Fourteen Amendments To Taft-Hartley Law Asked By Ike Of New Congress

WASHINGTON (U)—President Eisenhower Monday asked Congress to adopt 14 amendments to the Taft-Hartley labor law, including a provision that workers must vote approval of any strike before it can go into effect. The President reiterated his conviction that the Taft-Hartley act is "sound legislation." But he said experience gained during the seven years the law has been in effect, indicates that changes are needed "to reinforce its basic objectives."

1st National Releases '53 Figure

Year-end statements of condition figures released by the Klamath Falls Branch of First National Bank of Portland show that on December 31, 1953, deposits at the branch were \$16,599,504.61 and loans were \$1,413,640.20. Announcement of the totals were made by R. H. Tisdale, manager of the local branch. Released at the same time were comparable totals for the branch for December 31, 1952. On that date, deposits were \$17,638,942.99 and loans were \$1,782,430.42.

Dr. George H. Adler, county coroner, issued a statement in which District Attorney Alderson concurred in which he said no inquest was held necessary in the slaying of Edwin Coyle, 31-year-old Portland stonemason, by City Policeman James O'Neal.
