

# Baby Dies Because Couple Refuse Transfusion; Pair Say It Against Religion

CHICAGO (AP) — An 8-day-old boy died early today, several hours after his young parents had refused on religious grounds to permit doctors to give him a blood transfusion.

The parents had been summoned into Family Court today on a petition to declare them unfit parents and make their infant a ward of the court.

The parents, Thomas Grzyb, 20, and his wife Barbara, 18, yesterday refused to sign a waiver which would have permitted an immediate Family Court hearing on the question of legally forcing a transfusion. Both are members of the Jehovah's Witnesses religious sect. The case was brought to the court's attention by Dr. Herman N. Bundesen, Board of Health president, after he was informed of the child's condition by officials at St. Anthony's Hospital and the baby's physician, Dr. Isadore Lerner.

Dr. Lerner said the couple's son, Thomas Jr., had needed a transfusion since birth. He said last night the baby had been in a state of shock since an operation for an abdominal obstruction Tuesday.

"The baby is getting weaker by the minute," Dr. Lerner said last night. "I almost got on my knees begging the parents to allow a blood transfusion. The best we are doing now is with transfusions of glucose."

But the baby died early today at the hospital. The parents were not there, an official said.

"If the baby dies, that is God's will," the young mother had said as she and her husband refused to allow the transfusion. "I have no fear. The blood won't make any difference. I am not going to hand him over to the court until I have to. The judge doesn't care what's in the Bible."

Sister Mary Michael of the hospital's pediatric section said she had told the young couple yesterday their baby's life depended on a blood transfusion. She added:

"But the father told me, 'Our belief won't allow it. It's better to have a dead baby without the blood than a living baby with the transfusion.'"

The parents had contended the injection of blood into the veins is the same as eating blood, which their claim is forbidden by the Bible.

## Court Rules On Road Use

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that the Highway Commission doesn't have to pay property owners for denying them access to new highways.

All that the owners should get, the court ruled, is the actual loss when the Highway Commission takes over their land for right of way.

The opinion, by Justice James T. Brantley, upheld Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker, Polk County, in awarding \$3,000 to nine defendants.

However, the high court ordered further hearing before Judge Walker, who will be required to decide how the \$3,000 should be split among the defendants.

The defendants claimed they should have received separate verdicts, and that they should also have received damages for being denied access to the highway.

Justice Brand's opinion said the defendants weren't entitled to anything for loss of access.

The case was brought by the Highway Commission against Earl C. Burk and wife, Pearl, O. V. Couey, Clyde Rogers and wife, Ted J. Patzer, C. O. Galloway and wife, and E. J. Winkenwerder.

# Bonanza Cemetery Issue Eyed

Petitions for and against the proposed formation of Bonanza Memorial Cemetery District were presented to the County Court at a hearing held in the court room Wednesday morning.

The petition for the formation of the district suggests an area composed of 452.235 acres with a total assessed valuation of \$1,700,540 be included in the district and a tax established against this acreage to support the cemetery district.

Lloyd Gift, Langell Valley rancher, acted as spokesman for the group favoring the formation and several persons from the audience spoke in opposition to the project.

Vincent Bosquet, representing the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, objected to the inclusion of several thousand acres of forest land owned by the timber company, and stated that this land is already on the tax rolls as tree farm land. The inclusion of this section into the proposed district would have little effect on the amount of tax received by the district, Bosquet concluded.

Following a brief interpretation of the Oregon statutes pertaining to formation of a cemetery district by Attorney Ben Goddard the meeting was continued until 10 a. m. Jan. 27, to give County Court members a chance to check the assessment rolls to determine whether or there were not enough names on the opposition petition to necessitate holding a special election.

According to law, 25 per cent or more of the legal voters within the proposed district must sign the petition against the proposal to force an election to be held. Should less than 25 per cent sign up against the proposed district an election is not necessary and the district may be formed by action of the court.

## Hot Rodders Now Giving Aid On Highways

NEWTON, Mass. (AP) — Hot rod drivers to Mrs. James Farrey of Needham were always a group given to whizzing about the countryside in old autos.

That's what she thought of them — until yesterday.

Stalled when the chains on her car snapped and tangled around the axle, Mrs. Farrey was helped by a motorist who stopped and volunteered his aid.

Despite the near-zero temperature, the young man worked quickly and efficiently until the chains were cleared. She offered to pay him but the youth refused, instead handing her a card which read:

"You have just been assisted by the Nomads of Newton, a hot rod club devoted to the better understanding between the rodder and the public."

## Youth Has Long Trip to Grandma's

ATLANTA (AP) — Fifteen-year-old Warren Shuey Jr. was homesick for Dixie and his grandmother's fried chicken — so he pedaled his bicycle about 700 miles from Washington, D. C., to Atlanta.

Warner said he left home on his bicycle Jan. 6 and that his parents thought he was headed for school. Instead, he kept on pedaling southward.

He traveled about 100 miles a day and slept in tourist courts at night. His baggage was limited to a couple of extra shirts and his Bible.

