Platoon Grid Rule To Stay

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — College football must keep its one-platoon system and must get rid of such practices as the faked injury and the sucker shift.

This verdict was handed down yesterday by the Football Rules Committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn.

The committee turned down all efforts to liberalize the limited substitution rule which went into effect last season and proved immensely popular with football fans.

The most surprising development of the meeting was the strong condemnation of such "nonethical" practices as injury faking to stop the clock and false starts intended to pull the opposition offside.

SLAP — What appeared to be mainly a slap at Notre Dame, the committee unanimously approved a resolution declaring that injury faking is "dishonest, unsportsmanlike and contrary to the rules."

Notre Dame players were accused last season of feigning injuries in the Iowa game to stop the clock and gain time for touchdowns in the closing seconds of each half. These scores enabled the Irish to escape with a 14-14 tie.

During the 1952 season Notre Dame figured most prominently in several sucker shift incidents. Last season, there were reports of such incidents in the Southeastern and Missouri Valley conferences.

INTEGRITY — The Rules Committee said that, for the present, it would "rely on the integrity of the coaches and players rather than upon further legislation" to wipe out these unethical procedures.

If this doesn't succeed, Committee Chairman H. L. (Fritz) Clifton of the University of Michigan said, the rule book will be rewritten. Committee Secretary E. E. Wieman of the University of Denver said minor revisions may be made in the substitution rule in the future, but "two-platoon football is dead as a duck."

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BIG JOB

Alvin Christie, Oregon Tech's 130-pound entry, draws the dubious honor Saturday night of meeting Portland State's heralded Lee Allen when the Vikings invade Hilltop Court for a mat meet with Bob Smith's Owls. Allen is the most illustrious of a top-drawer Portland State team, was four-time state champion at Sandy High and holds two National AAU titles. Tech Matmen Host Vikings

The most surprising athletes on the local sports scene, Bob Smith's Oregon Tech wrestlers, have a job cut out for them Saturday night on the mile-high campus floor, a job the experts say the freshmen Owls aren't up to, despite their amazing 36-0 win over the University of Oregon last week in their intercollegiate wrestling debut.

Portland State, an established mat power in the Northwest, brings its team here to tangle with the "upstart Techers," 8 o'clock on OTI's basketball court.

Smith may make a few switches in his lineup—he's still mum—but it's expected not to vary much from the team that won all eight bouts from the Webfoots.

That team consisted of 123-pound Larry Dryden, Alvin Christie 130, Don Earle 137, Vic Schweitz 147, Fred Stepper 157, Dean Schmitt 167, Kent Crawley 177 and heavyweight Floyd Pierce.

The most herculean job falls to Christie who will face the Vikings' Lee Allen, outstanding 130-pounder who was four-time state champion at Sandy High School and holds two National AAU titles. Allen is one of the most publicized wrestlers on the coast.

Other Portland State entries are Roy Schlessner in the 123-pound class; 137-pound Leroy Russell; Joe Casale, state champion runner-up at Parkrose High in the 147-pound division; state high school champion Buzz Wheatley, 157 pounds; Jack McElroy, a 167-pounder; Earl Nutt in the 177-pound class; and heavyweight Darold Farr, who at 225 pounds will outscale Pierce 35 pounds.

This first year for the Oregon Tech wrestlers is a "make or break" season, a successful campaign would mean the sport sticks. The Owls, who threw a bombshell into Northwest college mat circles in their shutout over the Ducks, age old and running.

But a win over Portland State would go down as a distinct upset.

Bucs Get 2 Players, \$80,000 for Dickson

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Owner Bob Carpenter of the Philadelphia Phillies and General Manager Branch Rickey of the Pittsburgh Pirates both had that "cat-that-ate-the-canary" look today: Carpenter because he separated Rickey from his prize pitcher; Rickey because he separated Carpenter from \$80,000 in much-needed cash plus two utility players.

