Gavilan received the Edward J. Neil Memorial Plaque as Fighter of the Year, an award named in memory of the former Associated Press boxing writer who was killed while covering the war in Spain.

Dr. Nardiello, former boxer and New York State Athletic Commission physician for many years, was given the James J. Walker Plaque for "long and meritorious service" to the sport.

Patterson, 165-pound Olympic champion in 1952, accepted the James Dawson Memorial Plaque as Rookie of the Year.

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Michigan State Football Coach Clarence "Biggie" Munn was scheduled to be appointed MSC athletic director today.

The stepup for Munn, coach of the Rose Bowl champions, wasn't unexpected.