"I read my Bible every night and then prayed that I was doing the right thing," Warren said.

Mrs. Beulah Bramont, the grandmother, said the parents have given permission for Warren to remain with her.

The Shuey family formerly lived in Atlanta.

## Accordionist Due Back In Civvies

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Sgt. Richard J. Contino, 44,000-a-week accordionist in civilian life who entered the Army after a prison term for draft evasion, will return from Korea next Tuesday aboard the transport General Gordon.

And he will soon be back in civilian life and the show business, his family said in Pasadena.

The 23-year-old Contino is one of 375 Army troops and 324 Marines coming back on the Gordon. Fellow soldiers in Korea said they found him a "regular guy."

## Godfrey Faces Flying Count

NEW YORK (AP) — The Port of New York Authority, brushing aside Arthur Godfrey's contention that a strong cross-wind caused his plane to nearly hit the Teterboro (N.J.) airport control tower, has accused the radio-TV star of careless and reckless flying.

Godfrey had said earlier, and repeated Wednesday night on his television show, that a 70-degree cross-wind of about 40 miles per hour caught his twin-engine craft just as he took off from Teterboro on Jan. 7.

From Miami Beach Godfrey said:

"It was unintentional; and if I scared the boys in the tower I am sorry."

Later, Fred M. Glass, director of aviation for the Port Authority, which operates the major airports in the New York metropolitan area, including Teterboro, said he noted Godfrey's explanation but told the Civil Aeronautics Administration:

"It is difficult for any one familiar with the aerodynamics and the characteristics of the DC3 (Godfrey's plane) to believe that wind of that velocity reported could possibly cause such a maneuver if the pilot and co-pilot wished to keep the plane on course."

## Embezzling Shows Percentage Gain

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP) — It's not the high cost of living that causes bank embezzlements. It's the cost of high living.

That's the explanation of a Washington, D. C., certified public accountant, who said last night 110 banks in 34 states had been forced to close during the last 20 years because of embezzlements.

Lester A. Pratt told the Central New York Conference, National Assn. of Bankers and Auditors:

"Desire takes on many forms, but for the most part they can be grouped under the heading of 'slow horses and fast women.'"

## Ex-Wife Blesses Husband's Wedding

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Betty Jane (Beety) Wynn, former wife of Keenan Wynn, says she has no objections to the actor's marriage last Friday to Shirley Jean Hudson in Puerto Rico, but Beety's lawyer says the marriage is bigamous.

Beety got an interlocutory decree last May, on cruelty grounds. "It won't be final until next May," said S. S. Hahn, her attorney. "His latest marriage is bigamous and can be annulled in a minute."

But Beety, Wynn's second wife, said yesterday, "I don't want to disturb Keenan and his new wife at all. I wish them all the happiness in the world."

## STOP

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Nineteen persons were hurt — none seriously — when a crowded San Francisco cable car slammed to a halt yesterday, tossing passengers to the street and jarring its front windows from their frames. The sudden stop was caused by the car's brake hitting an obstruction.

# Special Events Division Of March Of Dimes Drive Has Plenty Irons In Fire

The special events division of the March of Dimes has a lot of irons in the fire for the benefit of halting the dreaded crippling, polio.

Dimes in parking meters netted the drive \$35 the first day of operation Saturday, Jan. 9, according to Police Chief Orville Hamilton.

Tags on the meters, put on by local Boy Scouts under the direction of Jack Smith, head of the Boy Scouts, inform drivers of automobiles that a dime won't register the meter, but it may help some child walk again.

In observance of the March of Dimes drive, which is slated to run through Jan. 31, Lucky Lanes Bowling Alley has agreed to divert penalty pay to the campaign.

Traditionally, anyone who doesn't mark in a frame buys cokes for the crowd, or some such thing. During the week of Jan. 17 to 22, however, anyone not scoring will contribute to the March of Dimes.

Polio irons are still up in five locations — the Pelican Cafe, Willard Hotel, Wong's Cafe and the Chuck Wagon. The trees consist of an empty jug with a candle. ## Moslem Unit Members Held

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — A high official source said today 168 members of the Moslem Brotherhood have been arrested in the government's crackdown on the religious-political organization.

President Mohammed Naguib's government outlawed the once-powerful brotherhood in Egypt yesterday and launched a roundup of its leaders. Those taken into custody are under "temporary arrest," officials said today. They explained that no charges would be made pending an investigation.

The police swooped down on the brotherhood in Cairo, Alexandria, the Suez Canal zone and other key centers following an outbreak at Cairo University between its members and supporters of the government-backed Liberation Rally.

The brotherhood, claiming two million followers throughout the Middle East, strives for close government adherence to Islamic religious dictates in the Arab nations.

## Lodge Compares Himself, Russian

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., the United States' chief delegate to the United Nations, in Dallas last night, gave the difference between him and Andrei Vishinsky, the Russian chief delegate.

"Vishinsky is an individual who follows instructions regardless of their nature," Lodge said. "He is very closely held."

"I'm told: 'Now, Lodge, you know what the policy is. Don't be running to Washington all the time.'"
