## New Jersey Solon Gets In On Tax Cutting Act With Proposal On Corporations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Kean (R-NJ) today proposed a compromise of sharp differences over corporation income tax rates which now divide key House tax writers and the Eisenhower administration.

Significant as one of the first public moves in this direction, Kean's proposal would (1) continue the present 52 per cent corporate income tax rate through 1954 and (2) lower it to 50 per cent effective next Jan. 1.

President Eisenhower has asked Congress to keep corporate taxes where they are for another year. But a number of GOP tax writers on Capitol Hill, and some Democrats, favor letting it drop to 47 per cent as scheduled April 1.

There have been suggestions that an April 1 compromise of 50 per cent might be reached. Kean, a member of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee, adopted that figure but said he would urge that it not be put into effect until the start of 1955.

Eisenhower, in his State of the Union message Thursday, asked Congress to cancel not only the corporation tax cut due April 1 but also scheduled reductions in excise taxes.

"Because of the present need for revenue," the President said, "the corporation income tax should be kept at the current rate of 52 per cent for another year, and the excise taxes scheduled to be reduced on April 1, including those on liquor, tobacco, gasoline and automobiles, should be continued at present rates."

Rep. Daniel A. Reed (R-NY), chairman of the Ways and Means Committee and a champion of tax reductions, is expected to oppose strenuously any such course in federal tax policy. Opposition has been voiced by other senior committee Republicans.

## Pickup Leads To Jail Rap

EPHRATA (AP) — A 30-year-old Korean war veteran arrested for picking up two young servicemen hitch-hikers didn't get a chance after all to serve the 6 day jail sentence he chose as a matter of principle instead of paying a \$15 fine.

After one night behind bars, Walter Stark was shoved out of the county jail Friday evening when a man who signed only as "John Doe" plunked down the \$15 for the fine and left.

Stark earlier had rejected a number of offers by persons to "pick up his tab."

He was arrested by the State Patrol early New Year's morning when he stopped between Soap Lake and Ephrata to give two Larson Air Force Base airmen a ride.

Justice Ernest Nickel, who passed sentence, said he was convinced Stark was not aware he was violating the law against picking up hitch-hikers. Stark said just trying to do a good deed.

The airmen Dennis Nelson, M. D. Kucera, both 18, were guilty in Soap Lake Junction to hitch-hiking charges and fined \$10 apiece.

## P. Stadelman Dies at 82

THE DALLES (AP) — Peter J. Stadelman, Oregon secretary of State in 1934 and 1935, died at his home here Sunday after a short illness. He was 82.

Stadelman, who was appointed to the post by Gov. Julius Meier, also served as a Republican state senator from Wasco and Hood River counties from 1936 to 1947. He was city councilman at The Dalles from 1908 to 1914 and mayor from 1918 to 1928.

He founded the Stadelman Ice and Fruit Co. a number of years ago. The firm now operates a number of plants in Oregon and Washington. Stadelman also was a founder and the first president of the Citizens National Bank here.

Survivors include two sons, Wilbur and George, and a brother, Joseph, all of The Dalles.
