Pressure Builds For More Trade With Red Areas

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pressures are mounting on the Eisenhower administration to lower some of the cold war barriers so as to permit more trade between the United States and Russia and its satellites.

Many top officials responsible for international economic policy feel some decisions will have to be made fairly soon. Meanwhile, splits appear to be developing between the interests favoring trade and those wishing to maintain maximum economic pressure on the Communist bloc.

The issue may come into focus upon an application by Minnesota businessman Dwayne Andreas for permission to export 20,000 tons of butter and 3,000 tons of cottonseed oil to Russia. These are not strategic materials and there is no policy barrier against them except a general policy under which the government reserves the right to bar any exports to Russia contrary to the security interests of the United States.

Officials said today the Andreas application is now before an inter-departmental committee made up of representatives of the State, Agriculture and Commerce departments. It deals with broad issues of economic security embracing the particular problem of East-West trade. This, of course, is not exclusively an American problem. In fact, it has been mostly an Allied problem.

There are several forces pressing strongly for official sanction of greater trade with the Soviet Union and satellite countries. They are:

1. The development of a buyer's market — meaning a supply of goods running consistently above the demand.

2. The accumulation of vast stores of surplus agricultural commodities in the United States.

3. A slow move toward general easing of international tensions. The more the Soviets make friendly gestures, the more traders everywhere tend to look for business with the Soviet Union.

But on the other side is a set of arguments which remains powerful and which has many adherents, especially in the State Department and probably in the Defense Department as well. They include:

1. A major policy of the administration has been to exploit differences between the rulers and the ruled in all the Communist countries. A major source of trouble for the Soviet leaders has been low agricultural production. The export of any large quantity of foodstuffs such as fats and oils would run contrary to U. S. policy on this point.

2. Agricultural surpluses for foreign sale are often in effect subsidized by the government. The government would have difficulty justifying the subsidized export of any foodstuffs to Russia.

3. A basic rule of U. S. foreign economic policy is not to export surpluses in such a way as to interfere with normal trade patterns of friendly countries. Countries other than the United States, notably those of Western Europe, are normal traders with the Soviet Union. A heavy export of goods to the Soviet Union would tend to displace their normal trade.

Klamath Tribal Council Meets, Discusses Federal Bill On Liquidation Move

The Klamath Indian Tribal Council met in the tribal chambers at Klamath Agency Thursday afternoon to discuss a bill now before Congress which proposes to terminate supervision of the Klamath tribe by the United States government.

Lee Langan, assistant to the commissioner of the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington, D.C., acted as spokesman for the Indian bureau, read the bill to the members of the tribe who jammed the hall, and attempted to explain the bill section by section to the group.

At the start of his discussion Langan asked that the tribe consider the importance of this bill as it was one of the most important pieces of legislation pertaining to their eventual freedom from government controls.

When questioned as to who formulated the bill, Langan stated that Congress had asked the secretary of the interior for an enabling legislative bill to be drawn up and presented to Congress. This bill was drawn up by the bureau of Indian Affairs and presented to Congress with no recommendations, Langan added.

After explaining a few sections of the proposed bill it was evident that members of the tribe would agree to only a small percentage of the sections and most of the afternoon from that time on was devoted to questions from the floor directed at the bureau representative.

At his point, Seldon Kirk, chairman, and president of the council, requested that all speakers limit their oratory to not over 10 minutes.

Boyd Jackson, tribal council delegate, referring to the bill stated, "this is a new creature compared to the original bill submitted to the tribe last September and which the tribe turned down. The Indians have had no chance to read and study this bill." It had been disclosed earlier in the meeting that Langan had the only copy of the newly worded bill which was said to be essentially the same as the rough draft furnished the tribe earlier.

Considerable discussion developed from the floor as to why a poll had not been taken of members of the tribe to find out whether or not a majority actually wanted to be freed from government controls.

Jessie Lee Kirk stated "I have never been asked and neither have you, whether we want any changes made."

When asked by H. Robbins, member of the executive committee, if there could still be a referendum vote to determine whether or not the majority of the Indians wanted the tribe liquidated, Langan stated the bill will be presented to Congress and he did not believe a referendum vote now could stop presentation of the liquidation bill.

Harvey Wright, representing Governor Patterson for the state of Oregon was introduced to the council by Seldon Kirk as was State Representative Henry Semon and Senator Phil Hitchcock.

Hitchcock and Semon both assured tribe members they were deeply concerned about their problems but could see no way in which they could assist the council as long as they were wards of the government.

After assurance from Langan that he would stay over another day the meeting adjourned to reconvene at 1:30 p.m. Friday.

Morse Asks Democratic Congress

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) told the Rural Electrification Cooperative Assn. Thursday that "the American people to protect their interests should elect a Democratic Congress in 1954."

He said the rural cooperatives need a friendly administration in Washington "and that means a new administration." Morse spoke before the national convention of the rural electrification group.

"The Eisenhower big business administration has been giving the farmer, the consumer and even certain industries 'the business,'" said Morse.

The association adopted unanimously a resolution condemning the new Department of the Interior power policy for the country and the new Missouri Basin marketing criteria.

"The new interior power policy calls for the building only of multipurpose dams which others will not build — which means the choice sites will go to the commercial power companies," the resolution said.

Another resolution strongly denied an implication made by Fred G. Aandahl, assistant secretary of the interior, in a speech to the convention Tuesday that the association ever had been "crusaders for federal power monopoly."

The resolution pointed out the implication was immediately refuted by Clyde T. Ellis, association executive manager, and declared:

"The long established policy of this association has been to prevent a monopoly of power by either public or private interests, for the benefit of all people."

A resolution urging Congress continue appropriations for the development of TVA also was adopted.

A total of 40 resolutions were adopted by the 5,000 delegates present.

Target Shooter Puts Grocer In Vast Fear

BETHANY, Okla. (AP) — Frightened by a recent wave of grocery store robberies, the owner of Murray's Grocery here thought the wolf was at the door when a young man drove up with a .22-caliber pistol in his hand.

Murray locked the door and told the gunman he was closed for the day. He drove off. Murray furnished police with the license number.

After an investigation, Police Chief Fletcher McLean dropped the case. He said he traced the car to Dillon Williams, 24-year-old Bethany man.

Williams said he had been target shooting at Lake Overholser and stopped at the grocery to buy some dinner on his way home. He got out of the car and took the gun out of his pocket to put it in a tool box in the rear seat.

That's when the grocer got worried, Williams said when he was told the store was closed he drove blissfully off, unaware of the excitement.

Nudists Move To Eugene Site

CORVALLIS (AP) — More than half of the members of Evergreen Lodge, a nudist colony in the hills south of Philomath, have quit and are setting up their own colony in the Eugene area.

Wayne Weatherby, a director of Evergreen Lodge, said Thursday about 16 left in a difference of opinion over purchase of property on which the Evergreen camp is located. About 19 will remain with the Benton County colony, he said.

The dissidents, to be known as The Willamettians, filed supplementary articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office here. The articles specified the name and location of a new camp and main office at Eugene. The exact camp site was not announced.

The nudists have lived in the Philomath area west of here about three years without incident. The camp was the site of the Northwest nudists' gathering in the summer of 1952.
