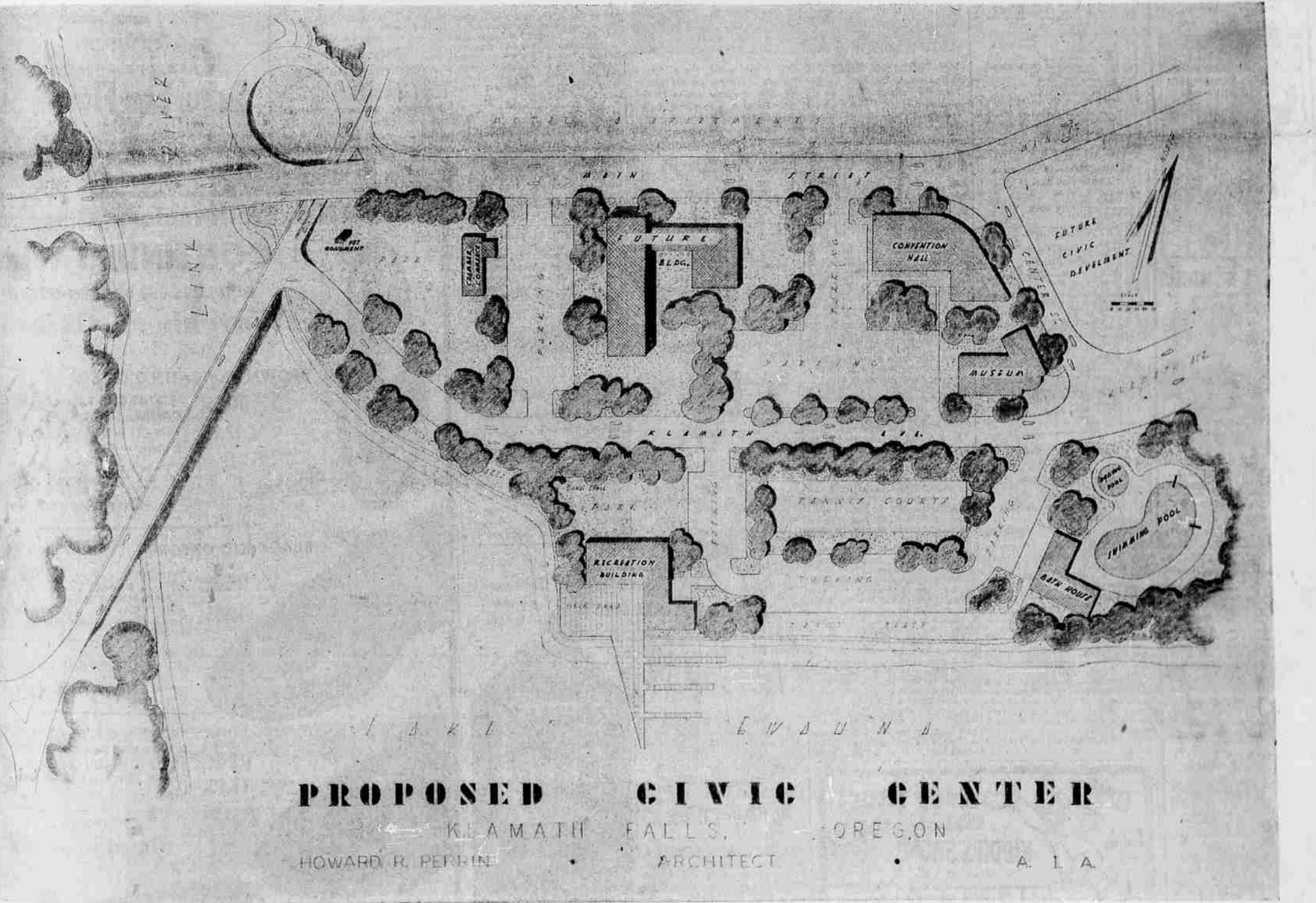

# "Dream On Paper" Shows Colorful Civic Center Plan For Klamath

An architect's dream on paper some day civic center has been sketched by Howard Perrin, chairman of the City Planning Commission.

The dream picture has been sketched as a possibility by the Park and Planning Commission of the City Council.

The ground plan was made following studies in connection with the park development and a civic center on the area set aside for Veterans Memorial Park and potential development in the area along the waterfront.

The commission thought that the site could be developed in various stages, with perhaps a recreation building on the lakefront as the first step after seeding and grassing by the Park Board.

Although the plan also contemplates a band concert shell just northwest of this building, it is conceivable that sand could be brought in and a sandy beach formed extending from the boat house toward a bathhouse where a location could be reserved for another swimming pool.

It was hoped that the Veterans Memorial Shrine or other such feature might be placed in this area, and this hope is indicated on the drawing.

The interesting thing about the project is the large amount of parking area and easy traffic circulation provided.

The Planning Commission foresees some such type development as a distinct asset to the city of Klamath Falls, but at present it remains only a dream in the minds of Park Board, Planning Commission and City Council members.
