron Bennink was high scorer for the game, contributing 22 points to WSC's total.

Washington grabbed a 46-45 lead with three minutes to go, but Bennink pilfered a Washington pass and hit the twine for a two-pointer that put the Cougars ahead for keeps.

All around team play accounted for Idaho's win over OSC's Beavers, despite the 32-point scoring effort of skyhook Swede Halbrook. The Vandals took charge of the game after a shaky first 15 minutes.

High scorer for Idaho was Dwight Morrison, with 22 points.

The win gave Idaho two victories and one loss in conference play, the loss being to Oregon last Tuesday night.

Maduro Shot in Arm To Triple-A League

TRIP between Richmond and Havana twice each season. The distance is impressive. It will cost Maduro an estimated \$60,000 annually, and you gain some idea of the way the man operates.

Last season he bought the Havana club of the Class B Florida International League for an estimated \$30,000 and lost that much again in its operation. Far from discouraging Maduro, the experience only convinced him that all he needed was to give Havana a higher classification.

ENTHUSIASM

One can well imagine with what enthusiasm that kind of talk was received by representatives of big league clubs which have been accustomed to meeting the losses of their farm teams in the circuit.

If Maduro knows his countrymen's appetite for baseball as well as he thinks he does, every team in the league might show a nice profit next season.

That Havana will be given a ball club capable of fighting for the leadership all the way may just about be taken for granted.

The Havana team will, obviously, offer an ideal spot for the farming out of players from Cuba, Puerto Rico and all the Latin-American countries who have in recent years played an increasingly important role in the big leagues.
