Colts Lose Brethauer BALTIMORE (AP)—The Baltimore Colts will play their 1954 season without the services of versatile Monte Brethauer, their top rookie last year.

Brethauer, who played both offensive end and defensive halfback for the National Football League club, was drafted into the Army this month and is stationed at Fort Ord, Calif.

The 22-year-old University of Oregon graduate from Portland, Ore., originally was classified 4F because of a foot condition. The Colts said he was reclassified early this month and inducted immediately.