The deal, completed yesterday, sent Pirates' righthander Murry Dickson to the Phillies for infielder Jack Lohrke, pitcher Andy Hansen and the \$80,000.

TOP STAFF — Carpenter promptly declared that the addition of the 37-year-old Dickson gave the Phillies the top pitching staff in the National League. Rickey, whose recent request for more working capital was turned down by club executives, reported that he was pleased with the deal.

The Phillies have been after Dickson ever since the 1951 season when he won 20 games for the Pirates, who also finished eighth that year.

Carpenter envisioned his 1954 pitching squad consisting of 10 players: Robin Roberts, Curt Simmons, Dickson, Bob Miller, Thornton Kipper, Jim Konstanty, Steve Ridenik, Johnny Lindell, Karl Drews, and bonus rookie Tommy Quitters.

The Phillies' president said that Dickson, despite his relatively advanced years, should have at least two good years.

"Dickson pitches with an easy motion that doesn't take much out of his arm," a club spokesman said. "If he can win 10 games for the Pirates, his 1953 record, he certainly should do as well or much better with our defense behind him."

Dickson, commenting on the trade at his Leavenworth, Kan., home, agreed.

"It's easier to pitch when you have a better infield behind you," Dickson said. "The fellows we had (in Pittsburgh) needed more experience and his went through them that older and more experienced players probably would have stopped."

Asked about his reputation for giving up home run balls — he set a record of 39 in 1948, with the St. Louis Cardinals — Dickson declared:

"With the Phils' infield, I'll be able to throw that low, inside pitch more often for the double play, instead of trying to throw a fast one past the batter for the third strike."

Dickson's acquisition may open the way for further trades. The Phillies spokesman commented on this saying that the club is now so deep in pitchers that it might be able to swing another trade that would net some badly needed batting punch. But he hastened to add that no other deal was actually in the works as yet.

Now all Carpenter has to do is come to terms with Roberts, Simmons, outfielders Richie Ashburn, Jackie Mayo and Clyde Schell, and catcher Smokey Burgess, all of whom have expressed dissatisfaction with 1954 offers.

NEW YORK (AP) — Kid Gavilan gets the Ed Neil award Thursday night and the rest of the boxing game gets the "business" from the writers in the "Fistic Follies of 1954" at the Hotel Astor.

The Ohio Flyers blew a six-point lead in 80 seconds and bowed to Western Kentucky 79-75 in a triple overtime battle. The victory was No. 15 for Western, longest unbeaten streak in the nation.

Just a year ago Dayton wrecked Seton Hall's string of 27 triumphs, longest ever compiled by a major college in a single season.

TIES SCORE — The Flyers led the fifth-ranking Hilltoppers until the final minutes of regulation time. In the first overtime they built a 64-50 advantage with 80 seconds to play. But Western fought back and tied the score on Jack Sallee's driving jump shot with two seconds left.

Tom Marshall collected a field goal and two foul shots early in the third overtime and the Flyers never again caught up.

Oklahoma City University, No. 8, whipped Houston 70-62 in the only other action involving ranking teams. Arnold Short scored 18 points in the first quarter and ended the night with 41 for the Oklahomaans.

FAST — Bradley, coming fast after three early season setbacks, scored a surprisingly easy 76-59 decision over St. Louis for its eighth straight triumph.

Both the Navy and the Army won. The Middies beat Rutgers 75-61 after trailing at halftime, and the Cadets outlasted Swarthmore 74-41 with Bill Hannon scoring 31 points.

Syracuse, the only team to beat Cornell this season, did it for the second time, 71-69, on a 20-foot shot by Mel Bedin with six seconds to play.

Penn State defeated West Virginia 74-65 with a rally in the last five minutes after the lead had changed hands 10 times.

Bob Schafer, one of the country's most prolific scorers, collected 37 points as Villanova breezed past Kings College of Pennsylvania.
