

President's Social Plan Given Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower lays before Congress today his plans for bigger benefits, broader coverage and other sweeping changes in the social security system.

to spell out details of the legislative program outlined generally in his State of the Union address one week ago today.

Already his detailed farm and labor proposals have stirred sharp controversy, some of it within his own party. The field of social security—directly touching the lives of most Americans—would hardly be less controversial.

Eisenhower also promised "substantial benefit increases." About six million retired workers, their wives, widows or orphans, are drawing monthly payments from the program now.

This would be expected to be popular, especially in a congressional election year such as this one, if critics are satisfied the benefits are financed properly.

About 45 million workers are contributing payroll deduction taxes to the special social security trust fund, now approaching 19 billion dollars.
