Our changing weather, plus the habits of modern living, dictate lighter weight clothes the year round, says Mrs. Simpson. She highlights silk suits or dress-and-coat outfits. The print silk costume with fur collar or cuffs is a headliner here, shown in many versions. Mrs. Simpson also features colors that stand away from the neck, for greater coolness, and likes black or navy fitted silk coats lined in print silk to match the companion dress. "The Shape" is Mrs. Simpson's favorite silhouette for spring. This is a princess coat dress with slightly flared or narrow skirt, so artfully constructed that the essential shape is built into the dress, even when it is hanging in the closet.
